

Journey of Adventure

IT was January and bitter cold. The year 1846 and the scene was Nauvoo, Illinois, where a band of Mormons was setting forth to find the New Zion of their dreams.

The company was composed of men, women and children, with ten wagons of provisions and such household goods as could be accommodated. Where were they going? The exact location was still a mystery as they fared forth toward the west; exiles to a strange land.

That night, out on the bleak prairie, they made camp under a leaden sky. No friendly light from nearby farm-houses gave cheer to the homeless wanderers. The number of the brave was fewer than when they started; only the most stalwart now plowed through spring storms and knee-high mud following Fremont's Trail toward the setting sun. Rations were issued as food became scarce: "each one a biscuit a day and all the sego roots he could dig."

Day after day the struggle continued. One hundred and forty-three survivors now remained. Only super-human fortitude could conquer what lay ahead as deep gorges gave way to rock-bound canyons and precipitous mountain walls forbade further progress.

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It was the latter part of July, 1847, when the primeval silence of ages was broken by the rumbling of a caravan as it threaded its way along an overhanging ledge.

Emerging from the ravine, ahead lay a sun-kissed valley with majestic mountains rearing their proud fronts heavenward; while in the distance slumbered the blue waters of a vast inland sea. Beholding the everlasting glory came a vision to Brigham Young. "It is enough," he exclaimed. "This is the right place! Drive on!" Later: "It shall be called the Great Salt Lake city of North America."

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"The desert shall rejoice and blossom as the rose."
