John Milton, British poet, who is probably best known as the author of "Paradise Lost", was born in London in 1608. St. Paul's School, London and Christ's College, Cambridge, were the scenes of his educational labours, and the little street, Petty France, in Westminster, is recorded as being the site of his home when he began "Paradise Lost" in 1658. Five years later he moved to Chalfont St. Giles, Buckinghamshire, to escape the Plague, and the cottage in which he lived is still preserved. Later he returned to London, where he died November 8, 1674. He was buried at St. Giles, Cripplegate, London.
