For centuries, "the fishery" has been the mainstay of Newfoundland, Britain's oldest colony and Canada's newest province. Fish, of course, means Cod and on the cover of this menu you see it spread on one of the *flakes* of a typical Newfoundland outport. Connecting with the mainland by steamer across Cabot Strait, the Canadian National Railways traverse the island from Port aux Basques to St. Johns. From this capital city, which is just about as far east as you can go and still be in North America, travellers can easily reach such picturesque fishing villages on the rugged shore as Torbay, Pouch Cove and Flat Rock. Canadian National steamers call at dozens of others, on neither railway nor road, as far north as Labrador.



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
