Around the World In Thirty-Five Days

UP to the present the record was thirty-nine days. Mr. Mears started from the New York Sun office, New York City, at 12:43 A. M., July 2, 1913. He went by way of London, St. Petersburg, Mukden, Fusan, Yokohama, Victoria, Seattle, St. Paul and Chicago.

Twice he missed regular connections, once owing to a washout in the Ural Mountains, Russia, and again because of heavy fog at Victoria, B.C. In the latter case he used an aeroplane to help him out. The Northern Pacific brought Mr. Mears into St. Paul on the North Coast Limited on time. He reached Chicago on the same train on time. Mr. Mears said "Am certainly strong for the Northern Pacific dining car service. It is excellent and I consider it the best in the world."
