

#### THE TURQUOISE ROOM

This distinctive private dining room is located in the Pleasure Dome car. Designed to serve private parties of 6 to 10 persons, the Turquoise Room must be reserved in advance for private dining parties at night, or private cocktail parties in the afternoon. Consult the dining car steward about reservations.

#### LOUNGE FACILITIES

The Pleasure Dome Lounge provides a delightful dome observation, as well as a spacious main lounge and lower cocktail lounge.

In this car will be found a writing desk, stationery, and magazines. Daily newspapers are placed aboard at various cities en route.

#### DINING CAR SERVICE

The Dining Car features food in the fine Fred Harvey manner. Meals can be served in your room for a modest service charge—just ask your porter to have a dining car waiter bring you a menu.

#### RADIO AND MUSIC

Each room has its own speaker and control for radio and music reception. The radio operates from a central set in the Lounge car which is tuned to the station carrying the most popular program in the area through which the train is passing.

#### DICTATING MACHINES

You may use your personal portable dictating machine, tape recorder or radio in your room if you desire. Just plug it into the 110 volt A.C. electric razor outlet.

#### MARKET BULLETINS

Late news about the stock market is wired direct to the Super Chief and is placed on a special clip board in the lounge car.

#### TELEGRAMS

Telegrams can be dispatched by the porter at stations where the Super Chief stops.

#### MAIL SERVICE

Mail can be dropped into box located in the Lounge Car or turned over to the porter for mailing.

#### INDIAN CURIOS AND SOUTHWESTERN SOUVENIRS

A ten minute stop at Albuquerque affords time for you to visit the Fred Harvey Indian Building where you will see extensive displays of Indian handicrafts including handmade silver and turquoise jewelry and Navajo handwoven rugs. Train departure will be announced over the public address system in the building.

## Points of Interest along the way

**CHICAGO, ILL.**—Pop. 3,550,404. Eastern terminal Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railway System, whose trains arrive and depart from Dearborn Station. The 21 trunk lines entering Chicago represent 40 per cent of the railroad mileage of the United States. Among the noted public edifices in Chicago are the Art Institute, Museum of Science and Industry, Civic Opera House, Chicago Natural History Museum, Adler Planetarium, Shedd Aquarium, Chicago Academy of Sciences, Chicago Historical Society and McCormick Place.

**JOLIET, ILL.** (named for Louis Joliet, French Canadian explorer)—Pop. 66,780. County seat of Will County.

**STREATOR, ILL.** (named for early industrialist Dr. Streator)—Pop. 16,868. Starved Rock State Park, 18 miles from city.

**CHILLICOTHE, ILL.** (Indian name)—Pop. 5,313 for Chillicothe and N. Chillicothe combined. Illinois River, east of Chillicothe, is first navigable stream after leaving Chicago.

**GALESBURG, ILL.** (named for its founder George W. Gale)—Pop. 37,243. Scene of Lincoln and Douglas debates in 1856, and location of Knox College, St. Mary's and St. Joseph Academies.

**FORT MADISON, IOWA** (named after early fort located on the west bank of the river)—Pop. 15,247. Here the Santa Fe crosses the Mississippi River from Illinois to Iowa over a 24-span 3347 ft. steel bridge, which includes the longest swing span in the world.

**SHOPTON, IOWA**—Santa Fe division point, all trains stop here for fuel and servicing.

**KANSAS CITY, MO.**—Pop. 475,539. Originally Westport Landing, the beginning of the old Santa Fe Trail, was founded in 1850. Today 12 trunk-line railroads center here. Kansas City ranks among the first as a cash wheat market, cattle market, flour producing region, hotel meat supply center, primary wheat market and stocker-feeder cattle market.

**NEWTON, KAN.** (named after Newton, Massachusetts)—Pop. 14,877. Santa Fe division point and hub of important mainlines.

**HUTCHINSON, KAN.** (named for C. C. Hutchinson, founder)—Pop. 37,574. On Arkansas River. This is the heart of the wheat belt. Largest salt producing city in the midwest. Junction for Santa Fe lines to Great Bend, and Ponca City.

**DODGE CITY, KAN.** (named for old Fort Dodge)—Pop. 13,520. Famous early day marshals were Bat Masterson and Wyatt Earp. Numerous outlaws are buried on Boot Hill which is visited by thousands of tourists each year. Junction point to Boise City and Amarillo.

**GARDEN CITY, KAN.**—Pop. 11,811. Largest irrigation area in midwest with unlimited supply of underground water. World's largest known gas field. Sugar beet factory. Largest zoo in Kansas, largest buffalo herd in midwest. Junction point, north and east.

**LAMAR, COLO.**—Pop. 7,369. Founded in 1887 and named for former U. S. Secretary of Interior. Principal crops: alfalfa, sugar beets, wheat, corn, broomcorn, and small grains. Santa Fe branch connects with line to Rocky Ford. Home of Southeast Colorado Livestock and Poultry Show.

**LA JUNTA, COLO.**—Pop. 8,026. (Pronounced La Hoon-tah.) Terminal point for Santa Fe Railway. At this point the line from Denver, Colorado Springs and Pueblo connects with Santa Fe's northern transcontinental mainline. Pike's Peak (14,110 ft.) 100 miles Northwest, can be seen on clear days.

**TRINIDAD, COLO.**—Pop. 10,691. Gateway to Raton Pass, Stonewall Valley and San Isabel Forest. On hill to left of town is Sister's hospital, and on right in city park is statue of Kit Carson. Crops are wheat, corn, oats, beans, sugar beets, and alfalfa.

**RATON, N. M.**—Pop. 8,146. Gateway to Cimarron Valley, Taos Indian pueblo and Carson National Forest. 8 miles North is the famous Raton Tunnel, ½ mile long and at altitude of 7,588 ft., the highest point on the Santa Fe Railway.

**LAS VEGAS, N.M.**—Pop. 13,818. Irrigated and dry-farming district. Stock raising, fruit growing and dairying; principal crops—small grain, corn and alfalfa. Important cattle, sheep and wool market; lumbering. New Mexico Highlands University.

**LAMY, N. M.**—Pop. 195. Named for Archbishop Lamy, pioneer Catholic ecclesiastic. Passengers change at Lamy for Santa Fé, capital of New Mexico and oldest city in the Southwest, and Indian-detour motor trips; and U. S. Atomic Energy Commission plant at Los Alamos.

**ALBUQUERQUE, N. M.** (named for Duke of Albuquerque, Spanish Viceroy, 1705)—Pop. 201,189. On Rio Grande River; Sandia (watermelon) Mountains, 15 miles east. Santa Fe hospital, St. Joseph's hospital and several sanitariums located here. Southwestern headquarters of U. S. Forest Service and U. S. Soil Conservation Service. University of New Mexico.

**CONTINENTAL DIVIDE.** Alt. 7,247. Located about 4.5 miles west of Thoreau, 27 miles east of Gallup.

**GALLUP, N. M.** (named for D. L. Gallup, auditor for the old Atlantic & Pacific R. R.)—Pop. 14,089. The Indian Capital of the United States. Site of annual Inter-Tribal Indian Ceremonials, usually held in mid-August.

**WINSLOW, ARIZ.** (named for E. F. Winslow, former president of St. Louis & San Francisco R. R.)—Pop. 8,862. "The Meteor City," so-called because of Meteor Crater, 17 miles west and 6 miles south of the city. Santa Fe division point.

**FLAGSTAFF, ARIZ.**—Pop. 18,214. Situated in Coconino National Forest. Arizona State College. Museum of Northern Arizona, Eight National Monuments nearby. San Francisco Peaks, highest point in Arizona, rising to nearly 13,000 feet. Rail head for Glen Canyon Dam, a \$500,000,000 project of the Federal Bureau of Reclamation, U.S. Dept. of the Interior.

**WILLIAMS JUNCTION, ARIZ.** (3.6 miles East of WILLIAMS)—Pop. 3,559, named for Bill Williams, noted Indian Scout. Williams is also the gateway to Grand Canyon National Park on a branch line 64 miles north). Williams Junction is the junction point of the line to Phoenix. New double-track main line starts here and extends west for 44 miles. Completed in 1960, this new line eliminates sharp curves and steep grades of the former line that was constructed in 1882.

**SELIGMAN, ARIZ.** (named for C. E. Seligman, construction engineer for original railroad)—Pop. 900. Stock raising, sheep, cattle. Havasu Canyon 67 miles north.

**NEEDLES, CALIF.** (named after the jagged mountain ridge across the river in Arizona)—Pop. 4,590. From here to Barstow the Santa Fe tracks cross the Mojave Desert. Home of the annual Colorado River marathon boat races.

**BARSTOW, CALIF.** (named for William Barstow Strong, former president of Santa Fe)—Pop. 11,644. Junction where Santa Fe Lines divide, one line running to Los Angeles and Southern California; the other line to San Francisco and Northern California. Santa Fe diesel shops.

**SAN BERNARDINO, CALIF.** (Spanish for "Saint Bernardinus")—Pop. 91,922. Center of orange district. Santa Fe division point. Largest Santa Fe shops in the west located here.

**POMONA, CALIF.** (named for Roman Goddess of Fruit)—Pop. 67,157. Industries include: oranges, lemons, olives, walnuts, grains, alfalfa, poultry, dairying, sugar beets, guided missile plant.

**PASADENA, CALIF.** (means "crown of the valley")—Pop. 116,407. Center of highly specialized scientific manufacturing businesses. Luxurious resort hotels, open all year. Site of Rosebowl game and Tournament of Roses parade on New Year's Day. Huntington Library and Art Gallery, Pasadena Community Playhouse and California Institute of Technology located here.

**LOS ANGELES, CALIF.**—Pop. 2,525,000. Founded September 4, 1781, as the "City of the Angels"; second town officially incorporated (1850) in California territory. Seaside resorts of Los Angeles are Santa Monica, Ocean Park, Venice, Redondo Beach, Hermosa Beach, Del Rey, Long Beach, and Catalina Island.
