SUGGESTIONS TO AID IN LOCATION OF STATIONS, TIME TABLES AND GENERAL INFORMATION FOR TRAVELERS

Locate point of origin and destination in the Index to Stations, on page 4, giving the table number under which the station will be found. Reference to the map of the NC&StL Railway contained in the center of this folder will indicate the geographical location of station, and prove a further aid in reading the time table. Time from 12:01 midnight to 12:00 o'clock noon is shown in light-faced figures, and from 12:01 noon to 12:00 o'clock midnight in dark-faced figures. (E. T.) Eastern Time. (C. T.) Central Time.

THIS COMPANY IS NOT RESPONSIBLE for errors in time tables, inconvenience or damage resulting from delayed trains or failure to make connections. Schedules herein are subject to change without notice.

CHILDREN under 5 years of age, free, but will not be transported over NC&StL Railway unless accompanied by parent, adult guardian or caretaker. When such children are furnished separate Pullman space from that occupied by the parent, adult guardian or caretaker, charge will be made in accordance with information shown on Page 2, herein. Children 5 years of age and under 12, one-half fare, 12 years of age or over, full fare.

LIMIT OF TICKETS—Tickets presented for passage on a train scheduled to leave any station on NC&StL Railway at or before 4:00 A.M. of day following date of expiration, will be honored for continuous passage on such train and on first connecting train through to destination on NC&StL Railway lines, or junction point of connecting line. Beyond such junction local regulations of connecting line will apply. Ordinarily, one-way tickets are good for use within thirty days, and round-trip tickets 6 months, from date of sale.

STOP-OVERS, unless otherwise specified, permitted generally at all points on NC&StL Railway, within final limit of ticket. Consult agents and conductors.

ADJUSTMENT OF FARES—In case of exception by Conductor or Agent, pay fare required, take receipt and communicate with General Passenger Agent, Nashville 2, Tenn., or other agent.

REDEMPTION OF TICKETS—Rail tickets wholly unused, or partly used, will be redeemed at proper value when forwarded to General Passenger Agent, Nashville 2, Tenn., with satisfactory explanation for non-use.

PETS—Dogs, cats or other domesticated animals, of a harmless, inoffensive or unobjectionable nature, when carried in closed baskets, cages or containers and complying with existing quarantine or public health regulations, may, without additional charge, accompany purchasers of Pullman room accommodations, under the care and responsibility of such person or persons, but, otherwise will not be permitted to travel in Pullman cars. Pullman regulations covering transportation of blind persons, accompanied by "guide" or "Seeing-Eye" dogs, provide that where available, room accommodations will be furnished at regular berth or seat rates. Above mentioned pets will not be accepted for transportation with passengers occupying coach accommodations over NC&StL Railway, but must be checked in baggage service, subject to tariff regulations, with the exception of "guide" or "Seeing-Eye" dogs traveling with blind persons, as noted in the following paragraph.

TRANSPORTATION OF BLIND AND DISABLED PERSONS—A blind person, accompanied by a "guide" or "Seeing-Eye" dog, safely muzzled and on a strong leash, holding a certificate or official document indicating such dog has been trained by a recognized agency or school, may occupy coach accommodations over NC&StL Railway

or have the dog carried in baggage car at no additional charge. Regulation of The Pullman Company, referred to in above paragraph, will apply when traveling in Pullman cars. Whether traveling in Pullman or NC&StL Railway coach equipment, the owner or custodian shall be responsible for the safekeeping and general behavior of the dog at all times, so far as other passengers are concerned.

Blind persons, if capable of traveling alone, will not be required to have a caretaker, may purchase tickets and will be given such assistance by station employees and trainmen as may be necessary for their safety in getting on or off trains.

BAGGAGE—This Company cannot guarantee to forward baggage on same train with passenger, and when necessary, baggage of passengers will be forwarded on other trains. To facilitate prompt receipt of their baggage at destination, passengers are advised to arrange for forwarding on a preceding train. Baggage for stations where no agent is on duty (inquire on checking baggage) must be claimed at Baggage Car immediately on arrival at that station; otherwise it will be carried to first station where agent is on duty and will be held for further orders.

BAGGAGE MAXIMA—No single piece of baggage exceeding 300 pounds in weight or 72 inches in greatest dimension or single shipment exceeding \$2,500 in value will be checked.

BAGGAGE ALLOWANCE subject to tariff regulations as to contents, weight, value, size and nominal service charge which, generally speaking, permits checking 150 pounds of baggage or property not exceeding \$100.00 in value, on each adult ticket, and 75 pounds and not exceeding \$50.00 in value, on each half-fare ticket. **BAGGAGE LIABILITY LIMITED**—Excess value, if any, to be declared and paid for at time of checking. A short-term policy of the St. Paul Fire & Marine Insurance Company, insuring all baggage taken on a trip, whether worn, carried or checked, may be purchased at principal offices. The coverage is liberal and the rates are low. Minimum premium 25c. Ask Baggage Agents for particulars. **BICYCLE** (not Motorcycle). **BABY CARRIAGES** and **GUNS**, are transported in baggage cars and are included in weight and value of passenger's baggage.

HAND BAGGAGE in Pullman cars is restricted to that which may be conveniently placed in the berth, seat or other accommodation purchased by the passenger. **LOST ARTICLES**—When articles are lost on trains or left in waiting rooms at stations, owners should report at once to agent at station where they leave the train. **NO RESPONSIBILITY IS ASSUMED** for unchecked articles left in stations or cars. **RAILWAY EXPRESS AGENCY, INC.**, operates over entire NC&StL Railway.

WESTERN UNION TELEGRAMS—A new service for rail travelers has been inaugurated by the telegraph company in cooperation with the railroads. Write your message on a special telegraph blank available in Pullman cars and hand it to the porter for sending. The cost may be charged to your home address, to your business charge account, Western Union Credit Card number, or sent collect. There is no delay in figuring tolls or making change. The Western Union Telegraph Company handles messages at public telegraph offices on the NC&StL Railway.
