THE SAME sailing-date and the same ship have been chosen for the 1928 and the 1929 Mediterranean Cruises of the Canadian Pacific. On February 4, 1928, and again on February 4, 1929, the stately Empress of Scotland will sail away eastward from New York. Days in sunny ports shift not too soon, nor too late, to days at sea.
