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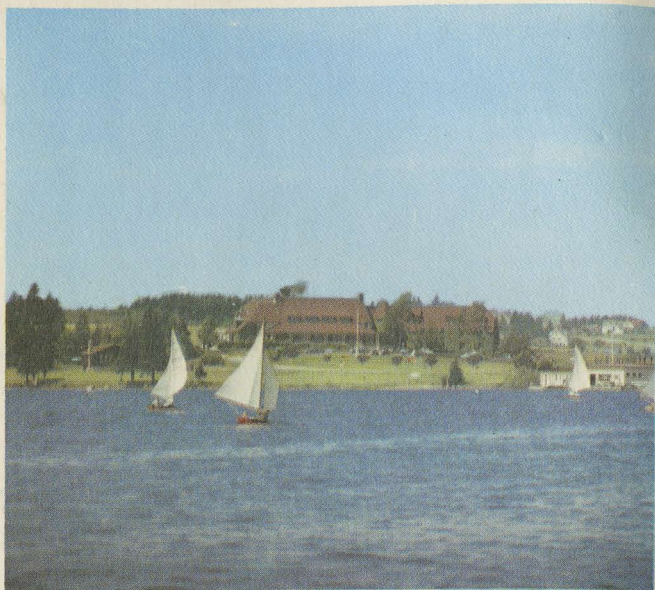

DIGBY IS EASY TO REACH

By rail from the south "The Gull" B & M, leaves Boston North Station every evening except Saturday for Saint John, N.B., and daily Canadian Pacific trains through Saint John, N.B., and Montreal connect with the west. From Saint John each morning and Digby each afternoon, S.S. Princess Helene makes fast voyages across the Bay of Fundy. Automobile travellers make their approach by Canadian highways through Montreal or Quebec, the highways of New York, Connecticut and Massachusetts and the toll turnpikes of New Hampshire and Maine. There is accommodation for cars aboard Princess Helene. Alternative car routes are overland via Truro and the fabled Annapolis Valley in Nova Scotia or Bar Harbor, Me., and by steamship to Yarmouth, over the picturesque French shore drive to Digby. Air travellers connect with T.C.A. at Montreal or Boston for Saint John, N.B., Halifax or Yarmouth, N.S.

Banff Springs Golf Course—the mile-high links—is spectacular enough to keep a player's mind off the game, sporty enough to compel concentration. Designed by internationally famous Stanley Thompson, the 6704-yard, par 71, course is teed for good, medium and average players. Clubhouse and pro-shop, five minutes from the terrace, overlook the scenic lay-out along the Bow Valley and the last seven fairways are within sight and sound of the musically fast-running Bow River. From the 570-yard “Windy” (number four) to the 138-yard “Papoose” (number 12) the whole eighteen test almost every club in the bag.

The attractive clubhouse—a few steps from the hotel—is a very popular “19th hole”. Lunches, teas and snacks, geared to the golf- and mountain-sharpened appetites of club members, and beverages to please connoisseurs are featured in the gay, wide-windowed club room that overlooks the Spray River and the first and 18th fairways.

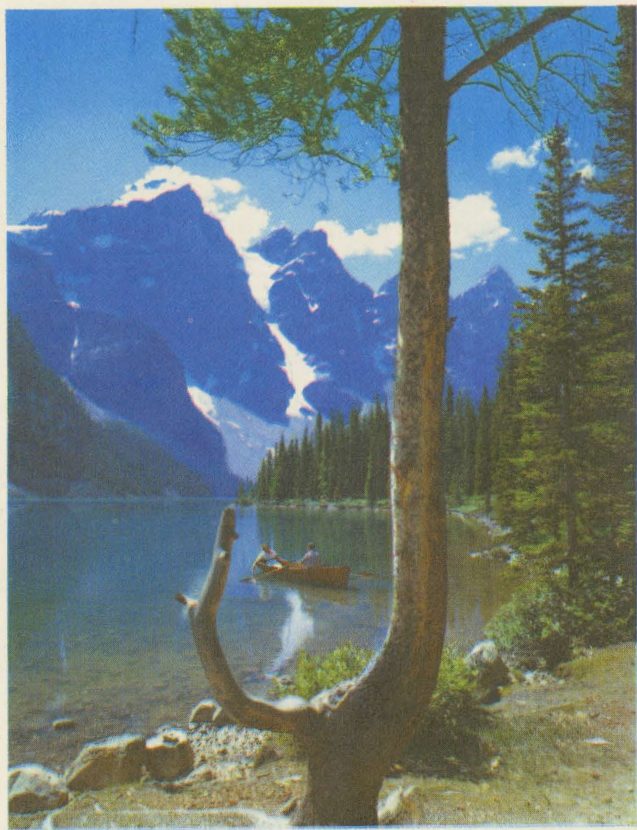
Victoria Glacier

And between lake and terrace to delight a diner's eye, myriads of the Iceland Poppies for which Lake Louise is famous. Climbs by easy trails to the Tea Houses at the Lakes in the Clouds and Plain of Six Glaciers, riding and sightseeing call for restful days in between. For these there are boating, putting, swimming in the warmed, filtered glacial water of the glass-screened outdoor pool. And every weeknight, dancing in the intimate, tasteful ballroom.

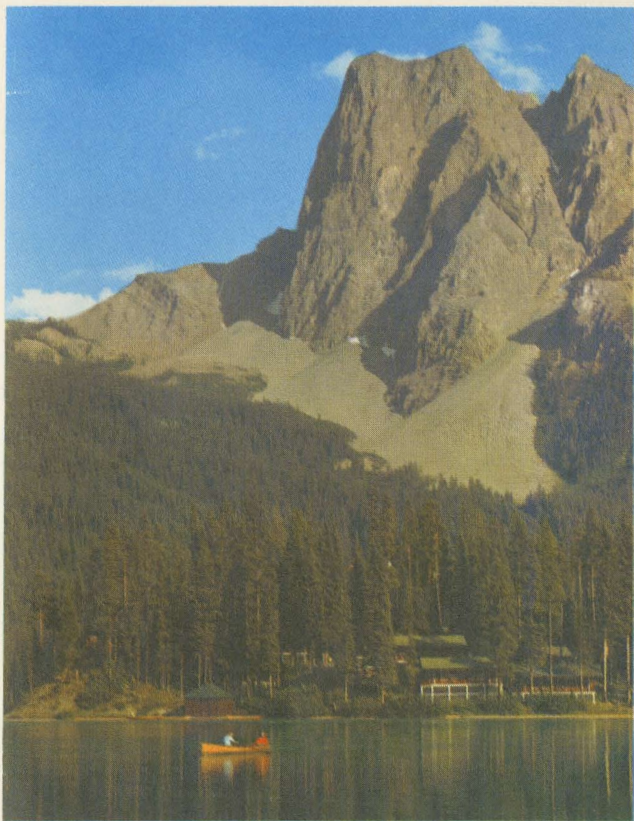

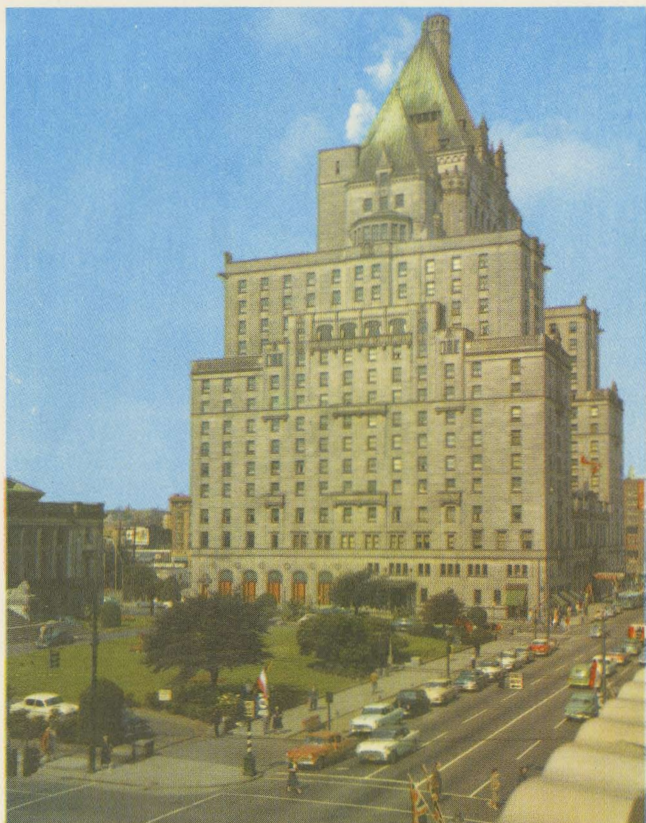

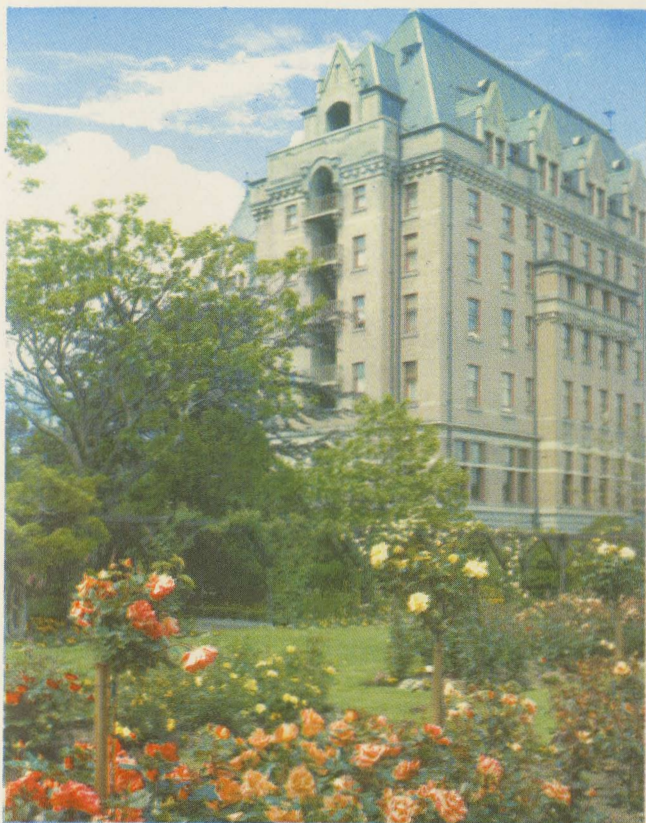
