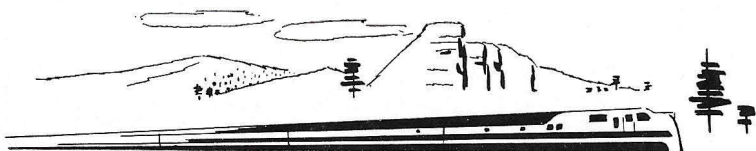

GREAT NORTHERN FOLLOWS HISTORIC TRAILS through LAND OF SCENIC THRILLS

The scenic and historic route of the Great Northern Railway stretches westward from Chicago 2,211 miles to the inland seaports of the Pacific Northwest. From Chicago to Saint Paul and Minneapolis the route is that of the Burlington Lines for 300 miles along the Mississippi River.

From the Twin Cities Great Northern's main line swings westward through three time zones, over two major mountain ranges, along the border of Glacier National Park in Montana, America's second largest and only national park on the main line of a transcontinental railway, and through Cascade Tunnel, longest tunnel in the Western Hemisphere, eight miles long, arrow straight, cement lined and electric-lighted. Rich agricultural, mining, cattle and lumber empires pass in ultimate review to the shores of Puget Sound.

Great Northern's two famous fleets of daily passenger trains—the completely modern and streamlined Empire Builder and the diesel-powered Oriental Limited—provide swift and comfortable service over this far-flung rail route.
