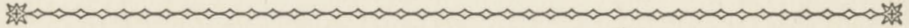

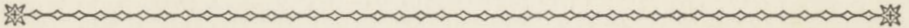

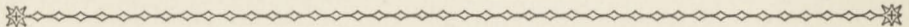

THRU THE ROCKIES — NOT AROUND THEM

## *Ruby of the Rockies*

Redstone . . . "Ruby of the Rockies" . . . mecca of sportsmen and vacationists near the headwaters of sparkling Crystal River in the Glenwood Springs district . . . monument to one of the fabulous giants of finance who wrested wealth from the wilderness in the early days of Colorado's statehood.

A colorful Tudor mansion built of the native red sandstone of the surrounding mountains . . . set like a jewel in an expanse of emerald lawn . . . backed by the darker tones of spruce and pine and the ever-changing shades of aspen. Redstone is a favorite spot of the fisherman, the hunter, the nature-lover. There are wilderness trails to be explored . . . over mountain crags . . . thru shady glades bedecked with wild flowers. The well-named Crystal River—and many other streams and lakes nearby—teem with scrappy mountain trout. Elk, deer, brown and black bear, mountain sheep, abound in the primitive forest areas.

The lodge was constructed as his private residence in 1902 by John Cleveland Osgood, founder of the industrial empire now known as the Colorado Fuel & Iron Corporation. The house—and the surrounding 4,200-acre estate—was the show-place of the state.

The story of Osgood's success is the "Horatio Alger" story so typical of his generation. Brooklyn-born, orphaned at twelve, he turned to the West to make his fortune. At nineteen he was cashier of a coal mining company in Iowa, later becoming its head. In 1882, he made a survey of Colorado's resources for the Burlington railroad. At that time, the rapidly-developing humor of Eugene Field in the "Denver Tribune," and the remarkable poker-playing ability of Senator "Tom" Bowen, were of vastly more interest to the rest of the United States than the possibilities of the Centennial State as a coal producing region. But Osgood was so impressed by what he saw that he stayed to take part in the development of those resources.

Osgood was well in advance of his time sociologically. Unlike most of the industrial barons of that day, he was a staunch believer in improved living conditions for his workers. He established the town of Redstone for the employes of the coke ovens and nearby coal mines, making it unique among "company" towns in that every cottage differed from the rest. The architect he employed favored the Swiss chalet type of construction, which proved to be most appropriate to the setting, and the village quickly became known as "the most beautiful town in Colorado."

With the decline of coal mining in this area of the state, the cottages were sold as summer residences, and the mansion has now been converted into a haven for those seeking sport and recreation. The years have dealt kindly with Redstone. With the passing of time, it has become more and more an integral part of the landscape, and its enduring beauty is indeed a fitting memorial to this builder of the West.
