Royal Gorge

Fought for by pioneer railroad builders because it was the only good passageway to the west; cursed by construction men because of its stubborn granite walls; shunned by the Indians because of its awe-inspiring depths; the Royal Gorge is a paradox — the World's Best Loved Travel Wonder.

The passageway was well worth fighting for. It carries many train-loads of the nation's goods from west to east, and from east to west. The construction is admired and wondered at because of its seeming impossibility, and the daring and courage which brought about its completion. The awe-inspiring depths thrill and amaze travelers who come from all parts of the world to marvel at this wonder of nature.

At the bottom of the gorge the walls are very close together. The narrowest spot is only thirty feet wide. Because it was impossible to blast a roadbed from the sheer cliffs, the railroad traverses this section over a hanging bridge. Steel trusses, embedded in the granite walls, span the river. The tracks are hung below the trusses and parallel the stream.

The gorge is over a thousand feet deep. Looking down the sheer walls from the rim is a breathtaking experience. The river and railroad shrink to tiny miniatures. Tiny cliff swallows dart about in the airy depths.

Looking up from the bottom of the gorge is equally impressive. The sky takes on an even deeper blue and forms a beautiful backdrop for the highway bridge which spans the canyon.

Geologists say the gorge was carved by the Arkansas river which runs and roars along but a few feet below the railroad tracks.

Fought for, cursed, shunned, and loved, the Royal Gorge is truly America's Best Loved Travel Wonder.
