Leave ST. PAUL, MINN.7:50 am

We sail at 9:00 from Seattle on the S. S. Alaska, for the "Land of the Midnight Sun."

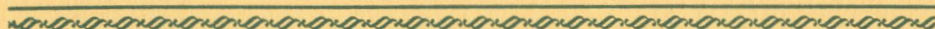

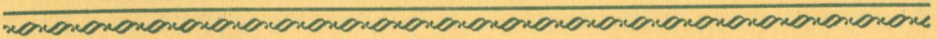

The Agricultural Empire

AGRICULTURE along the Northern Pacific Railway is the basic industry. On both nonirrigated and irrigated farms Nature's gifts of soil and climate make possible a diversified production to supply not only this section's extensive mining and lumber camps, thriving cities and towns, but also the national and international markets, which receive many Northwest food products.

Through Minnesota one sees particularly the dairy farms, potato and cornfields and farm flocks of sheep. This is the No. 1 state in output of butter, one of the four leading corn producers and an important contributor to supplies of Cobbler, Early Ohio and Triumph potatoes grown on sandy lands, peat ground and loamy soils of the Red River Valley.

While North Dakota's bonanza grain outfits of earlier days have yielded to smaller, more intensively worked units, this state still leads the nation in spring wheat and flax, is near the top with rye and barley and stands second only to Maine in certified

seed potato acreage. Diversifying with sheep and cattle has become a byword and there now are over a million sheep on North Dakota farms.

Montana's vast stretches of native forage grass contribute largely to the nation's lamb, beef and wool supplies. On her million and a half irrigated acres along the Yellowstone and other rivers, sugar beets, navy beans, seed peas, alfalfa, grains, cows and poultry flourish.

Passing Northern Idaho productive cut-over country, one enters Washington, popularly known as the largest apple growing state, but actually the home also of many other agricultural pursuits. In eastern Washington, the extensive soft wheat producers, navy beans and field peas. In central Washington, particularly the Yakima Valley, tree fruits, vegetables, livestock, dairy and poultry on irrigated farms. In western Washington, luxuriant pastures, vegetables, berries, specialty crops, hundreds of dairy and poultry units.
