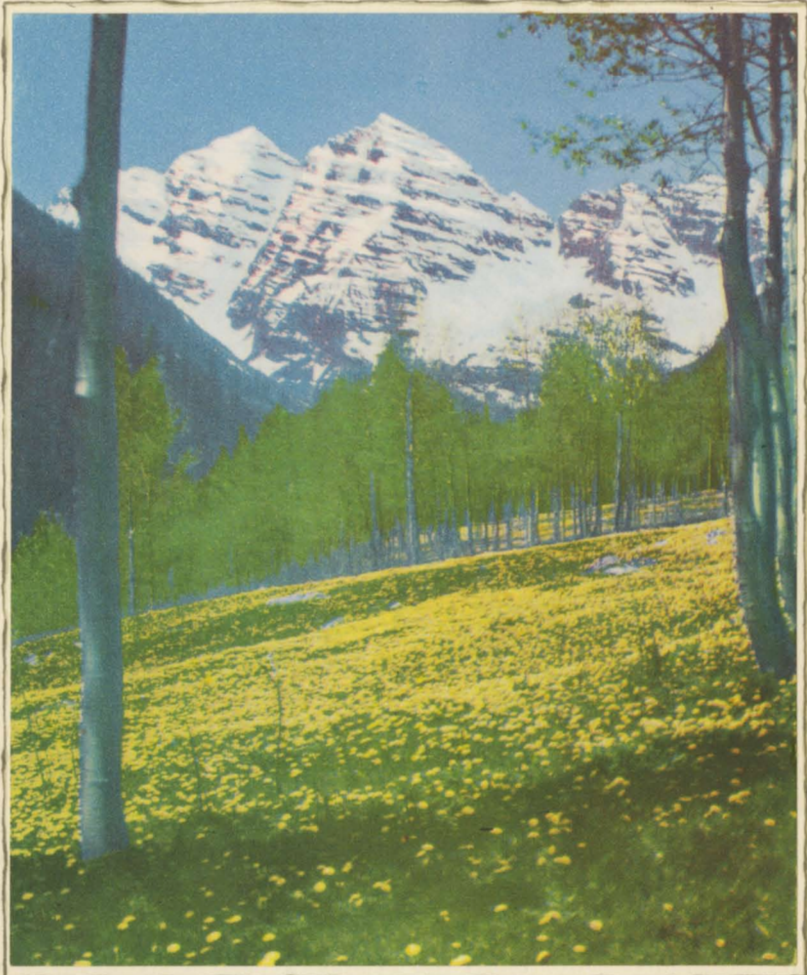

## Maroon Bells

In the midst of a mountain territory noted for its scenic delights, the Maroon Bells are outstanding attractions. Though somewhat off the beaten path, like the man who built a better mouse trap, the Bells draw visitors who delight and wonder at what they behold.

In Summer the peaks appear rugged but beautiful. Jutting abruptly into the sky they resemble gigantic rubies. The blue velvet of the Colorado sky; the rich tones of the evergreens, interspersed by the lighter greens of the aspens; and the general surroundings, form a wondrous setting for these mighty jewels.

In Spring, as seen on the cover of this menu, the mountains are just emerging from their winter covering of snow. On the lower slopes, the aspen trees are beginning to leaf out, and the nearby meadows become speckled with a profusion of wild flowers. A trip to the Bells at this season of the year is a tonic indeed.

Perhaps the Bells are best seen in Autumn when the aspens have become splashes of brilliant yellow; when the sumac and other bushes have turned to flaming russets and reds; when the forests have that smokey look; and the sky, if possible, is an even deeper blue.

Or perchance Winter is the best time to make the visit to the peaks, when nature has softened their contours with deep cushions of snow; when they wear their white mantles like kings; when the sun makes them sparkle and dazzle the beholder; and their mighty heads are often crowned by fleecy white clouds.

At whatever season the traveler makes his trip to see the Maroon Bells, he will carry away a cherished picture that will not soon be forgotten.
