"The Valley of the Bow"

Well-known to doughty travellers who made their way by horse, foot and water across the Canadian Rockies "the hard way" for many decades before the Canadian Pacific Railway was built, the Bow River Valley has now become a world-famous mountain holidayland. At Banff, headquarters of Banff National Park, the valley widens into the beautiful peak-ringed bowl reproduced by colour photography on the front page. Here, sheltered by Sulphur Mountain (site of the camera), Mount Rundle and Tunnel Mountain, is Banff Springs Hotel, a magnificent baronial castle of local stone. The 600-room hotel, noted for its luxurious appointments, and the magnificent views its windows command, is headquarters for trail-riding, tennis, mountain-climbing and, of course, golf.

Along the river, between Tunnel Mountain and Mount Rundle, is one of the world's most spectacular golf courses. At the foot of Cascade Mountain, at left of the picture, the Government maintains buffalo, mountain sheep, moose, elk and goats in an animal paddock. Lake Minnewanka, top right, is noted for scenic boat trips.
