




THE CLASS K4s · 1914

THE LOCOMOTIVES ON OUR COVER

The railroads' search for better locomotives never ceases.

Down through the years, the Pennsylvania Railroad's contribution to the steady development of more powerful locomotives is an achievement of which it is justifiably proud.

Below, for your enjoyment, are thumbnail descriptions of the illustrations on the cover.

- JOHN BULL—Oldest locomotive preserved in the United States today, made its trial run on November 12, 1831. Built in England, it was locomotive No. 1 of the Camden & Amboy Railroad, now part of the Pennsylvania.
- TIOGA—Norris-built in Philadelphia, 1848, for the Philadelphia & Columbia Railroad, which was purchased by the Pennsylvania in 1857. Engine was noted for its freight hauling capacity.
- CLASS P (D11a)—Built at Altoona, 1883. This locomotive was designed for heavy express passenger service on PRR divisions where hard coal was used as fuel. So successful were they, they were adapted to other divisions where bituminous coal was used.
- class G4a—In 1899, the ten-wheeled type locomotive was adopted, to a limited extent, by the PRR for service on heavy grades east of Pittsburgh. A number of these large ten-wheelers were built at Altoona, and some by the Baldwin Works in 1900.
- CLASS K4s—Original, built at Altoona in May 1914, was duplicated in great numbers. The K4s was the PRR's standard express passenger locomotive and some remained in service until 1957.

 One of these famed locomotives is on permanent exhibition at Horseshoe Curve, near Altoona, Pa.
- **GG1**—First constructed in 1934, these high-powered electrics haul passenger and freight trains in PRR's electrified territory.

 The GG1's make up the most famous and successful electric locomotive fleet in the world.
- CLASS EP-40—The first road passenger Diesel-electric locomotive on the Pennsylvania. Diesel-electric locomotives opened a new chapter in American railroading. By the end of 1957 complete Dieselization and electrification was a reality after more than a century of steam power history.
- **E44**—The first of these electric freight units was delivered and placed in service in 1960. There will be a total of 66. Each locomotive develops 4,400 horsepower. Top speed is 70 mph.
- **GF-25**—Twenty-nine of these high-speed Diesel-electric freight locomotives haul fast freight trains west of Harrisburg, Pa. Unit develops 2,500 horsepower.
