Across Canada, Canadian National links city to city, province to province. Its presence is felt "from sea to sea."

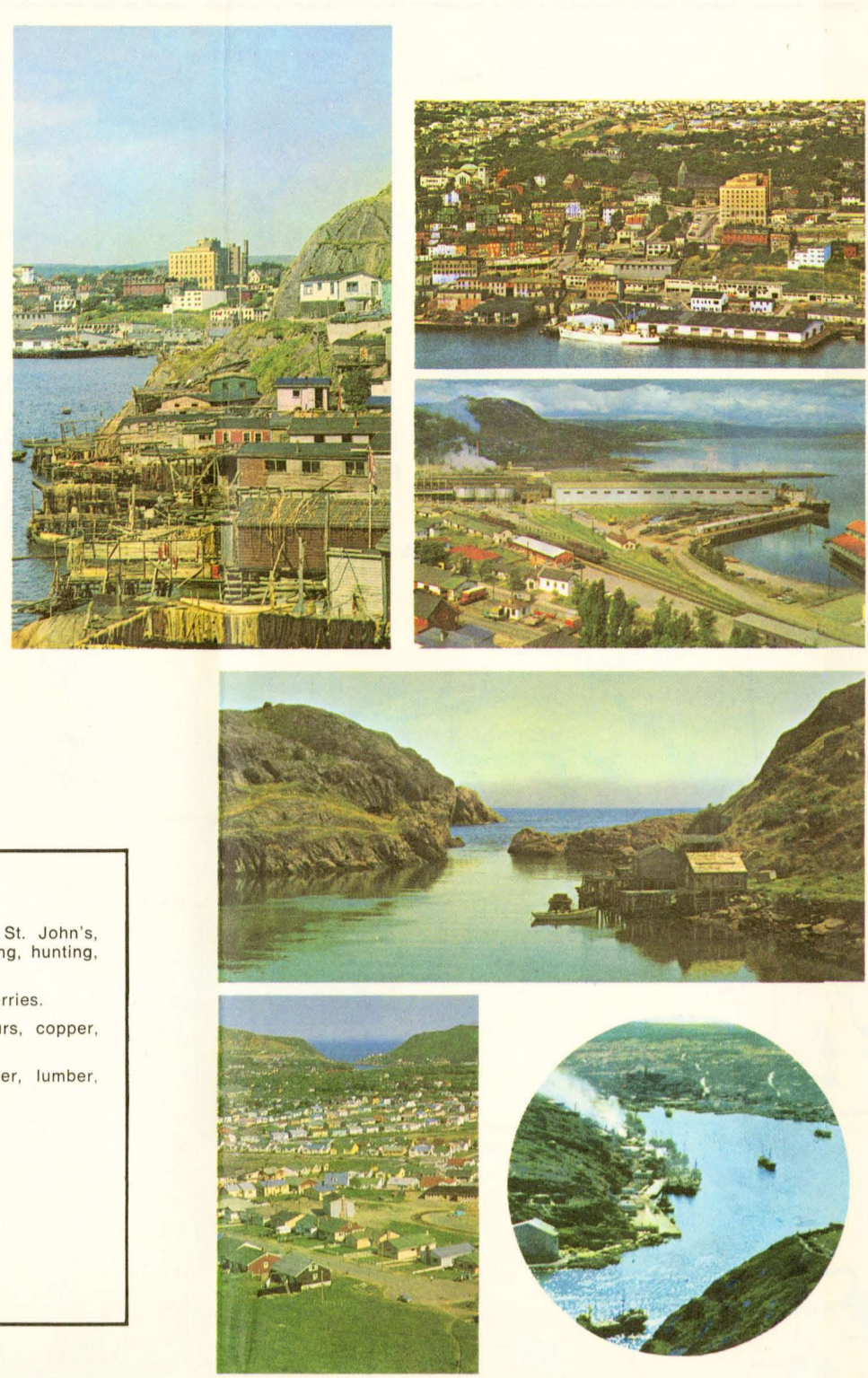
