COURT FREES ILLUSTRATOR.

Masters Was Sketching Train from Railroad Bridge When Arrested.

After Magistrate Nolan, in the Men's Night Court, was told that the United States District Attorney's office was satisfied that Frank B. Masters of 121 West Twenty-third Street was what he represented himself to be, an illustrator, the Court dismissed the complaint of disorderly conduct against Masters.

Masters was arrested Tuesday night by Special Policeman.
