



FLORIDA IN WINTER

S a Winter Resort, Florida is unique, requiring comparison with no other resort region at home or abroad, for it is incomparable—the most popular winter playground of the American people.

There are three reasons for this—(1) Proximity to the centers of population; (2) Unexcelled mildness and equability of climate; (3) Complete development of every form of winter sport.

Surf-bathing and Winter Golf here reach their apotheosis. Nowhere in the civilized world is there such a continuous stretch of perfect bathing beaches. Hundreds of miles long, in fact the entire shore-line of Florida is an almost continuous beach, ideal for bathing and other water sports. Then too there is the delightful interior hill country with its picturesque lakes—an environment to meet every preference.

In a sub-tropical setting of orange blossoms, poinsettias and waving palms, with its blue skies and bluer seas, shot through with sunshine like nowhere else, Florida calls the winter visitor from the frozen north to its more kindly clime.

The Southland or The Flamingo—the way to go

No matter where in Florida the visitor is bound, the through Pullmans on The Southland or The Flamingo will take him there—to St. Petersburg, Tampa, Bradenton, Sarasota, Tarpon Springs, Clearwater or Bellaire on The Southland—to Jacksonville, Miami, West Palm Beach, St. Augustine, Daytona, Lakeland, Punta Gorda or Ft. Myers on The Flamingo.

The route of The Southland is over the Pennsylvania Railroad from Chicago, Detroit (the Wabash to Ft. Wayne) and Cleveland, crossing the Ohio at Cincinnati thence over the Louisville and Nashville Railroad through the rolling blue-grass country of Kentucky and the Tennessee Mountains (by daylight) to Atlanta, the Central of Georgia to Albany and thence the Atlantic Coast Line to the various Florida West Coast destinations via the short Perry Cut-off.

The Flamingo travels a similar route from Chicago all the way to Albany, Ga., and thence to Jacksonville where direct connections are made to every part of Florida including through sleeping car service from Chicago to the more important resort destinations on the Florida East Coast and in the Central Lake Region.

Schedules of The Southland and The Flamingo will be found on pages 14 and 16 of this folder together with particulars of the equipment carried on each train.

Thomasville, Ga., is famous for its mild winter climate, good roads, pine forests and flowers. The 9-hole golf course and club house are popular during the winter months. Being a real land of flowers, Thomasville well deserves the name it bears, "City of Roses." It is surrounded by large and beautiful estates.

WEST COAST

After leaving Thomasville, The Southland immediately enters Florida and approaches the West Coast over the new, short line through Perry. The West Coast, fronting on the Gulf of Mexico, is for the most part considerably above sea level, the coast line being indented with a number of bays.

Hampton Springs, reached by using The Southland to Perry, is a well-known mineral spring resort located on a branch of the Fenholloway River among forests of pines, live oaks, magnolias and palms. Its attractions include splendid fishing, hunting, golf, tennis, motor boating, saddle horses and an attractive club house.

Tarpon Springs is one of the most popular hunting, golfing and fishing resorts in the State. Its famous springs are valued for their beauty and pure water bubbling from unknown depths and changing their rate of flow with the tides. The eighteen-hole golf course has a most attractive setting.

Clearwater has the highest elevation of any coastal city in Florida. Its beautiful Tourist Park, overlooking both Tampa Bay and the Gulf, has practically every form of outdoor recreation. The gorgeous sunsets from this unusual spot are a source of neverending wonder and delight. Fishing, golfing and surf-bathing are excellent and the climate is equable and delightful.

Belleair is the most noted of the resorts on the Pinellas Peninsula and is one of society's favorite gathering places. Ideally located on a high bluff, Belleair enjoys the salt breezes mingled with the resinous atmosphere of the pines.

St. Petersburg is the most frequented resort on the West Coast. It is known as the "Sunshine City," owing to the very few days in which the sun fails to beam. It has abundant hotel accommodations, boarding-houses and cottages of all sizes, with prices to suit everyone. Its location is ideal, on the east side of the Pinellas Peninsula, fronting Tampa Bay. St. Petersburg is preeminently a place of outdoor pleasures. Golf, baseball, tennis, boating, motoring, etc., claim the visitor according to his taste. The fishing is unexcelled, and there is game of every variety.

Tampa is the third city in the State, with large and growing commerce and manufacturing interests. It is situated at the head of Hillsboro Bay, an arm of Tampa Bay, with the Hillsboro River running through the center of the city. Its excellent hotels provide ample and luxurious accommodations for its many visitors. Fishing constitutes one of the leading attractions of Tampa Bay and its surrounding waters. Boats, guides and equipment are always available. Many excursions to interesting and beautiful places around the bay may be made by boat.

Bradenton is one of the most delightful spots in southern Florida. It is situated on a bluff on the south side of the Manatee River, where woodland and water attractions combine.

Sarasota has long been a place of renown among sportsmen. It is situated on Sarasota Bay, a beautiful, sheltered harbor twelve miles long, on the banks of which are many fine winter residences.



EAST COAST

The East Coast of Florida, served by The Flamingo, has been described as a delightful park extending all the way from Jacksonville to Miami. And then, within easy distance, are the attractions of Key West, the Bahamas and Cuba.

Jacksonville is a beautiful and modern city in which thousands of tourists spend the Winter. The St. Johns River, upon which yachting is a favorite sport, flows northeast to the Atlantic Ocean, twenty-two miles away. Numerous good hotels, excellent theatres, wide boulevards, well-kept lawns, and splendid roads leading from the city in all directions, the latter shaded by giant live oaks festooned with veils of gray Spanish moss, justify the pride displayed by the citizens of Jacksonville in their city.

St. Augustine, the oldest of white settlements in the United States, was discovered by Juan Ponce, Knight of Leon, in the year 1513, while the old explorer was seeking the fabled Fountain of Youth.

The three picturesque golf courses in St. Augustine are in convenient locations, and one of them is partially surrounded by old Fort Marion and the sea wall, with the old city gates close by, and the Atlantic Ocean in full view.

Ormond, a short distance south of St. Augustine, is an ideal all-year resort. Attractions include an eighteen-hole golf course, one of the very best in Florida, bathing, river excursions and excellent resort hotel accommodations.

Daytona Beach, five miles south of Ormond, possesses all the charms of a seaside resort and offers the accommodations of a modern metropolis. It has long been widely celebrated as the center of the motor-racing sport of Florida.

Surf-bathing is a favorite pastime at Daytona Beach and Seabreeze. Golf, baseball, tennis, trap-shooting, hunting, etc., are other forms of recreation that are well provided for here.

Palm Beach presents the world's most pretentious fashion display. It is the playground of hundreds of wealthy Americans and titled folks from across the seas. Its hotels are the most fashionable and most frequented. Palm Beach is on a strip of land between Lake Worth and the Atlantic Ocean. The former is a tidal lagoon of sufficient size to make an ideal harbor for yachts and for boating pleasures of all varieties, including motor-boat races.

West Palm Beach, the beautiful and rapidly growing resort city, situated on the mainland opposite the world-noted Palm Beach, has all the charm of the latter resort.

Miami is said to have the most equable climate in the world. The water at the beaches is always warm, due to the constant sunshine and the Gulf Stream two miles off shore. Sea-bathing is enjoyed every day in the year on the sandy, gently sloping beach. At Miami Beach there are two polo fields, where many spirited contests between noted players are held during the season.

Miami has several excellent golf courses and scores of modern hotels and apartment houses.

And south of Miami, across a massive viaduct, with the ocean on either side, lies **Key West**, the point "farthest south" in the United States. At **Long Key** and **Pirates Cove**, the ancient rendezvous of the buccaneers, are real fishing camps, where social life, different from that of the Palm Beach and St. Augustine hotels, may be enjoyed by those who would get close to Nature in its wilder moods.

While the foregoing describes the largest East Coast resorts, there are countless other delightful places, among which may be

mentioned New Smyrna, one of the oldest settlements in the State, with good hotels and comfortable lodgings. The sports include golf, boating of every description on the Indian River and the pleasures of the beach, a short distance away. From New Smyrna southward, through the Indian River country, are some of the most charming spots in all Florida. Of these, Titusville, a progressive commercial center and Cocoa-Rock-ledge, occupying one of the most picturesque situations on the Indian River, are favorite resorts. In almost unbroken line are other good resorts, all enjoying attractions of conceded merit—Sea Island Beach, Ga., Eau Gallie, Melbourne, Sebastian, Stuart, Fort Pierce, Fort Lauderdale and Hollywood, Fla.

Havana, the interesting Capital of Cuba, with its intriguing foreign atmosphere, is quickly reached by steamer from Key West or Port Tampa, or by air from Miami.

CENTRAL LAKE REGION

Between Jacksonville, Lakeland and Tampa is a continuous succession of popular resorts—Green Cove Springs, Ocala, Gainesville, De Land, Orange City, Winter Haven, Lake Wales, Mountain Lake and Sebring.

Palatka is the starting point for the famous Ocklawaha River trip to Silver Springs, one of the most fascinating boat trips in the world. The trip of 120 miles requires twenty hours. Silver Spring covering three acres is so clear that the bottom, one hundred feet below the surface, is plainly visible.

Sanford, on Lake Monroe, is a thriving little city with all modern improvements, and is practically the head of navigation of the St. Johns River. Fishing and golfing are excellent and the surrounding country is picturesque and interesting.

Winter Park is a well-known resort in the lake region. An excellent college is located here. All outdoor sports are enjoyed throughout the season. It has two sporty eighteen-hole golf courses.

Orlando is a pleasant little city, delightfully situated in the midst of a group of lakes, about whose shores are golf courses and winter residences. Hunting in the near-by woodlands is excellent. Orlando is the county seat of Orange County, which leads the State in the production of oranges and grapefruit.

Eustis is a favorite with lovers of water sports, being accessible to six large, interchangeable, navigable, clear-water lakes. It boasts of one of the best golf courses in Florida.

Kissimmee is charmingly situated on Lake Tohopekaliga. It is a delightful place for a winter residence. Some of the best hunting and fishing in the State is found in the woods and shallow waters in this vicinity. The many outdoor amusements include two splendid golf courses.


Lakeland appeals to those enjoying a lake resort, there being nine within its corporate limits, assuring excellent fishing, boating and bathing. Hunting and golf are other favorite sports. Practically every recreational and pleasure facility is provided.

Other resorts include Bartow, Arcadia, Punta Gorda, and Boca Grande.

Fort Myers is historical and interesting, and the attractions of the surrounding country are legion. It is situated on the Caloosahatchie River, fourteen miles from the Gulf.

Naples, most southerly of the West Coast resorts, is a short distance below Charlotte Harbor, and has many attractions.


