THE CORONATION CHAIR

FOR over six hundred years the people of England have seated their kings upon this wooden chair to pledge their fealty. Now their loyalty is shared with five hundred million fellow subjects scattered across the globe.

Over twenty generations have preserved this chair with pious veneration since Edward the First was crowned in 1274. It was this Edward who brought back from his northern wars the fateful Stone of Destiny on which Scottish kings had been crowned since the earliest days; and it was he who set it in the Coronation Chair.

When the new King sits in this chair on which some twenty of his ancestors have sat, the Primate of All England places reverently upon his head St. Edward's Crown, named for the Confessor. Then all the Empire, through its representatives, pays homage to the King, his crown and dignity.
