England's greatest literary figure, William Shakespeare, was born at Stratford-on-Avon, April 1564, the eldest son of John Shakespeare, a well-to-do merchant, and Mary, daughter of Robert Arden, a farmer at nearby Wilmcote.

A decline in the family fortunes terminated the great dramatist's formal education at an early age, although he had acquired some knowledge of Latin. At 18 he married Anne Hathaway, of Shottery, where today stands the cottage in which she lived. Shakespeare's connection with the theatre dates from 1582, when he went to London and began as a player of minor roles. Graduation to play-writing followed his attachment to the Earl of Leicester's Company of Players, and by 1596 Shakespeare could be rated a prosperous man. The following year he purchased New Place in Stratford. Buried in Stratford, where he died April 23, 1616, Shakespeare is commemorated in Southwark Cathedral, London, not far from the site of The Globe Theatre, famous for first presentation of many of his plays.
