## INTERNATIONAL PEACE ARCH

The International Peace Arch, shown on the front cover of this menu, was erected on the United States-Canada boundary in a flower-filled park near Blaine, Washington, to commemorate 100 years of peace between Canada and the United States.

Dedicated in 1914 by Marshal Joffre, the massive structure, flying the Stars and Stripes and the Union Jack side by side, symbolizes the long-standing friendship between the peoples of the two nations in simple inscriptions, "*Children of a Common Mother*", and "*Brethren Dwelling Together in Unity*".

At impressive ceremonies held annually, thousands of school children from both sides of the border, as well as adults, visit the shrine to renew the pledge of friendship that binds the two countries in peace and harmony.

## ALONG EVERGREEN SHORES

The route of the new streamlined INTERNATIONALS winds along forested shores, washed by the blue tidal waters of Puget Sound, for many of the 155 miles between Seattle, Washington, and Vancouver, British Columbia.

The snow-crested Olympic Range lies northwest of Seattle, and the jagged Cascades, dominated by the white cone of 10,750-foot Mount Baker, are to be seen from the car windows.

For 75 miles between these mighty ranges, the Internationals follow the shore line of Puget Sound, busy traffic way for ships bound for Alaska, the Orient and every port of the world. Your streamliner passes through some of the richest farming land in America, where fertile soil and warm coastal rains produce several crops of vegetables in a single season.

Palatial yachts, pleasure cruisers and hundreds of small fishing craft can be seen during most of the year threading the narrow passages of the San Juan Islands—172 in all. Clustered off the Mount Vernon-Bellingham shore, some are rich with green forests, others are barren tide-washed rocks.

Just an hour's ride north of the United States-Canada border is bustling, growing Vancouver, crossroads of Western Canada commerce, its deep harbor circled by mountains.
