
The thought of his poor, unfortunate cousin without even a name made the little colt feel very sad and he blinked and blinked his eyes. "Yes," said the old mare, concluding



TO SOUTHERN ARIZONA

Southern Pacific's Golden State and Sunset Routes give direct main line service to most of the guest ranches along Southern Pacific Lines. Golden State Route, for example, the direct route between Chicago, Kansas City or St. Louis and Los Angeles or San Diego, runs via El Paso, Texas, and then through southern New Mexico and Arizona, providing the fastest service to Southern Arizona, center of winter guest ranch activities.

Sunset Route of Southern Pacific runs from New Orleans through the Old South and Texas to El Paso, and then through New Mexico and Southern Arizona to Los Angeles and San Francisco.

Through trains run directly to Douglas, Bisbee, Tucson, Chandler, Phoenix, Yuma and other Southern Arizona cities—saving many hours



to many points. In visiting western guest ranches, combine Sunset or Golden State Routes with Shasta or Overland Routes, Southern Pacific's two other scenic transcontinental routes, to provide a round trip that shows you twice as much of the West.

By taking advantage of Southern Pacific's choice of Four Scenic Routes to go one way, return another, you see twice as much of the United States as you would by going and returning the same way—for not one cent extra rail fare. Each route is crowded with travel attractions, but each has its own characteristics, and over each of these routes you have a choice of several fine, air-conditioned through trains daily. On all these trains the same spirit of Southern Pacific is found—a friendly interest in the comfort and pleasure of the traveler.
