



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

Passengers from St. Louis, Memphis, St. Joseph and intermediate points will use train No. 25 leaving Kansas City, 11:00 A. M. Central Time.

Passengers from Dallas and Fort Worth and points north will use train No. 18 to McFarland, connecting there with train No. 25, leaving 1:50 P. M. Central Time.

What Is Included in Cost of Tour

Railroad and Pullman transportation for the round trip; sightseeing trips enumerated; automobile transportation where indicated; all meals in dining cars and hotels; transfers, etc.; in other words, every necessary expense is covered.

The rates quoted provide for room at hotels without private bath, except at Cosmopolitan Hotel, Denver, on basis of two persons to a room. Rooms with private bath may be secured at all hotels upon payment of additional charge. Only first-class hotels are selected.

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General Description of the Colorado Tour

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Colorado Springs and the Pike's Peak Region

Famous in song and story, the "Pike's Peak Region" covers many square miles over which the hoary head of the great "Sentinel" keeps enternal vigil.

There are scores of trips embodying the beautiful and unusual, but over them all is felt the dominating presence of great, symmetrical Pike, 14,109 feet high.


Colorado Springs lies out on the plains, the mountains rising just beyond, and is a base for numberless trips into and onto the mountains.

Whatever one's tastes, whether for motoring, riding, hiking, or for all three, here it may be gratified and satisfied.

Manitou, in reality a suburb of Colorado Springs, is but a few miles away—at the very foot of Pike's Peak. It has comfortable hotels, contains many interesting sights, and is particularly noted for the famous Manitou Mineral Springs.

Nowhere is there a more lovely road than that which winds through Williams Canyon, and then, by breath-taking switchbacks, ascends the canyon wall and brings you, thrilled and fascinated, up to the Cave of the Winds, whose entrance leads into a vast natural amphitheatre where stalactites and stalagmites scintillate in the electric lights. Skilled guides conduct you safely through its winding underground ramifications and along its various levels, and later your car takes you down another side of the mountain over a looping road as wonderful as the one by which you ascended.

The Garden of the Gods, fantastically-eroded outcropping of red sandstone, is so familiar as to need no introduction; and so, likewise, is South Cheyenne Canyon, the graceful cascade of the Seven Falls, the High Drive, North Cheyenne and Bear Creek Canyons, and many more of the shorter drives of intense beauty and interest.

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Rocky Mountain National Park

Seventy-five miles northwest of Denver, Rocky Mountain National Park announces its presence to the world by the snowy summit of Long's Peak—14,255 feet high—which is the loftiest peak in the Park and, like Mount Evans, one of the tallest in the Rockies. Its rugged beauty and sheer precipice dominate the 400 square miles of the Park, and, beautiful and overawing as it all is, everything else seems to subordinate itself and harmonize with the great peak as with a central, inspiring motif.

During our stay in the Park, there will be an opportunity to get a close-up view of Long's Peak.




Estes Park Village

Estes Park Village is the eastern gateway to the Park—the actual boundary lies several miles to the west—and it is the clearing house for all the physical needs of residents and visitors.

Wherever you stay, whether in fine hotel or rustic cabin, there is no lack of interesting trips by motor-car, on horseback or on foot; or, you may simply sit in a comfortable chair, breathe deeply of tonic atmosphere and steep your soul in beauty—for Rocky Mountain National Park is the "Land of Do-as-You-Please."

Leaving Estes Park, you wind your way through the wonderful Horseshoe Park, up over the Fall River Pass on a highway that was more than ten years in building; down on the western side of the gigantic roof of Continental Divide to beautiful Grand Lake.






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
Grand Lake

Against the western edge of Rocky Mountain National Park lies Grand Lake, one of the largest and most beautiful bodies of water in the state, with its quaint village and picturesque hostelries.

Here is a delightful shelving shingle for beach bathing; here are waters filled with the gamey pink-fleshed salmon trout; here the Rocky Mountain Yacht Club stages its annual regatta and boasts the highest anchorage of any yacht club in the world. Here is the main source of the great Colorado River, which sings its way in mountain innocence out of the placid lake, only to become, a thousand miles further on, the roaring water-giant of the Southwest. From Grand Lake the journey takes you







Grand Lake


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south through the high-mountain iceberg-altitude lettuce-fields, and then up once more to the Continental Divide, crossing it at Berthoud Pass, and down on the eastern side through a succession of canyons, plateaus and mining camps, into Idaho Springs.

Idaho Springs

This charming little mountain town offers many worth-while attractions for the vacationist; in fact, all outdoor recreations may be indulged in. Central City, Georgetown, Silver Plume and Echo Lake, are some of the interesting trips which you can make from this point. Here also are natural hot springs, which have a world-wide reputation.

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Rocky Mountain Parks Transportation Company Motor-Cars

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It was here, in 1859, that gold was first discovered in Colorado. In this section gold and silver mining is again becoming active.

From Idaho Springs you follow Clear Creek Canyon to a point where it narrows to the water and forces the highway to change its course; thence to Floyd Hill into the Denver Mountain Parks system with its game corrals of buffalo, elk, deer and mountain sheep, on and over Lookout Mountain and the Lariat Trail through Golden into Denver.

Denver

Denver was founded in 1858, and was named for General Denver, governor of Kansas at that time. Although Denver was established on

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the edge of the "Great American Desert," it showed progress, initiative and originality in many things. It is noted for the purity and abundance of its water, excellent schools and university. There are within the city limits thirty-nine parks, many of them connected with beautiful boulevards. All kinds of amusements are provided in the parks. City Park contains the Colorado Museum of National History, as well as the Habitat Zoo, in which the various animals of the Rocky Mountains are shown in their natural surroundings.

The modern, "mile-high city" itself, covering seventy-five square miles, luxuriantly verdant and tree-shaded, where every blade of grass must be watered or die, and every building is solidly constructed of brick, stone and concrete, is well worth more than a passing glimpse.

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How to Obtain Membership in Tours

Apply to D. M. Wootton, Manager Vacation Travel Service Bureau, Rock Island Lines, La Salle Street Station, Chicago, or to any Rock Island representative—see list of names and addresses on page 32.

Tours will start from Chicago, St. Louis, Memphis, Omaha, Kansas City, St. Joseph, Des Moines, St. Paul, Minneapolis, Dallas and Fort Worth. Cost for complete Tours from these points will be as indicated on page 11.

In making requests for membership, the following information should be given—Full name and address of passenger; date of Tour on which booking is desired; Pullman accommodation desired; at what point you will join Tour. It is also important to state whether one or two persons will occupy berth.

All requests for reservations will be acknowledged and tickets and necessary information promptly forwarded.

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The cost of a Tour is determined on basis of Pullman accommodations used. For instance, the cost is less if two persons occupy one berth, or if two or more persons occupy one compartment or drawing-room. Rates quoted herein are for lower and upper berths. Rates for section, compartment or drawing-room accommodations will depend upon number of occupants, and will be quoted upon application.

How to Purchase Railroad Ticket from Points Not Indicated

Those living at points north, east, or south of gateways from which rates for Tours are quoted, will find it to their advantage, because of the saving in ticket rate, to purchase through Summer Excursion ticket from their local agent. For example, passenger starting from Cleveland should purchase railroad ticket Cleveland to Colorado Springs and return, via Rock Island Lines from Chicago, at \$62.70, to which add the cost of complete Tour from Chicago, without railroad ticket, \$131.95. Total, \$194.65.

Should Pullman service be used from Cleveland to Chicago, or from any other place to points from which complete rate is named and at which point Tour is joined, it will

be at passenger's own expense.

Colorado Springs to be Destination of Ticket

Railroad tickets should be issued with Colorado Springs as destination. (Except from Texas points, destination should be Denver.) Return coupon reading from Colorado Springs will be honored from Denver.

Baggage Arrangements

The free allowance of hand baggage, which may be carried in automobiles in National Parks, is 25 pounds. Those desiring to take trunks may do so, and they will be stored free of charge at Denver. If wanted in Park, special arrangements can be made with the Rocky Mountain Parks Transportation Company.

Children

Rates for children under twelve years of age will be based on hotel accommodations desired for them, and will be named on application. Children twelve years of age and over will be charged full rate.

Communicating with Tours Enroute

Letters and telegrams to members of Tours should be addressed to the individual at any of the hotels indicated, allowing sufficient time for transit.



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
