L & N Dates . . . Choice and Selected

from a long and colorful past

March 5, 1850	Louisville and Nashville Railroad obtained its charter from Commonwealth of Kentucky.
October 27, 1859	Original line was completed and first through train operated between Louisville and Nashville.
1861-1865	Although L. & N. had only 269 miles of track at start of Civil War, it played an important role, with trackage first in hands of one side, then the other. Its facilities were badly damaged, but it emerged in good financial shape.
May 19, 1871	Nashville and Decatur and South and North Alabama railroads were acquired, extending L. & N.'s track south to Montgomery. Railroad played an important part in subsequent establishment of Birmingham and in helping it to become "Pittsburgh of the South."
January-May 1880	Mobile and Montgomery and New Orleans, Mobile and Texas railroads entered L. & N. fold, extending lines to Mobile, Gulf Coast and New Orleans.
1880-1881	L. & N. entered Evansville, St. Louis and Cincinnati.
July 13, 1885	Bridge across Ohio River at Henderson, Ky., was completed, forging important link between north and south.
May 30, 1886	L. & N. changed some 2,000 miles of track and more than 10,000 pieces of rolling stock from five-foot gauge to standard gauge between sunrise and sunset.
May 15, 1891	Norton, Va., was reached, providing access to mineral wealth of Eastern Kentucky and Southwest Virginia.
1902-1905	New "Main Line" was created between Cincinnati and Atlanta through acquisition and construction.
1909-1912	L. & N. extended its lines into Harlan, Perry and Letcher counties, Ky., to develop rich coal-fields.
1917-1918	World War I! The L. & N. again moved huge quantities of materiel and men.
January-February 1937	L. & N. successfully fought back from great damage caused by Ohio River Valley Flood. Even though badly crippled by high water, it was able to render important assistance to many communities.
1941-1945	World War II! L. & N. and other railroads were highly commended for contribution to success of nation's arms.
Postwar Era	L. & N. became completely dieselized; improved both its passenger and freight service; built new lines; purchased much new rolling stock; installed considerable centralized traffic control; revolutionized nearly every phase of its operations. The good work still continues.
TODAY	L. & N. is third largest railroad in South, 16th largest in nation, with some 20,000 employes, 5,700 miles of main track and approximately 9,300 miles of all track. It has 733 diesel

locomotives, some 60,000 freight cars and handles over 73,000,000 tons of freight annually.

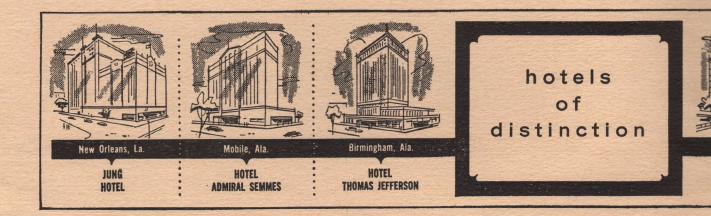

Meals have been eaten on L. & N. trains since the original line between Louis-ville and Nashville was opened in the fall of 1859. However, the L. & N. Railroad itself has been host to its patrons for a somewhat shorter period of time.

Prior to 1901, some meals had been served on Pullmans, but it had been the usual practice to provide food for passengers by stopping the trains at certain established stations. At each of these a halt of sufficient duration was made to enable patrons to appease their hunger at a nearby restaurant. This practice was continued to a limited extent, with certain trains, even as late as the 1940s. Prior to World War II a passenger could also arrange to have a box lunch delivered to him aboard some trains by having the conductor wire ahead.

In October, 1901, the L. & N. placed its first diners in service. These were three in number and proved so popular that a number of others were obtained soon thereafter. At the present time, the Dixie Line has 13 all-steel diners, seven tavern-lounge cars and two diner-lounge cars.

Nearly 400,000 meals are now served annually in L. & N. diners. However, more than two million meals were served during each of the peak years of World War II by the carefully planned utilization of available personnel and equipment.

Each of the L. & N.'s diners represents a sizable investment, the cost of placing one on the rails fully equipped amounting to well over \$250,000. Every diner is stocked with approximately 1,000 napkins and 325 table cloths and the value of each's silverware, glassware, chinaware, kitchenware and linens alone is more than \$4,000.

Throughout the years L. & N.'s diners have gained a reputation for the quality of both their food and service. Old Hickory Smoked Country Ham (especially cured for the Dixie Line on a Kentucky farm), the Seafood Platter and a number of other dishes have long been popular with patrons and have spread the fame of the L. & N.'s cuisine far and wide.
