The morning and afternoon Puget Sounders between Seattle and Vancouver, B. C., are air-conditioned trains carrying coaches, parlor or observation-cafe parlor cars and dining cars. Local trains Nos. 356 and 357 carry coaches only. Convenient connections are made in Everett for Chicago and East,

via the streamlined, diesel-powered Empire Builder, and in Seattle with trains to Portland, Oregon, and California. The Afternoon Puget Sounder from Vancouver also connects with the Oriental Limited in Everett for St. Paul, Minneapolis and Chicago.

### Proportionate Fares Between All Local Points

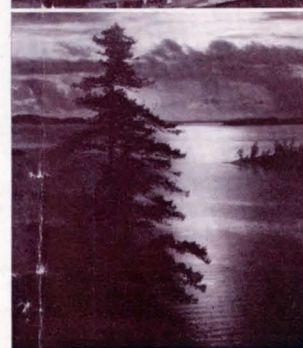
