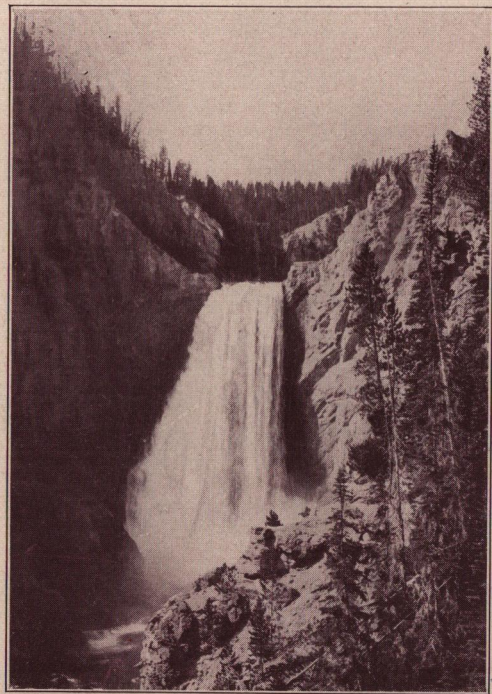


Sixth Day. Drive to the Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone. The entire party with carriages and horses will climb to the top of Mount Washburn, 10,300 feet above the sea.

Seventh and Eighth Days. Spend visiting the Grand Canyon, the most wonderful, gorgeous natural spectacle in the world. Artist's Point. Lookout, Inspiration Point, etc.

Ninth Day. Drive to the Lake Hotel, passing Sulphur Mountain, Mud Volcano, etc.

Tenth Day. Drive along the shore of the lake to the West Thumb, visit the Fishing Cone and the Paint Pots. The road here leaves the stage route, turning south. Camp on Lewis Lake.

Eleventh Day. Drive south thirty miles to Jackson's Lake, the country of Wister's story, "The Virginian."

Twelfth Day. Spend at Bryant Permanent Camp on Jackson's Lake.

Thirteenth Day. Drive to the outlet of Jackson's Lake, follow the Buffalo River eighteen miles, camp at the Buffalo River Bridge at the foot of the Wind River Mountains.

Fourteenth Day. The road is steep up-hill all day climbing hour after hour into the mountains. Camp on Black Rock Creek near To-Go-Tee Pass.

Fifteenth Day. Drive over To-Go-Tee Pass. Camp at Brook's Lake.

Sixteenth Day. Drive down the mountains thirty miles to Dubois. The road follows the head waters of the Big Wind River from their rise near Brook's Lake.

Seventeenth Day. Follow the course of the Big Wind River through a weird and interesting country. Camp on Dinwoodie Creek.

Eighteenth Day. The road enters the Shoshone Indian Reservation, still following the course of the Big Wind River. The Indians will be seen at their work in the field and in their lodges from time to time. Camp at J. K. Ranch.

Nineteenth Day. Drive through the Indian Reservation, to Fort Washakie. The Indian Trading Post, the government schools, and several Indian villages will be visited.

Twentieth Day. Drive to Lander, Wyo. Special Pullman car will be in waiting for the party at Lander.

The second tour will leave Chicago via the C. & N. W. Ry. at 10.45 pm., Wed., July 28.

Ar Lander, 10.00 pm., Fri., July 30.

TOUR NO. 2

Starting from Lander the morning of July 31st, the itinerary of Tour 1 will be exactly reversed, and after passing up the valley of the Wind River, across the Divide and stopping at Jackson's Lake, permanent camp, the complete tour of Yellowstone Park will be made, arriving at Yellowstone, Mont., the western boundary of the Park, Thursday, August 19th. Here the special car will be in waiting, and will return to Chicago arriving there August 22d.

THE JACKSON HOLE COUNTRY

The Jackson Hole country and the Yellowstone Forest Reserve form one of the biggest and finest game preserves in the world. The streams are frequented by otter, mink, marten, and beaver; the winter's snow-clad slopes show the dainty tracks of weasel and ferret, jack rabbits and cotton-tails; squirrels and porcupines abound. Foxes are plentiful, including the splendid-coated silver-gray fox, and prairie dogs, woodchucks and wolverines are here at home.

Here thousands of elk congregate, and black and white tailed deer, slender-limbed antelope and the agile mountain sheep. In their fastnesses the sportsman still seeks out the mountain lion, brown, black, and grizzly bear, wild cats, lynx, coyotes, and gray wolves. There are even a few moose to be seen, and in the Park proper it is supposed there yet remains, carefully guarded, a remnant of buffalo.

The fishing is good in the Snake River, and lake trout weighing from ten to twelve pounds are caught in Jackson Lake. There is also good bird shooting within easy distance, and big game shooting in season.

The olive of the sage, the deep colorings of rock and mountain, distant snow-covered peaks and the nearby waters of foaming mountain streams lie spread beneath a sky that sparkles with flashes of brilliant ozone. On the horizon, perhaps, a herd or flock, or a solitary horseman; nearer at hand, some scurrying wild thing taking refuge from unwonted disturbances, and in the distance, the higher mountains that bespeak the beauties of the Great Divide.

Lovely mountain streams furnish a breakfast of trout to him who care to cast for them. One can, during the proper season, have mountain grouse for the hunting, and throughout the trip it is possible to camp within reach of some ranch where butter, eggs, and milk can be had. At night camp is made, tents are put up, bedding is spread and the evening meal disposed of in time to lie around the campfire and discuss the events of the day and plans for to-morrow.

It is a new experience for the city man to tuck himself into

his blankets and sleep under the stars; to waken from a sound slumber in time to plunge into the nearby stream and prepare for an early breakfast.

THE BRYANT PERMANENT CAMP
ON JACKSON'S LAKE

A permanent camp has been established on the east shore of Jackson's Lake under the management of Mr. Robert C. Bryant, of the Bryant Yellowstone Camping Company. This camp is ideally located. Directly across the lake are the Teton Mountains. There is a medicinal hot spring on the shore of the lake not far from the camp. The fishing on Jackson's Lake is unsurpassed and mountain trout are often taken that weigh from five to ten pounds each.

Good boats may be had at the camp and a naphtha launch will be available. Carriages and saddle horses may be had at reasonable prices and guides for mountain trips or other excursions.

The camp will provide a good table and comfortable rooms with every possible convenience. Rates \$2.50 per day.

Jackson's Lake is twenty miles south of the Yellowstone National Park. It is reached either from Yellowstone Station at the western boundary of the Park or from Lander, the terminus of the North Western Line.

Arrangements may be made for carriages from either of these points by addressing Bryant Tours, 457 Monadnock Block, Chicago, previous to July 1st, and after this date either the above address or Mr. Robert C. Bryant, Yellowstone, Mont., via Ashton, Idaho.

A NEW ROUTE TO AND FROM THE YELLOWSTONE

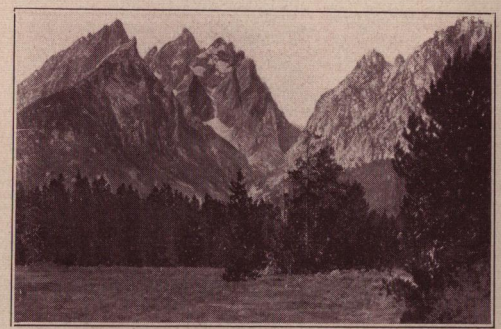


In connection with the Chicago & North Western Railway to Casper, Wyo., and the Wyoming & North Western Railway, extending across Wyoming from Casper to Lander, a new route to and from the Yellowstone National Park has been opened, through a region which has largely preserved the picturesque conditions of early frontier life.

It has been many years since the first explorer who visited what is now the National Park of the Yellowstone, returned to the outposts of the frontier to tell wondrous stories of this unique region of mountains and forests, lakes and streams, geysers, and canyons.

Between the Park and the North Western's terminus at Lander is a country of picturesque rivers, beautiful lakes and splendid mountain ranges. It is a wild and beautiful region, practically untouched by the hand of man; the waters of the

sparkling mountain streams teem with fish, and the forests and mountain crags are inhabited by noble specimens of big game. Overspreading this picturesque region, with its distant horizon of snow-capped ranges, is a sky of a brilliant blue; the atmosphere scintillates with health and inspiration; the mountain roads lead through vistas of rapidly changing beauty beside lovely mountain streams, where the day's journey ends with the comforts of the camp fire.

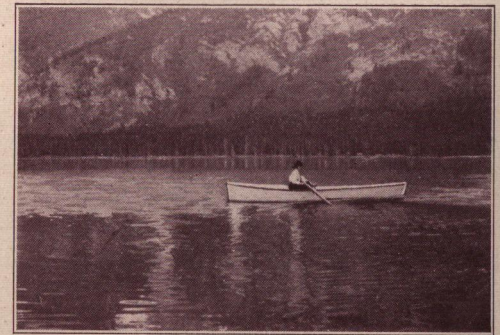
PERSONALLY CONDUCTED TOURS

Two circuit tours from Chicago and the East, via Yellowstone, the new western entrance to the Park, and Lander, and through the Yellowstone National Park, are being arranged under the auspices of the Bryant Yellowstone Camping Company.

Each of these tours provides for twenty days' camp life in one of the most beautiful regions of high plateaus and ranges of splendid mountain peaks in America. In this region the Wind River, the Gros Ventre and the beautiful Teton Mountains form, day after day, a background for extensive plains, brilliant hued buttes, and a dry air that carries with it tonic properties of untold worth.

A period of recreation and outdoor life such as these tours afford is one of the most direct means that can be found for adding several years to the life of the average man.

To the lover of nature it offers an opportunity to see some of the most impressive scenery of the American Rockies; to the sportsman it presents a chance to visit the greatest big game country that now remains untouched by the influences of civilization.

LEAVE CHICAGO JULY 5TH AND JULY 28TH

One of these personally conducted parties will leave Chicago via the Chicago, Union Pacific & North Western Line, Monday, July 5th, via the electric-lighted Los Angeles Limited to Salt Lake City, and the Yellowstone Special to Yellowstone, the new western entrance to the Park.

Arriving at Yellowstone, the party will make a camping tour of the Park, stopping each day at Bryant camps, and returning leave the Park via the Thumb, thence down the Snake River to the Bryant permanent camp on beautiful Jackson Lake.

Across from the camp are the Grand Tetons, one of the most beautiful mountain ranges in the world. The camp itself is in the midst of the big game country of the Yellowstone National Forest Reserve, where thousands of elk and an abundance of deer, bear, and other big game are found.

Leaving the camp the party continues through the big game country, crossing the Continental Divide at To-Go-Tee Pass, thence along the Wind River via Fort Washakie, and thence to Lander, the terminus of the Wyoming & North Western Railway. At this point the train is taken for Chicago, after a delightful outdoor trip of twenty days.

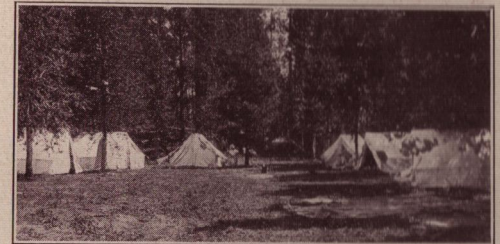
Another tour leaves Chicago via the Chicago & North Western Railway, Sunday, July 28th. This second tour reverses the route of the first one. The party will proceed direct to Lander from Chicago by rail and take the camping trip over the route described above, entering the Yellowstone Park via the Thumb station, making a tour of the Park via the Bryant camps and leaving via Yellowstone.

The return trip will be made via the Chicago, Union Pacific & North Western Line, arriving at Chicago about August 26th.

Each of these tours provides twenty days of camp life. Saddle horses, stages, camp equipment, food, guides, etc., are all provided by the management and are included in the cost of the tour.

The tours are also arranged to provide for all necessary expenses en route, including railway fare, and sleeping car accommodations as well as the necessary provisions for travel from the railway terminus to and through Yellowstone Park and return.

In order that ample care and attention to the comfort of each patron may be assured, each party will be strictly limited as to numbers.

ITINERARY OF PERSONALLY CONDUCTED TOURS

The first personally conducted party will arrive at Yellowstone, the new western entrance to the Park, via the Yellowstone Special at 7.00 A. M., July 8th, and at 9.00 A. M. the twenty days' camping trip will begin:

First Day. Drive through Christmas Tree Park and along the Madison River to the Lower Geyser Basin. Visit Mammoth Paint Pots, Fountain Geysers, Excelsior Geyser, Fire-hole Lake, Prismatic Lake, etc.

Second Day. Drive to Upper Geyser Basin and spend the day there, visit Old Faithful, Giant Castle, Riverside, Grotto and many others. Return to Lower Basin Camp.

Third Day. Drive through Gibbon Canyon to Norris Basin, then north to Apollinaris Spring, passing the Devil's Frying Pan, Beaver Lake, Obsidian Cliff, etc.

Fourth Day. Drive through Golden Gate and Silver Gate to Mammoth Hot Springs Postoffice, Yellowstone Park, Wyo.

Fifth Day. Drive twenty miles east to Tower Falls, visiting Yancey's, the Petrified Trees the Lower Canyon, etc.
