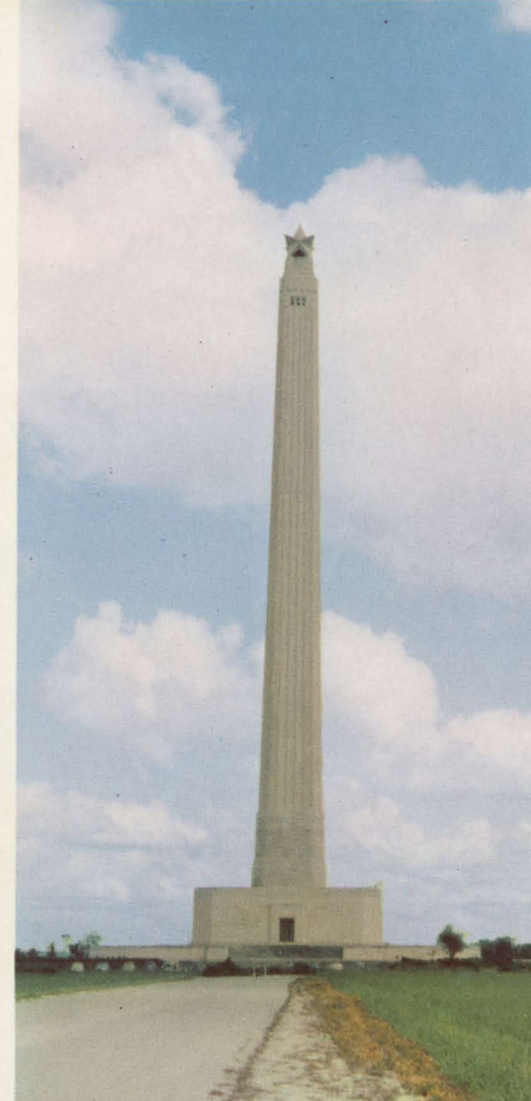

From Chicago to the Texas Gulf Coast the Texas Chief follows an interesting route across the farm lands of Illinois and Missouri, the wheat lands and oil fields of Kansas and Oklahoma.

Crossing the Red River into North Texas, the Texas Chief spans the Lone Star State during daylight hours.

Here's a brief description of the cities served by the Texas Chief:

Joliet is the first stop after leaving Chicago. Located on the Des Plaines River, it is an important industrial and manufacturing city.

Streator is a combination of farm community and manufacturing center.

Chillicothe is a railroad town and transfer point on the Santa Fe for nearby Peoria.

Galesburg is an historical city that has become important in manufacturing and educational activity with farm and livestock raising to add to its busy interests.

Fort Madison is on the west bank of the Mississippi River. Santa Fe trains cross the river just before reaching station.

La Plata, in a stock raising and farming section, is a transfer point for Kirksville and nearby cities not directly served by Santa Fe.

Kansas City is the hub of the Middle West. The Texas Chief is a popular train to this great city, even though it passes during a middle-of-night hour.

Emporia is a typical Kansas town that has a varied business interest ranging from farming to railroading.

Newton, in the middle of wheat and farm country, is an important junction point for Santa Fe Lines.

Wichita, the second largest city in Kansas, is not far from the geographical center of the nation. It is the hub of midwest activity for milling, petroleum, farm machinery and aircraft manufacturing.

Winfield, location of two colleges and junction of Santa Fe lines serving mid-Kansas area.

Arkansas City, on the Arkansas River, is on the southern border of Kansas and Oklahoma. A fine area of farming and livestock raising.

Ponca City is one of the great refinery centers of the state that oil made famous.

Perry is in the farming, cattle raising and oil producing part of Oklahoma.

Guthrie has an interesting history, was capitol of territory before Oklahoma became a state.

Oklahoma City, the State Capitol, is headquarters of activities and business interests in Oklahoma. Almost within the shadows of its beautiful skyline are the largest high-gravity oil fields in the world.

Norman, a popular college town, is the home of the University of Oklahoma and its famous "Sooners" football team.

Purcell is railroad service point located on the South Canadian River.

Pauls Valley, a typical small Oklahoma community, thriving on farming, milling and oil.

Ardmore is in the part of Oklahoma originally in Indian territory belonging to the Choctaw and Chickasaw nations. Many beautiful spots are nearby, including Platt National Park.

Gainesville, first city in Texas on the Santa Fe after crossing the Red River.

Cleburne is a busy farm and railroad center. First stop on the southbound Texas Chief after leaving Fort Worth.

Temple was founded by the railroad in the fine farming area of central Texas. Today it is famous as the "Hospital Center of the South."
