


## GRACIOUS LIVING IN THE CANADIAN ROCKIES





THE ALHAMBRA DINING-ROOM








## Rendezvous





Golf


"Ace" or "Dub", golf's possibilities are an unknown quantity until you have played the links at Banff. Designed by Stanley Thompson, the 18-hole course is a scenic delight—a player's challenge.


The course stretches down the Bow Valley, sheltered by Mount Rundle, Tunnel Mountain, and overlooked by the "Hoodoos". From the moment you drive across the purling Spray River until—6704 yards later—you hole out at the 18th you make new discoveries. And mile-high golf sharpens the appetite as well as your skill. Luncheon or tea awaits you in the clubhouse and, on your way back to dress for dinner, you can stop in for a plunge in the pool.








The true savour of a mountain holiday is found—ahorse or afoot—on the trails. Banff Springs Hotel and Chateau Lake Louise are radial points for well-marked, well-kept trails.

Breath-taking views, little-known wild flowers, unafraid wild animals—these are the treasures that await the hiker.

For distances too far for horse or foot—or to conserve time—plastic-roofed buses cover interesting itineraries. Full information is available in the lobby.

Banff visitors whose plans include the Chateau Lake Louise, may make the 40 mile trip by bus, visiting Johnston Canyon en route.







High-diver, speed-swimmer or leisurely floater—each finds satisfaction in the ever-flowing glacial water of the glass-screened pool. Warmed to 75° the crystal clear water tempts all ages to enjoyment.

The pool terrace-chairs invite spectators and sun-bathers to enjoy the play of light and shadow on the Glacier, Mount Lefroy, the Mitre, Mount Fairview, the Beehive.

Boating on the lake, strolling around its jade reflections, pony-riding over the trails that start at the Chateau—all these things spell summer at Lake Louise.








TEN PEAKS




Every room in the Chateau, public or private, is large-windowed, warmed, comfortable.

LOVELY LAKE LOUISE


The exhilaration of hiking on mountain trails breeds appetite. Within walking or riding distance of the Chateau attractive Tea Houses serve snacks to hungry hikers. At Lake Agnes, one of twin "Lakes in the Clouds", on the Plain of the Six Glaciers, at Moraine Lake and Lake O'Hara rest and refreshment may be found at reasonable prices. And on the trails, wild flowers, wild creatures, magnificent scenery reward the energetic with sights unknown at lower levels. For real enjoyment of a mountain hike the company of a Swiss guide is recommended.

BOW LAKE - ICEFIELD HIGHWAY





EMERALD LAKE


A few days of mountain informality?
