THE GREAT LAKES

The five "Great Lakes" of the North American Continent are really fresh water inland seas. Drained ultimately by the St. Lawrence River into the Atlantic Ocean.

Their size and height above sea level is as follows:

The drop in elevation, as will be seen from the above, is most marked from Superior to Huron (21 feet) and from Erie to Ontario (326 feet). The former is overcome by the Soo Canal and the latter by the Welland Canal.
