

# EMPRESS OF BRITAIN 42,500 gross ton... 5 day atlantic giantess



ORE than size and speed—space! Space for the individual passenger! That is the new idea in ocean=travel which comes with the Empress of Britain. His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales was the first to suggest the importance of this ship. He said, at her launching: "This vessel can be considered in construction as the last word in shipbuilding, and as regards her appointments—she will have no rivals."

To-day, she is hailed everywhere as the expression of a new ocean-luxury. The Empress of Britain has that sheer bigness which ocean-travellers love. She bulks 42,500 gross tons. She stretches 758 feet in length. She broadens to 97 feet. She also has that startling swiftness which this faster-ever-faster world applauds. The Atlantic crossing is an easy 5-day run for her. But the Empress of Britain utilizes size and speed—not to carry record passenger lists, but to increase the allotment of space, the joy of travel, the measure of luxury of the individual passenger.

Her rooms are so spacious, so much like fine homes in their appointments and decorations, that they cease to be cabins or staterooms, but are real apartments on board ship.

Seventy per cent of these apartments have private baths. All of them have outside light and air. There are no "inside" rooms. Instead of the old type Promenade Deck, the Empress of Britain has a Lounge Deck. Inboard from this sweeping, spacious deck is a succession of brilliant rooms. Each is decorated by a great artist. Each provides its own setting for gay social life.


Above the Lounge Deck is a separate Sports Deck. Its unique feature is a full-size tennis=court, with adjoining café.


Above the Sports Deck is the Sun Deck, open to the health=giving sun and wind. Below the Lounge Deck is found the Olympian Pool. This replaces the conventional swimming pool with an atmosphere of colour and gaiety.

In her decorations, her speed, her comforts, her gaiety, she is truly a ship for the moderns, —but particularly for those moderns who still think space is preferable to crowds. Her lavish dedication of space to a highly restricted passenger=list is probably the most

astonishing development in the ocean-going world.

#### MAYFAIR by Sir Charles Allom

Mayfair, on the Lounge Deck, is the name of the great central Salon of the Empress of Britain. Sir Charles Allom has utilized the grand spaces of this room to create a brilliant central setting, bordered by restful vistas and large=windowed bays. The decorative motif is Renaissance. Rich walnut panelling is picked out in silver. Marble pilasters are orna= mented in bronze. The tympanum sunburst is a glory of simplified modern conception. In this vast room, one has the feeling of a delightful and sparkling society -Mayfair








#### THE EMPRESS ROOM by Sir John Lavery, R.A.

### DE LUXE APARTMENTS







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
#### CATHAY LOUNGE by Edmund Dulac

From the vivid modern brush of this artist, the "Arabian Nights" genius of the generation, comes the suave dignity of the Cathay Lounge. This setting replaces, in effect, those for= bidding "ship smoke=rooms" of yesterday. All that is brilliant and vigorous in the colour of the ancient Far East, Mr. Dulac has portrayed through the refinements of his conception. A ceiling of shimmering silver balances a golden=toned parquet. The bar and fireplace are of trans= lucent glass. All are held in calm restraint through the use of choice, natural woods and simple Chinese lacquer. In such a setting the serious globe=trotters aboard the Empress of Britain gather in conversa= tional exchange.

#### ONE = ROOMAPARTMENTS (Double)

Although of one room, these apart= ments for two have an atmosphere of liveability which only spaciousness and lovely appointments can give. 



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#### ONE=ROOM APARTMENTS (Single)





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#### SALLE JACQUES CARTIER by Frank Brangwyn, R.A.




#### KNICKERBOCKER BAR by Heath Robinson

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





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#### THE MALL by P. A. Staynes & A. H. Jones









#### OLYMPIAN POOL


Under a full glass ceiling, which gleams as the brilliant warmth of Adriatic sunshine, this exquisite setting is a veritable Lido in activity. Water spouts into the enormous swimming pool from a sea turtle of terrazzo glass. Hidden under the surface, lights pick up the sparkle of its plunge. A terraced café borders the pool's forward end — spectators' galleries command its sides—and the whole is set amid delicate glass mosaics and adroitly carved teak. Turkish and electric baths, as well as a fully=equipped gymnasium, adjoin the Pool to form a complete locale for gay exercise and invigorating relaxation aboard the Empress of Britain





### SPORTS DECK






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#### CHILDREN'S PLAYROOM by Heath Robinson
