Utah State Capitol

High on a hill overlooking the city their courage and initiative created from a desert, the people of Utah erected the Capitol of their state. As in most of their building, they used the materials at hand and built the Capitol of native Utah granite, creating a structure of beauty and utility. They built along classic lines, seeking beauty in their creation. To further satisfy their aesthetic sense the building was surrounded by wide lawns and profuse flower beds that are tended with loving care.

During the time Utah was governed by its Territorial legislature, and for 19 years after Utah became a state in 1896, there was no Capitol. The town of Fillmore, because of its central location geographically, was early chosen to be the seat of state government. Later the government was removed to conform more to the center of population at Salt Lake City. There the legislature met in the Council House, which burned in 1883. Subsequently one session was held in Social Hall. Later meetings were conducted in the City and County Building after it was completed in 1894. Finally in 1912 a fund of \$1,500,000 was collected and the present building started. In 1914 the corner stone was laid by Governor William Spry, and the building was completed the year following at a total cost of \$2,739,528.54.

The dome of the Capitol is coated with copper foil from the famous open-pit mines of Utah, symbolizing a factor that was largely instrumental in the development of the state. There is no rotunda under the dome as is usual in such buildings. Instead there is a circle of opaque glass set in the floor where the bronze-painted plaster cast replica of Cyrus E. Dallin's heroic Massasoit can be seen.

The building is 404 feet long, 240 feet wide, and 285 feet high at the top of the dome. Inside, in various rooms throughout the building, are objects of art, exhibits of historical and commercial significance, and interesting furnishings both imported and domestic. The conducted tours through the building, and explanatory remarks by the guides, will make an interesting interlude in your vacation.
