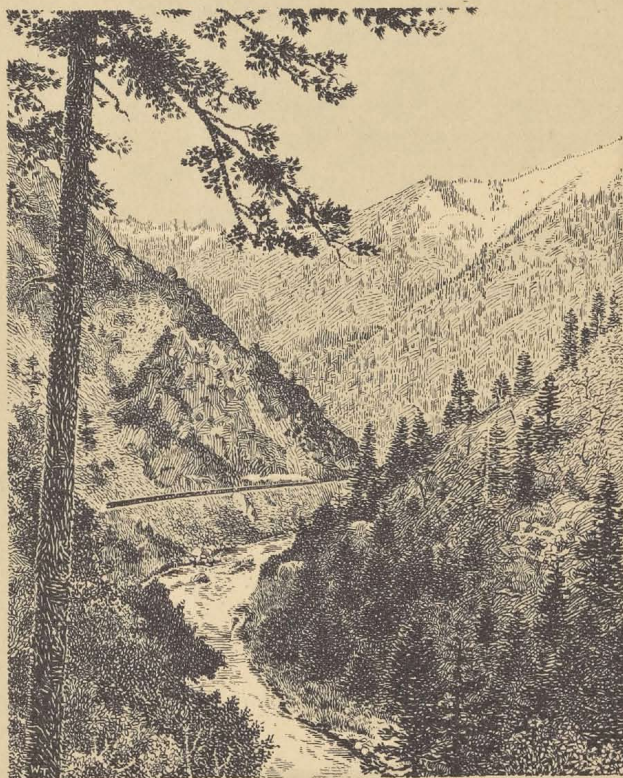

Across the Western Garden of Allah

Great historical and geological interest attaches to the territory traversed by the Western Pacific in Northern Nevada and Western Utah because the route traces the bed of two lakes which existed in times far remote from the coming of man now known as Lake Lahontan and Lake Bonneville.

Lake Lahontan, once 880 feet deep, covered a great expanse of western Nevada and washed the eastern slope of the Sierras. Former beaches and shore lines of this prehistoric lake are to be seen high above the railroad track. Sand Pass is at the southern end of one of the Lahontan deserts—Smoke Creek desert. Pyramid Lake, lying to the south, is a remnant.

Between Silver Zone Pass (Toano Range) and the Wasatch Mountains lay Lake Bonneville, which at one time had a maximum area of 19,750 square miles and a depth of 1,050 feet.

This lake had an outlet to the Pacific Ocean via the Snake and the Columbia rivers. Its powerful waves fashioned its shores into an elaborate system of cliffs and benches which are still clearly outlined.

Great Salt Lake, the southern arm of which is crossed by the Western Pacific, is a remnant of Lake Bonneville. Great Salt Lake is one of the natural wonders of the western hemisphere and has been called the "Dead Sea of America." Its average salinity is about $5\frac{1}{2}$ times that of the ocean and it has been estimated that it contains 400 million tons of salt. Consequently, it is extremely buoyant.

These vast expanses of the Great Basin have been termed the "Western Garden of Allah." Its beauties are in sharp contrast to those of the Sierras, nevertheless they record intensely interesting stories of countless ages of the past.
