

MT. SOPRIS

Dominant landmark of the Glenwood Springs region, famous Colorado recreational area, Mt. Sopris, elevation 12,823 feet, rises above beautiful Crystal River between Carbondale and Redstone, Colorado. The approach to Mt. Sopris from the north is thru Crystal River Valley, a rich agricultural area characterized by substantial farm houses surrounded by alfalfa, out and potato fields. At the upper end of the Valley, the terrain becomes more rugged and the road winds along rushing Crystal River past both operating and abandoned coal mines set in the pine covered slopes. The entire region is underlaid with vast reserves of coal, production of which at present is limited chiefly to local needs.

Almost in the shadow of Mt. Sopris is the village of Redstone in a setting of incomparable beauty. Originally built as a private estate at a cost of almost \$2,000,000 by J. C. Osgood, an official of Colorado Fuel and Iron Company, near the beginning of the century, Redstone today is being developed as an exclusive guest ranch center. Redstone Inn, recently remodeled, is patterned after a famous Holland hostel. Crystal River Lodge, the original Osgood forty-room mansion and center of the estate, is now a guest lodge offering complete dude ranch activities. The Tudor style main building is encompassed by a lawn comprising sixty acres.

A hundred pleasant cottages, all of individual appearance, constitute the village of Redstone proper. They were built as a model industrial settlement to house the estate employees and workers in the adjacent coal mines. Today they are almost entirely utilized as summer residences.

Over three hundred miles of the best trout fishing streams in America are found near Mt. Sopris within the Glenwood Springs recreational area. In addition to Crystal River, the Roaring Fork, Frying Pan, Colorado, White and Eagle rivers are all favorite haunts of the angler. Hunters throng the vicinity during the big game season in pursuit of deer and elk. Other wild life found in the area include brown and black bear, mountain sheep, mountain lion, and all kinds of game fowl.
