# SAN FRANCISCO

## FLOWER CAPITAL OF THE WORLD

**S**OUNDING the first color note in the harmony of beauty and delight that is colorful San Francisco, are the picturesque sidewalk flower stands which cling to the curb lines in the pulsating heart of the city. Laden with blooms, these quaint stands, year in and year out, rain or shine, perform their modest part in fostering the romance of flowers in which San Francisco plays the leading role.

Next comes the grand symphony in color conducted by the world-renowned florist shops. The artistry of the window displays commands audiences hour by hour. Doors are traditionally open. Within, the fragrance, profusion and variety of flowers, irrespective of season, are amazing. Styles for the world are thought out in these shops.

The great wholesale flower market is a most fascinating sight. To this mart come at an early hour growers with thousands and thousands of fresh flowers, decorative berries, ferns and shrubs which are displayed on row upon row of long tables.

The principal flower producing areas which make San Francisco the center of the world's greatest flower market, are in San Mateo County on the Peninsula, south of San Francisco, and across the Bay in Alameda County. Flowers grown in the city itself include some of the finest orchids. Endowed with fertility of soil and favored by cool summers and temperate winters, these areas are ideally adapted to floriculture on a varied and unprecedented scale.

Astonishingly large acreages are devoted to acacia, heather, gardenias and chrysanthemums. Gardenia plants in the Bay Area number 250,000. Of these, one company, largest single grower of gardenias in the world, has

85,000. The flower list is long: orchids, roses, carnations, violets, tuberous begonias, dahlias, gladioli, daffodils, callas, and many, many others.

Every year 1,000 carloads of cut flowers are shipped far and wide by Railway Express. Fifteen carloads of white and yellow giant chrysanthemums alone are dispatched by this Agency each year to New Orleans to decorate graves on All Saints Day. There are also the shipments by air express. San Francisco's annual floral bouquet, comprising flowers shipped away and those used at home, is valued at \$8,000,000.

San Francisco ranks first among the cities in the annual per capita purchase of cut flowers as well as in selling flowers. The Florists Telegraph Delivery Association reports that 20,000 telegrams are received here annually for the purchase and delivery of flowers locally. To San Franciscans, flowers are a necessity and are worn by day and by night. Homemakers attend classes in floral decoration and colleges teach floriculture.

Gardenias are used the year round for corsages. The queenly orchid appears not only on opera nights and New Year's Eve but whenever flowers are worn. Chrysanthemums are at their peak when Stanford and California meet in their annual football classic, the "Big Game." On this occasion tens of thousands of these gorgeous flowers are worn — the white with red Stanford "S" and the yellow with the blue California "C."

In San Francisco, flowers are a dream come true. It is as though the sunset, ever lingering just beyond the Golden Gate, had deluged the city with its rainbow repertory of colors so that every day in the year flowers could be "on parade."
