BANFF HIGHLAND GATHERING

IT is a far cry from the hills and glens of Scotland to Banff in the heart of the Canadian Rockies but each year towards the end of August the distance is bridged when the Annual Highland Gathering and Scottish Music Festival is held at baronial Banff Springs Hotel.

For a few brief days the skirl of the bagpipes re-echoes through the mountain fastnesses of the Canadian Rockies, the tartans of the Scottish clans flash on the spacious terraces while the stirring games and dances, brought by their ancestors from the Old Country, challenge the prowess and skill of Scots drawn from every part of the continent.

For interest in this Gathering of the Clans is not confined to Canadian Scots. Pride of ancestry is as strong below the forty-ninth parallel and in every corner of the United States the call strikes a responsive chord. In the evenings the Scottish Music Festival provides the entertainment and six thousand miles from their place of origin the songs and melodies of Scotland are interpreted by consummate artists. For the Scot, by birth or ancestry, the centre of interest towards the end of August is Banff.
