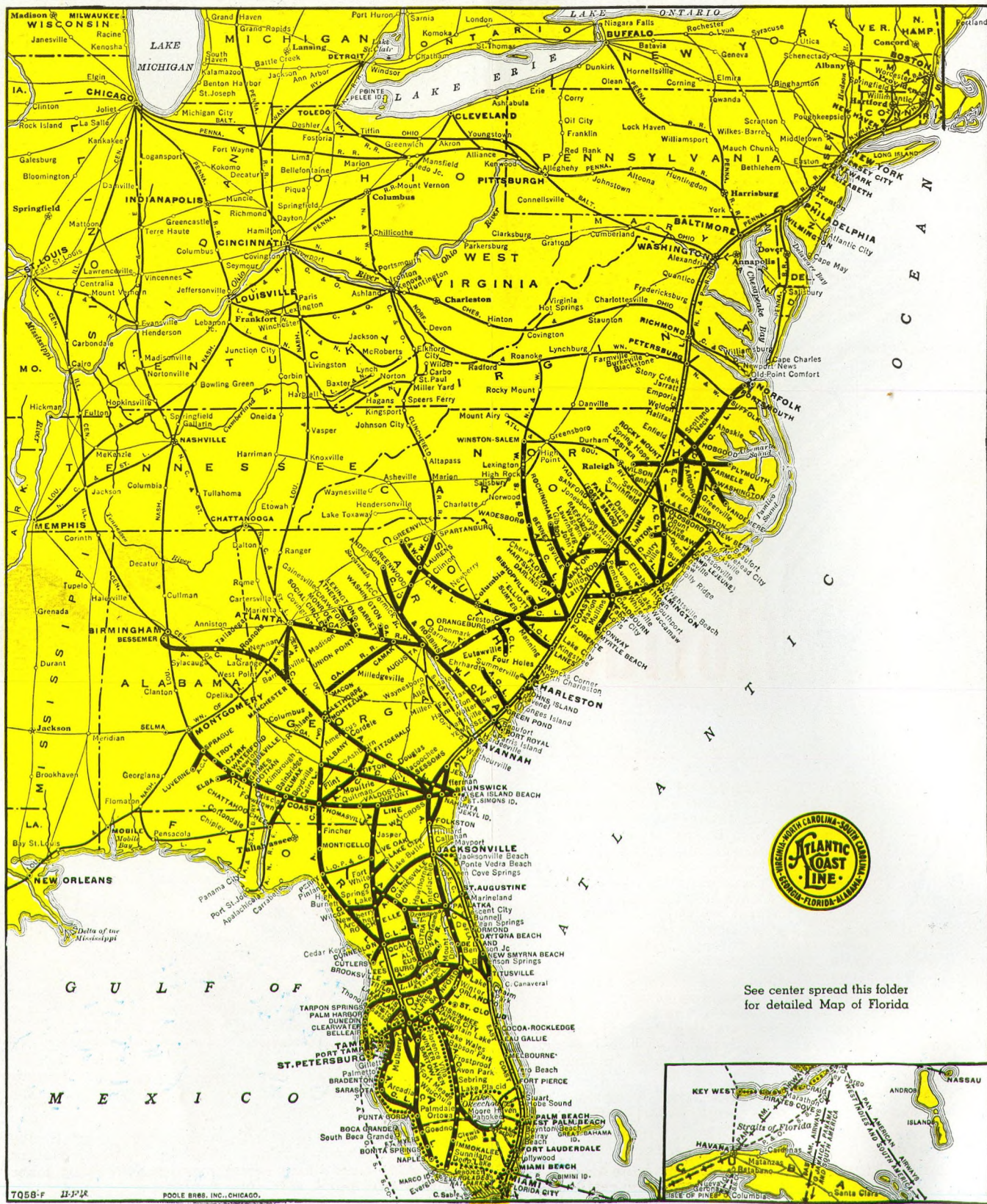




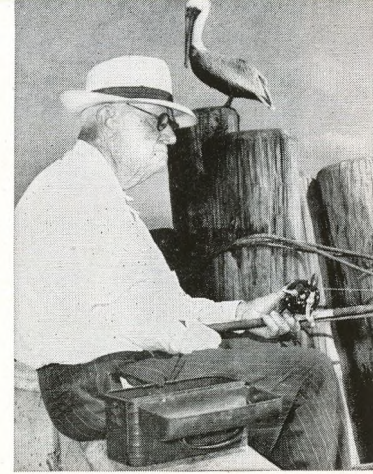

ATLANTA, GEORGIA—Capital of Georgia, Financial and Commercial Dynamo of the Southeast. Atlanta is famous for many things, a few of which are its educational institutions, splendid stores, office buildings, beautiful homes, fine hotels, facilities for sports, recreation, sight-seeing and amusements. It is the home of the Cyclorama, one of the two largest paintings in the world, and only 16 miles away is Stone Mountain, one of the natural wonders of the world. Atlanta epitomizes the New South, reveres its antebellum historical heritage and amply rewards visitors whether bent on business or pleasure.

ALBANY, GEORGIA—Modern progressive city. Fine hunting, especially quail, doves and turkeys. World's greatest pecan center, and home of the St. Louis "Cardinals" minor league baseball training camp. Nearby is Radium Springs (largest in Georgia), a noted resort with a fine 18-hole golf course. Good hotels, maximum sunshine, hospitable folk.

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS, FLORIDA—A spring of purest water, hills and lakes. Golf, tennis, bowling.

APOPKA, FLORIDA—Near Orlando. Famous fresh water fishing. A center of the fern industry.

ARCADIA, FLORIDA—Ideally located on the beautiful Peace River in a citrus growing, canning and cattle sec-

tion. Good hunting, tourist recreations. A friendly resort appealing to retired folk. A wild life sanctuary at Myakka River State Park nearby.

AUGUSTA, GEORGIA—Second oldest city in Georgia (1735), where the charm of the old South, the progressive spirit of the New South and a delightful climate, have created a modern, hospitable winter resort. Augusta is an ideal convention city with modern hotels and a Municipal Auditorium, seating 5,000—one of the largest in the southeast. It is famous for golfing, with three superb 18-hole grass green courses, including the famous Augusta National Course and Club (Bobby Jones, President), host of the Masters' Tournament each spring. Tennis, cross country and path riding, hunting, fishing, athletic field and stadium, society circus, dances, barbecues, historic sites, beautiful old homes and gardens—a real "Garden City of the South". Splendid hotels and private inns, notably the Sheraton Bon-Air, Partridge Inn, and closer down-town, the Richmond and Plaza hotels.

AVON PARK, FLORIDA—A charming resort in the Scenic Highlands. Fishing, shooting, bathing, boating and golf. Good living accommodations; 25 lovely lakes within city limits, soft pure drinking water.

BABSON PARK, FLORIDA—In the Scenic Highlands, embowered with tropical fruits and greenery, atop the hills, overlooking beautiful Lake Caloosa, 8 miles from world-famous Singing Tower. Hunting, fishing, water sports. Site of Webber College.

BARTOW, FLORIDA—County seat of "Imperial" Polk County is a beautiful city, with fine park and civic center; numerous fresh-water lakes, fishing, golf.

BEAUFORT, SOUTH CAROLINA—On Beaufort River between Charleston, S. C., and Savannah, Ga. (reached from Yemassee, S. C., by C. & W. C. Ry). The site of the U. S. Marine Training Station on Parris Island. Hunting, good hotels. Ladies Island Country Club Golf Course.

BELLEAIR, FLORIDA—One of Florida's most beautiful winter resorts, overlooking the Gulf of Mexico's blue expanse. Famous for its clear temperate climate, its magnificent Belleview-Biltmore hotel, on its own spacious scenic estate, with a splendid golf course, swimming pool, bathing, fishing, trap and skeet shooting, bridle paths, and many other sports and diversions. Capacity 450 rooms.

BIRMINGHAM, ALABAMA—Atop Red Mountain is the "largest iron man in the world"—Birmingham made statue of Vulcan, mythical god of the forge, and fitting sentinel for the only place on earth where the essential ingredients for making steel—coal, iron and limestone—are present in large quantities. From the balcony of this statue spreads an inspiring panorama of blast furnaces, steel mills and other giant industrial activities which justify the slogan, "The South's greatest industrial city". In addition Birmingham offers cosmopolitan comforts, amusements and recreational facilities and a warm welcome to visitors.

THE BOCA RATON CLUB, BOCA RATON, FLORIDA

—Once the world's most fabulous private club and now, with complete facilities, a palatial resort hotel, the Boca Raton Club lies in tropical splendor conveniently between Palm Beach and Miami. The resort covers 1,000 flowered, landscaped acres and offers everything for winter enjoyment. An outstanding attraction of this fashionable and famous resort is the beautifully-decorated, double-decked Cabana colony, stretching along the club's magnificent ocean-front. Here buffet luncheons are served daily in the Coconut Grove, while an orchestra provides music for dancing. The Boca Raton Club also has two huge, sea-water swimming pools; its

own 18-hole championship golf course with Tommy Armour, "master of the iron," as pro; 9-hole pitch and putt courses; six patented tennis courts with an internationally-ranking pro; and a private fleet with Boca's own skippers for fishing the inland waters and the Gulf Stream, which lies only minutes away from the club's own dock. The Boca Raton Club opens each year on or about December 15 and closes May 1st.

BRADENTON, FLORIDA—A beautiful resort located on the Manatee River, within a short drive to the Gulf of Mexico and its fine beaches. Offers recreation in a municipally owned park in the heart of the city. Golf and an exceptionally fine country club. Splendid hotels and apartments. Protected yacht basin near business district. Nearby points of interest are the Ringling Museum, the DeSoto Monument, marking the spot where DeSoto landed; the Gamble Mansion, used by Judah P. Benjamin, Secretary of the Southern Confederacy as a last place of refuge in this country; Braden Castle and others. Splendid schools and churches. A good place to visit and establish a

home. Adjacent Manatee is an attractive community, rich in Seminole Indian Legends.

BRUNSWICK, GEORGIA—A beautiful seaport city, is the railroad station of the "Golden Islands of Georgia", famous for nearly 400 years as the "Golden Isles". On these historic islands, and along the coast are many important shrines—ruins of Spanish missions built as early as 1567, Bloody Marsh, scene of the first decisive battle of the Western World, and famous Colonial plantations. See also SEA ISLAND.

CASSELBERRY, FLORIDA—An attractive fast growing suburban community, 5 miles north of Winter Park (ACL RR Station) where bus meets trains on advice. An excellent hotel, Azalea Lodge, available for discriminating guests.

CHARLESTON, SOUTH CAROLINA—America's most historic city. Charleston "firsts" include: Museum (1773), library (1748), municipal college (1785), Chamber of Commerce (1773).

Old World streets meander along between lovely age-colored walls, relieved at intervals by graceful wrought iron gates of delicate design. Through these gates may be enjoyed fine views of lovely gardens, framing colonial buildings of merit. Charleston Gardens are world famous; "Magnolia," containing azaleas of every known variety (generally in perfect bloom in early April); a rare collection of "Carmellia Japonica" (in flower in early

March) and many fine specimens of "Magnolia Grandiflora," and Middleton Gardens, farther up the Ashley River, the first and finest example of formal Southern landscape gardening, laid out for Arthur Middleton, signer of the Declaration of Independence, by a famous English gardener, who employed 100 slaves for ten years in the work. Also 27 miles north of Charleston are the beautiful "Cypress Gardens," with hundreds of acres of cypress swamps and lakes, through which dikes and bridges have been built, along which a wide variety of tuberous plants have been set out, which, with azaleas and other flowers, are reflected in cypress studded lakes. Good hotels and boarding houses, golf, hunting, fishing, boating, ocean beaches, etc.

CLEARWATER, FLORIDA—is rightly named! It is practically surrounded by clear salt water—the Gulf of Mexico on the west and Old Tampa Bay on the eastward side. The city occupies a bluff, the highest coastal elevation in Florida. Clearwater provides excellent living accommodations, fine golf, lawn bowling, tennis, shuffleboard, boating, and exceptional fishing. Clearwater Beach, a beautiful stretch of white sand on the Gulf of Mexico, is dotted with pavilions, playgrounds and every facility for safe, enjoyable surf bathing, and is connected with the mainland by a free beautifully landscaped causeway, from which fishing is enjoyed. Clearwater has lovely streets, trees, and flowers, churches,

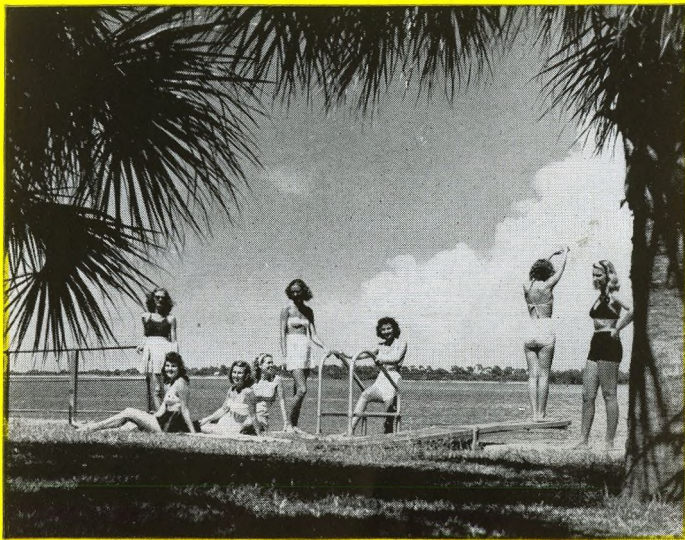

good schools, and library. Gorgeous orange and grapefruit groves are nearby. Clearwater offers every advantage for an enjoyable vacation or a year 'round home.

CLERMONT, FLORIDA—Highest elevated town in Florida, in south Lake County, famous big mouth Bass fishing country. Bathing, bowling, etc.

CLEWISTON, FLORIDA—On Lake Okeechobee. Hunting, fishing. Site of U. S. Sugar Corporation Mill and center of Everglades development.

COCOA, FLORIDA—A progressive small city of unusual beauty bordering the Indian River which is spanned by causeways and bridges providing access to an ocean beach splendid for driving and swimming. It is in the heart of the Indian River citrus country. Modern hotels, golf, bathing, fresh and salt water fishing.

CORAL GABLES, FLORIDA—Fast growing "City of Beautiful Homes", adjacent to Miami. Home of the University of Miami, Coral Gables is justly proud of its Mediterranean architecture, thriving business section,

excellent private and public schools. The City's southern portions border Biscayne Bay with bathing facilities at two beaches and a fresh water pool. Sports include golf, miles and miles of bridle paths, tennis and other healthful recreations. Tropical Park race track, operated by the Gables Racing Association, is 3 miles west of the city.

CRESCENT CITY, FLORIDA—Located amidst citrus groves and ancient oak trees on Lake Stella and Crescent. Shuffleboard, tennis, fishing, bathing.

CRYSTAL RIVER, FLORIDA—On the river near Gulf of Mexico. Fine fishing (River or Gulf), hunting (Duck, Dove, Quail, Turkey). Good restful hospitable hotels. Dunnellon or Inverness (on A.C.L.) are nearest railroad stations—both served by Atlantic Coast Line through trains from New York and Chicago.

DAVENPORT, FLORIDA—Among hills and lakes in Central Florida's citrus belt—modern citrus packing houses, canning plant and citrus candy factory. An excellent hotel, fine boating and fishing.

DAYTONA BEACH, FLORIDA—A modern all-year resort city with excellent tourist facilities. Site of the "World's Most Famous Beach", ideal for bathing and driving. A million dollar reinforced concrete and stone structure, provides an amusement center of unexcelled architectural beauty. An open air amphitheatre of

coquina rock seats 4,000 people on the edge of the ocean. Golf, tennis, lawn bowling, shuffleboard and boating facilities provide recreation. Deep sea, inland salt and fresh water fishing. A fishing tournament running from February 1st to November 30th.

DE LAND FLORIDA, "The Athens of Florida"—A beautiful residential city lying in a tropical setting 110 miles south of Jacksonville, on the main line of the Atlantic Coast Line. 4 miles from the St. Johns River, one of the leading large mouth bass streams in America. 23 miles eastward is fine surf bathing. Stetson University provides higher education and lends a cultural atmosphere soon noticed by visitors. Activities in music, art and literature are offered and visitors thus inclined will enjoy De Land. Moss covered oaks line the streets, while extensive orange groves cover the countryside. Hotels, apartments and homes offer accommodations to fit any pocketbook. Hunting, fishing, golf, tennis, bowling, shuffleboard.

DE LEON SPRINGS, FLORIDA—The clear gushing spring is beautiful. Bathing, fishing, hunting.

DELRAY BEACH, FLORIDA—A small, friendly community close by the ocean. Good hotels, bathing, fishing, shuffleboard, tennis, golf and polo.

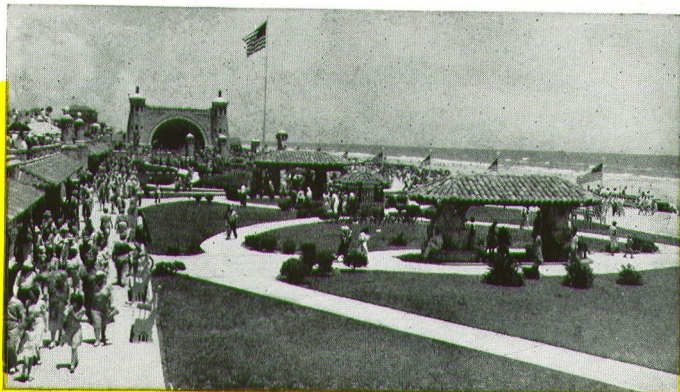
DUNEDIN, FLORIDA—Overlooking St. Joseph Sound and the Gulf. Home of the Professional Golfers Association National Golf Course. Modern hotels: The Fenway, Dunedin Hotel and Yacht Club Inn, all operated under owner-management. Tennis, roque, boating, fishing, hunting, etc. Protected yacht basin. With good schools and churches, and noted for its fine drinking water, there is no better place to visit or make one's home than Dunedin.

EAU GALLIE, FLORIDA—On the Indian and Banana rivers. Fishing and hunting. A fine land locked yacht harbor. Audubon Egrette rookery.

EUSTIS, FLORIDA—On the shores of Lake Eustis, Lake County, in the heart of the citrus belt. Elevation 125 feet. A gun club where the "Winter Vandalia" (National Trapshoot) is held during March, also weekly skeet shoots. Attractive recreation and boating centers on lake shore, baseball and football fields. Shuffleboard, tennis, horseshoes, fishing, hunting, golf. Florida Sportsmen's Exposition and Lake County Fair in March yearly. A good hotel. Short drive to the east coast beaches and Silver, Juniper, Alexander and Sanlando Springs.

EVERGLADES, FLORIDA—Lovely tropical village near "Ten Thousand Islands." Marvelous fishing.

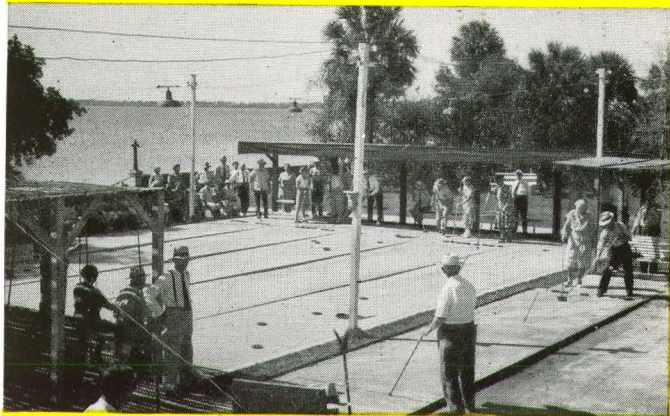

FAYETTEVILLE, NORTH CAROLINA—Is located on the eastern border of the Carolina "Sand Hills." Trains scheduled at convenient hours. Fort Bragg, great artillery post, and New Veterans' hospital are here. Golf, tennis, and good hotels.

FLORENCE, SOUTH CAROLINA—About midway between New York and Florida. Golf. Myrtle Beach may be reached by motor from Florence.

FORT LAUDERDALE, FLORIDA—Marvelous subtropical city directly on the Atlantic Ocean, the Gulf Stream, great equalizer of winter and summer climes, is just off shore. Lying between Palm Beach and Miami Beach, it is one of America's most favored resort areas. It is really an "American Venice." It has 100 miles of navigable waterways, some of which are provided by New and Middle Rivers, and their forks, the others man-made. These are beautifully landscaped. As a consequence, Ft. Lauderdale offers a safe haven for 400 yachts without crowding. A fleet of big game charter fishing boats is available, which with privately owned boats, ply the Gulf Stream waters off-shore. There are gardens, lovely drives, sightseeing boats, and every facility for sports and recreation. There are many hotels and apartment houses, and other accommodations. With all these attractions, Ft. Lauderdale is also the county seat of Broward County, noted as one of the most productive areas in Florida for winter vegetables. Don't overlook Ft. Lauderdale as a most desirable place to spend a winter, or a life time.

FORT MYERS, FLORIDA—"The City of Palms." Rivals the South Seas for tropical beauty, on the banks of the Caloosahatchee River, which flows into the Gulf of Mexico a few miles to the west, providing one of the world's finest and most extensive game fishing waters and is the Gulf entrance to Cross-state Canal. Tarpon fishing abound in the island passes. Excellent bathing beach. Good hotel accommodations. Golf, tennis, yachting, bathing, boating, hunting and splendid service to fishermen. Winter home and laboratories of the late Thomas A. Edison for 50 years, now open to the public. Home of new Thomas Alva Edison Junior College.

FORT PIERCE, FLORIDA—The Sunrise City, in the heart of the famed Indian River citrus section. Built along the shores of the beautiful river, facing a deep sea inlet. Surrounded by vast citrus groves and winter vegetable fields. Unexcelled sport fishing, yachting and charter boat facilities, lovely scenic drives, ocean beaches, good hotels, golf, tennis, shuffleboard.

GAINESVILLE, "Home of the University of Florida"—In the hills of north Central Florida. An ideal home city with beautiful shaded streets, fine schools, churches, and efficient government. Golf, tennis, fishing, bathing, hunting, football in season.

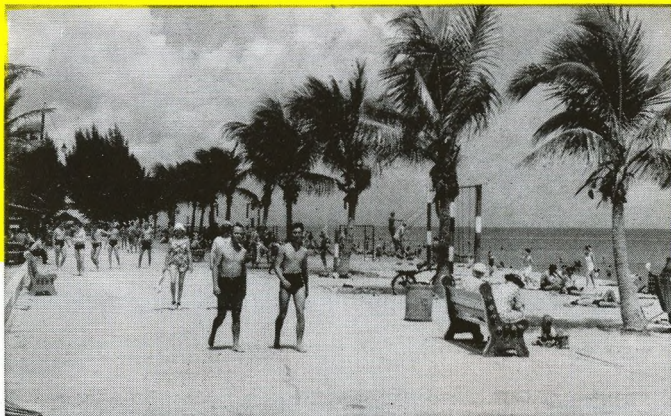

HAINES CITY, FLORIDA—In the Ridge section of south Central Florida, where citrus culture is at its best. Has many packing and canning plants. Good accommodations at the modern Clarendon Hotel, from whose roof garden may be seen the famous Bok Tower. Interesting short trips from Haines City include Cypress Gardens, Silver Springs, Dupree Gardens, Rainbow Springs, etc.

HAVANA, CUBA—Here you will discover an exotic city practically at your front door. Havana has all the charm and gaiety of a New World metropolis combined with the quaint fascination of Old Colonial Spain. You will enjoy seeing the magnificent public buildings, time-worn cathedrals, and the spacious parks filled with a profusion of lovely tropical flowers. World-famed big-game fishing, tennis, swimming, golf, etc., provide a wide variety of active sports. Havana's night life is known the world over for its cosmopolitan atmosphere. Excellent hotels with American standard of comfort, service and cuisine. P. & O. SS Co.'s beautiful "S. S. Florida" provides delightful overnight service between Miami and Havana, 2 sailings weekly in summer, 3 in winter. Restful, romantic, touristic, with tempting meals, dancing and other shipboard activities. A fleet of airplanes provide frequent fast flights between Miami, Havana, West Indies and South America.

HIGHLAND PARK, FLORIDA—Near Lake Wales. A private club, limited membership, with a fine club house, apartments, homes and a splendid golf course.

HOBE SOUND, FLORIDA—15 miles south of Stuart is a colony of beautiful estates extending down Jupiter Island between Hobe Sound and the sea, where occupants enjoy practically private beaches, yachting and fishing off shore. The Jupiter Island Club with its fine golf course and beach club is the center of activities.

HOLLYWOOD, FLORIDA—Directly on the ocean front, 17 miles north of Miami. An all year resort city with ample hotels, apartments and homes which may be rented fully furnished. The magnificent Hollywood Beach Hotel facing the sea is a complete resort. Six miles of bathing beach. The Gulf Stream makes ocean bathing delightful all winter. Riverside Military Academy, largest prep school in America, winter quarters here. Daily horse racing booked at nearby "Gulfstream Park" March 4 to April 20, 1949; 90 nights of dog racing at Hollywood Kennel Club during the 1948-49 season. Women's International Four Ball Golf Tournament to be held at Orange Brook Golf Club during February. The winter season Tropical Fiesta and the Annual Fishing Tournament running January 1 through March 31, 1949.

HOMOSASSA SPRINGS, FLORIDA—"Nature's Fish Bowl," and source of the Homosassa River, which enters the Gulf 9 miles away. Center of perhaps the finest unspoiled paradise for hunters, fishermen and nature lovers in America. But heretofore the least known. That's changed now! Mr. Oscar T. Johnson has purchased the *Homosassa Springs Hotel*, and transformed it into an ideal spot for sportsmen to hunt, fish, relax and "*Rough It DeLuxe*"—the kind of place

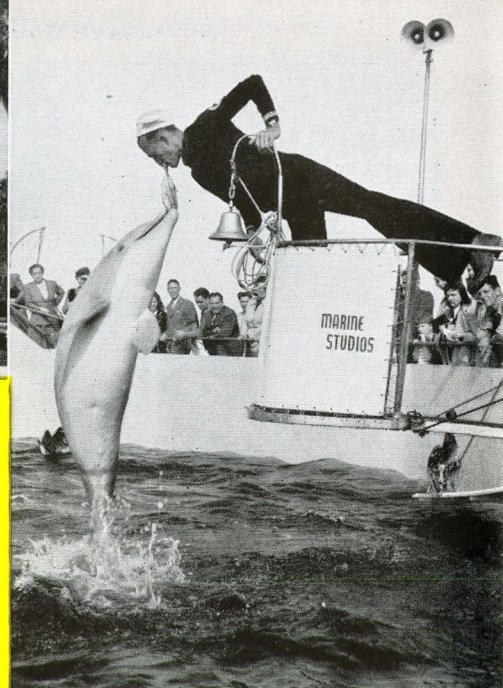
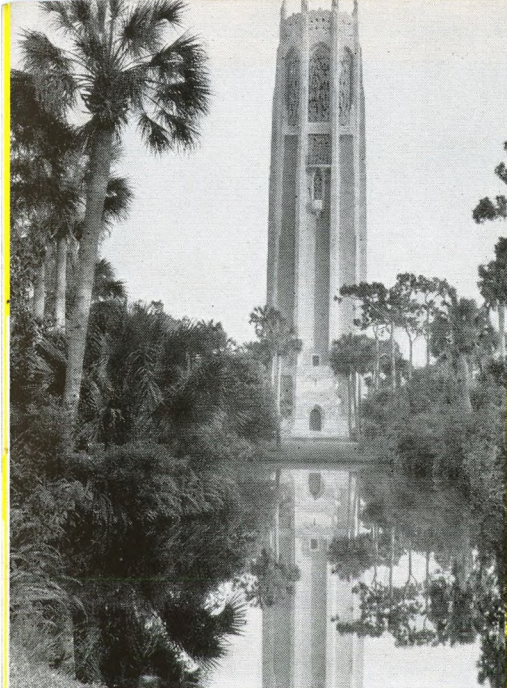

sportsmen's wives have always wished existed. Accommodations limited—50 guest rooms—advance reservations necessary. The best way to get there is via Atlantic Coast Line through trains from both New York and Chicago to Inverness, Florida (nearest station), where guests are met by hotel automobile.

INDIAN ROCKS, FLORIDA—A delightful resort, with a fine beach, fishing. Clearwater and St. Petersburg distance 8 and 17 miles respectively. Small but excellent, well located hotels.

INVERNESS, FLORIDA—Citrus County Seat. ACL R. R. station for Homosassa Springs Hotel. Golf, good hotels.

JACKSONVILLE, FLORIDA—Fast growing metropolis and gateway of the state. Located on the St. Johns River, 22 miles from its mouth, Jacksonville offers a fine climate, yachting, fishing, golf, metropolitan comforts and pastimes, and radiating live oak-embowered highways. Beautiful "Oriental Gardens" is nearby. Jacksonville is railroad station for

Jacksonville Beach, Atlantic and Neptune Beaches, also Ponte Vedra Beach (see latter), which are reached by motor from Jacksonville. The new Naval Air Base is 9 miles south of Jacksonville on ACL (Yukon Station) and St. Johns River.

JENSEN BEACH, FLORIDA—See Stuart, Fla.

KEY WEST, FLORIDA—Our southernmost city, 375 miles farther south than Cairo, Egypt. Here are what the United States Bureau of Fisheries calls the finest fishing grounds in the country; golf, bathing, a tropical aquarium, turtle crawls, sponge-fishing fleet docks, old forts. Hay fever sufferers (pollen-induced) find relief at Key West. The Florida Greyhound Lines offer frequent daily service between Miami and Key West, via the Overseas Highway, serving the Florida Keys' fishing camps along the way—Craig, Pigeon Key, Boca Chica, Marathon, Perky, etc. Through ticketing arrangements to Key West via Miami thence Florida Greyhound Lines. Daily round trips to Havana by air (40 minute flight.)

KISSIMMEE, FLORIDA—The "Cow Capital" of Florida, and presents the Southeast's only International Rodeo annually. Is on Lake Tohopekaliga, offers visitors interesting tropical jungle trips by lake and rivers. Hunting, fishing, golf.

LAKE ALFRED, FLORIDA—Amidst lakes and citrus fruit groves. Bathing beach, fishing, hunting.

LAKE PLACID, FLORIDA—Beautifully located in rolling country with many lakes and extensive citrus groves. Hotel accommodations. The Southwinds Club, operated as a hotel, provides the best in water, food, club atmosphere and social life with golf, boating, bathing and fishing.

LAKE WALES, FLORIDA—According to the U. S. Geological survey, Iron Mountain, in Mountain Lake Reservation, one mile from Lake Wales, is the highest point in the state—324.9 feet. Atop this mountain is the famous Mountain Lake Sanctuary and "Singing Tower".

LAKELAND, FLORIDA—A beautiful city (with 37,000 permanent residents) set amidst lovely evergreen trees, citrus groves and sparkling fresh water lakes in the healthful high "ridge section" of Florida. Crisp sunlit winter days enable visitors to enjoy sail boating, fishing, golf, tennis, lawn bowling and other outdoor sports. Good hotels and other living accommodations. The new Lake Morton Apartments will be open this winter offering 72 apartments, 3 and 4 rooms, reasonable rentals and provides all facilities, including automatic laundry, for occupants. Lakeland is the home of Southern College, an outstanding educational institution; also the Brotherhood Home of Carpenters and Joiners of America. It is the center and headquarters of Florida's amazing citrus industry. Lakeland is an ideal place to make headquarters and visit the many nearby attractions, Cypress Gardens, Tarpon Springs, Bok Tower and the world's largest phosphate mines, etc.

"LAKE REGION," FLORIDA—A lovable, livable section of Florida, between Sanford, Leesburg, Altoona and Clermont. Neighborly small cities and towns such as Apopka, Altoona, Astatula, Clermont, Eustis, Fruitland Park, Groveland, Howey, Lady Lake, Leesburg, Mascotte, Minneola, Montverde, Mount Dora, Mt. Plymouth, Oakland, Sorrento, Tavares, Umatilla, and Winter Garden surrounded by citrus groves, vineyards, ferneries, hills, tropical forests, golf courses, home-decorated hills, and countless fresh water lakes cover the area. 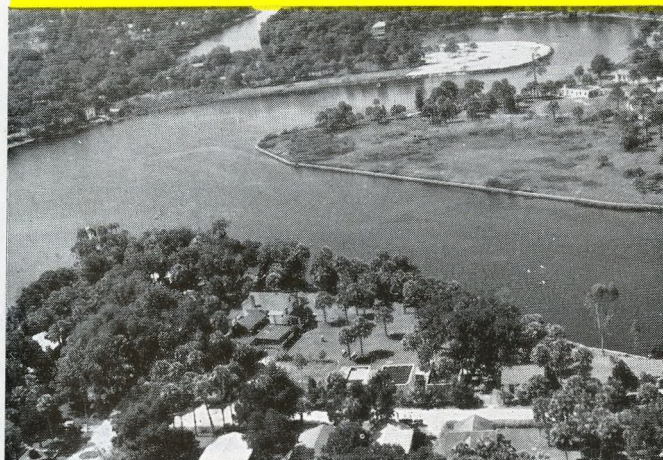
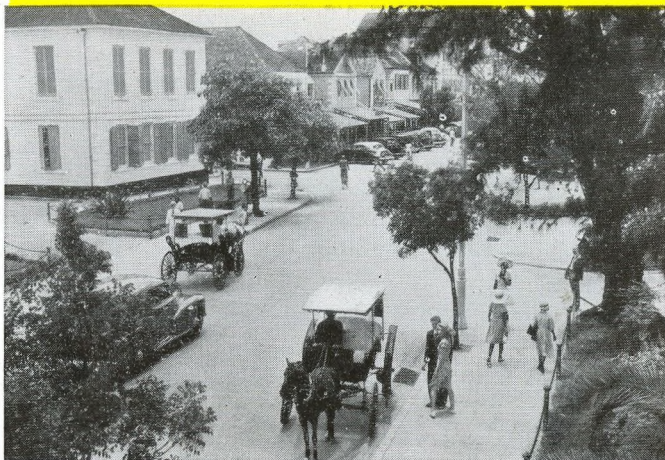

Only a few minutes over new million-dollar causeway to Atlantic Ocean bathing beaches. Good hotels and guest homes. Cottages and apartments for winter and summer vacationists. 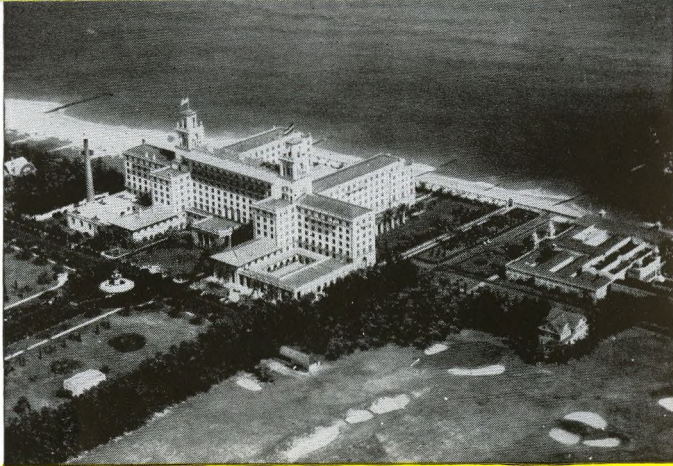

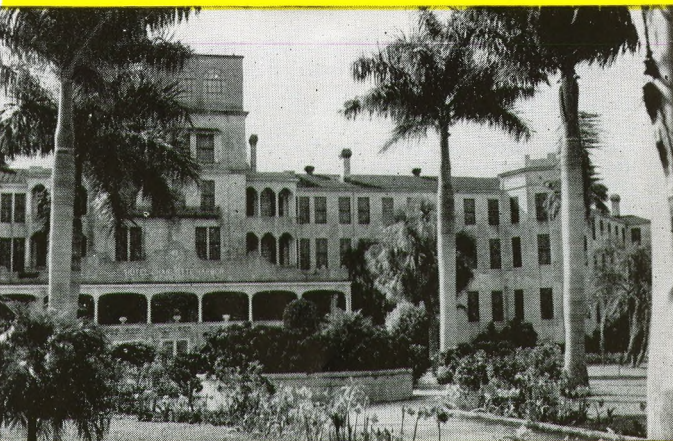

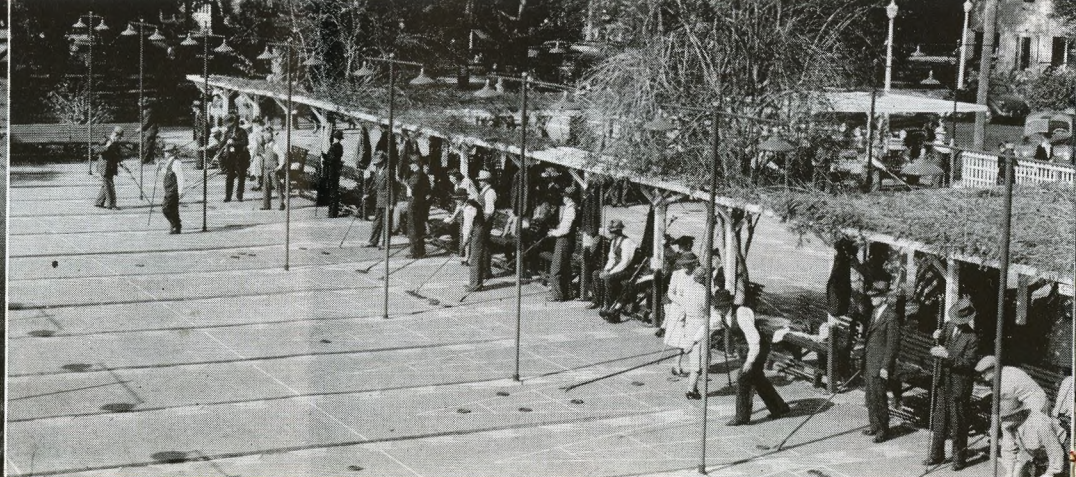

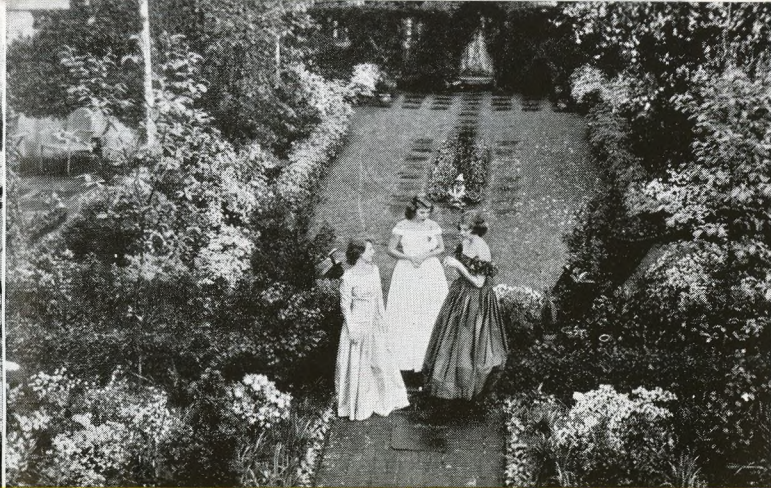

See its classic Capitol (designed by Jefferson), the White House of the Confederacy, Battle Abbey, Old St. John's Church, where Patrick Henry delivered his deathless "Liberty or Death" oration, the

SAVANNAH, GEORGIA'S BIRTHPLACE—Founded by General Oglethorpe in 1733. As a quick refuge from Indian or Spanish attacks, "Squares" were provided. These are now beautiful parks at street intersections. Savannah offers visitors an ideal all year climate. Proximity of ocean and gulf stream eliminate temperature extremes. Gorgeous scenic drives, out-of-door sports with 3 golf courses. SUMMERVILLE, SOUTH CAROLINA—Fifteen miles paved roads from ACL Charleston Station is Summerville, Carolina's famous "Flower Town." Flowers and pine trees follow its winding streets into ozone-laden forests. Golf and hunting. Excellent hotels.

and horseshoe pitching. The city maintains a Tourist Center all the year on the banks of the picturesque Hillsborough River. Racing fans enjoy Dog Racing from late December, and Horse Racing at Sunshine Park starts in January. The Florida State Fair (largest winter exposition in the world) will be held February 1 to 12 inclusive. Tampa's famous and unique Gasparilla Pirate Festival will be held during the week of February 7. The Latin-American Fiesta in April presents gayly costumed señoritas and caballeros in rumbas and tangos to lilting Spanish love songs. The towering minarets of the University of Tampa, the most striking example of Moorish architecture in America, lend an exotic flavor to the city's skyline.

Sightseeing opportunities are many: To the nearby beaches, to Hillsborough State Park, and to beautiful Dupree Gardens, "The Blossom Center of Florida". This former private estate offers a main garden of 25 acres containing over 10,000 azaleas and a profusion of gardenias, japonicas, roses and great beds of spring flowers in gorgeous bloom. Go to Tampa by train.

TARPON SPRINGS, FLORIDA—Located on Spring Bayou, Anclote River and Gulf of Mexico. Served by through trains from Chicago, New York, etc. Excellent accommodations, including The Upham House, in its own gulf-bordered tract of 125 acres. Ideal for rest, relaxation, hunting, fishing, boating and golf. New Port Richey and Weekiwachee Spring are respectively 8 and 30 miles north of Tarpon Springs, which is their nearest railroad station.

TAVARES, FLORIDA—County seat of Lake County, with its 1,400 bass infested fresh water lakes. Excellent fishing, hunting, bathing.

VERO BEACH, FLORIDA—County seat of Indian River County, center of production and shipment of famous Indian River oranges and grapefruit. McKee Jungle Gardens, a wonderland of native and exotic tropical growth is 3 miles south. Ocean bathing, golf, fine fishing.

WARM SPRINGS, GEORGIA—Born in an earthquake eons ago, one of the miracle springs of the world—still gushing 1,809 gallons of warm, healing water a minute. Here Franklin D. Roosevelt regained his vigor to become our war President, and as a great humanitarian started the Warm Springs Foundation for treating the nation's afflicted children.

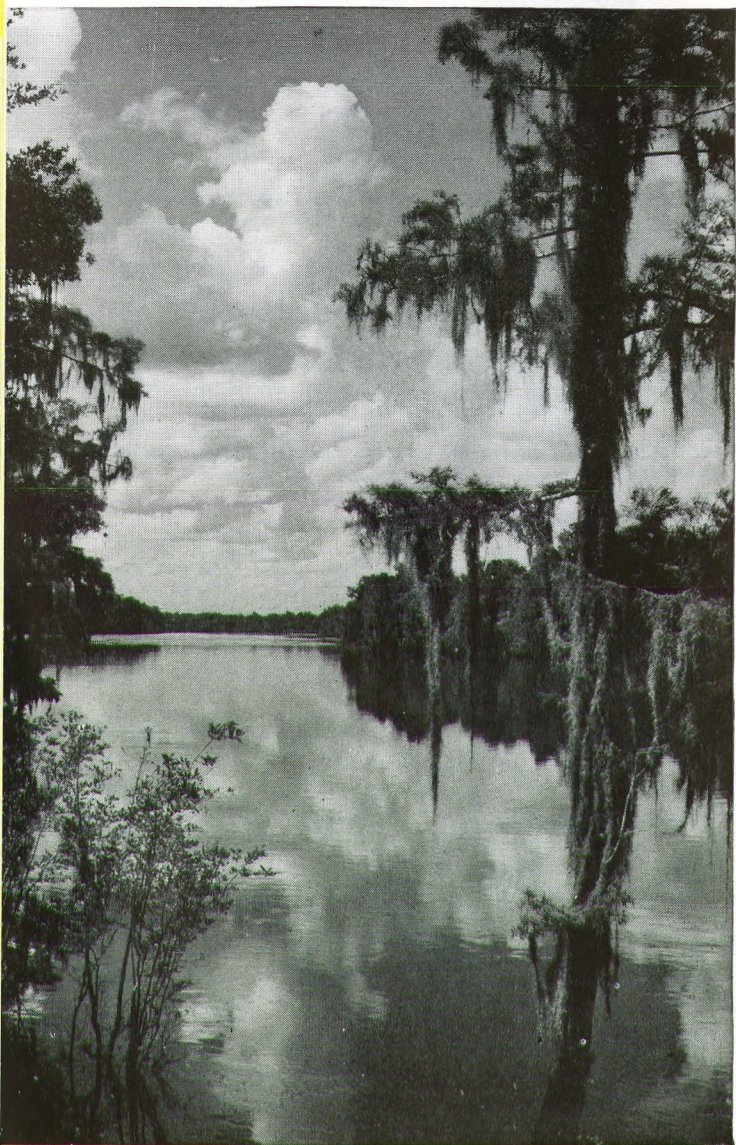

Warm Springs is about 75 miles south of Atlanta (on ACL RR) and a good, all-year hotel, The Warm Springs (Mr. F. W. Allcorn, Jr., Owner-Manager), offers excellent service.

WAYCROSS, GEORGIA—Gateway to the Okefenokee. In the heart of the world's richest naval stores belt and the famous Georgia-Florida flue-cured tobacco belt. Waycross has developed an entrance to Okefenokee Swamp, "Land of Trembling Earth". Okefenokee Swamp Park, seven miles south of Waycross, is open to visitors every day in the year, offering boat cruises along the headwaters of the romantic Suwannee River. Okefenokee, a 600-square mile natural wonderland, is a federal wildlife refuge, harboring many forms of plant, animal

and bird life that are threatened with extinction in other parts of the world.

WEEKIWACHEE SPRING, FLORIDA—Florida's newest attraction and the world's first underwater theater (capacity 100) from which may be viewed and photographed (bring your camera): Talented swimmers presenting the underwater adagio and other graceful and photogenic ballet numbers. Action: "In" (not "On") a transparent stage of magical beauty and splendor. Backdrops: An underwater mountain, ravines, canyons and exotic marine life. Lighting: Crystal clear, sky-blue water. Location: 30 miles north of Tarpon Springs (ACL Station) on U. S. West Coast highway 19. Brooksville is 12 miles east of the Spring.

WEST PALM BEACH, FLORIDA—Across Lake Worth from famous Palm Beach, this City of 45,000, long recognized as one of Florida's leading winter resorts, is now one of its popular summer vacation spots. A kindly all-year climate is provided by the trade winds, warmed in winter and cooled in summer by the Gulf Stream, which flows close to the shore. Guarded public beaches may be reached by three free bridges connecting West Palm Beach with Palm Beach. Deep sea fishing, with charter boats available is highlighted by the Annual Silver Sailfish Derby in late January. Additional contests offer trophies for other deep-sea, tidewater and fresh water fish abounding in these waters. Tournaments in tennis, golf, shuffleboard, boating and horsemanship are scheduled. WILMINGTON, NORTH CAROLINA—Progressive Colonial city and state port. Noted for its gardens, Airlie, Greenfield Park and Orton Plantation—spring blooming season, but interesting all year. Practically over-night by train from New York, Washington, Atlanta and Florida. Golf, tennis, fishing, bathing on several nearby beaches. Good hotels and a cordial welcome await visitors.

WILSON, NORTH CAROLINA—The world's largest Bright Leaf Tobacco Market. Tobacco auction sales (open to the public) are held from about mid-August to mid-November. An interesting sight. Golf, tennis.

WINTER HAVEN, FLORIDA—"City of 100 Lakes", 221 feet above sea level. Produces and ships annually one-tenth of Florida's huge citrus crop. Florida Cypress Gardens, one of the South's finest gardens and mecca for camera fans, is nearby. Annual "Florida Citrus Exposition" held in February. New this season: Shuffleboard Clubhouse, football stadium, amphitheater on beautiful Silver Lake shore—seating 2,500. Home of Radio Station WSIR, community playhouse, Elks Club, Moose Club, etc. Sportsmen's Club has two fish rearing pools, and stocks Winter Haven lakes with bass and bream in addition to state hatchery stocking. Winter Haven is an ideal home city for the average American family.

WINTER PARK, FLORIDA—Situated on the main line of the Atlantic Coast Line, is surrounded by clear fresh-water lakes teeming with bass. Has a beautiful system of well-kept parks. Well-paved streets and roads, splendid homes and tropical plants and shrubs in profusion. Rollins College, located here, affords high-class educational advantages and attracts many visitors. Ample hotel accommodations. Musicals, lectures, art exhibits, etc., are given during the season. Truly lives up to its slogan—"A City of Homes."

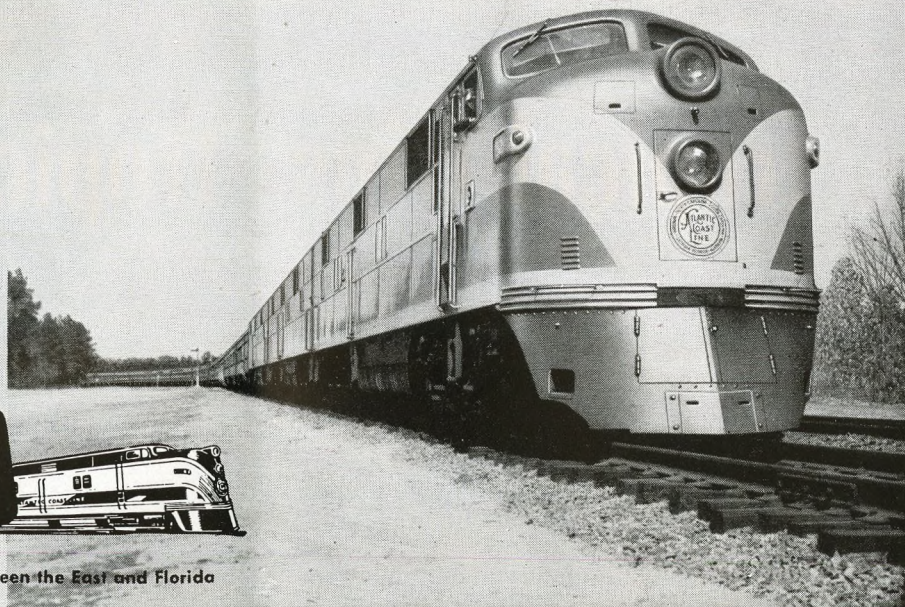
