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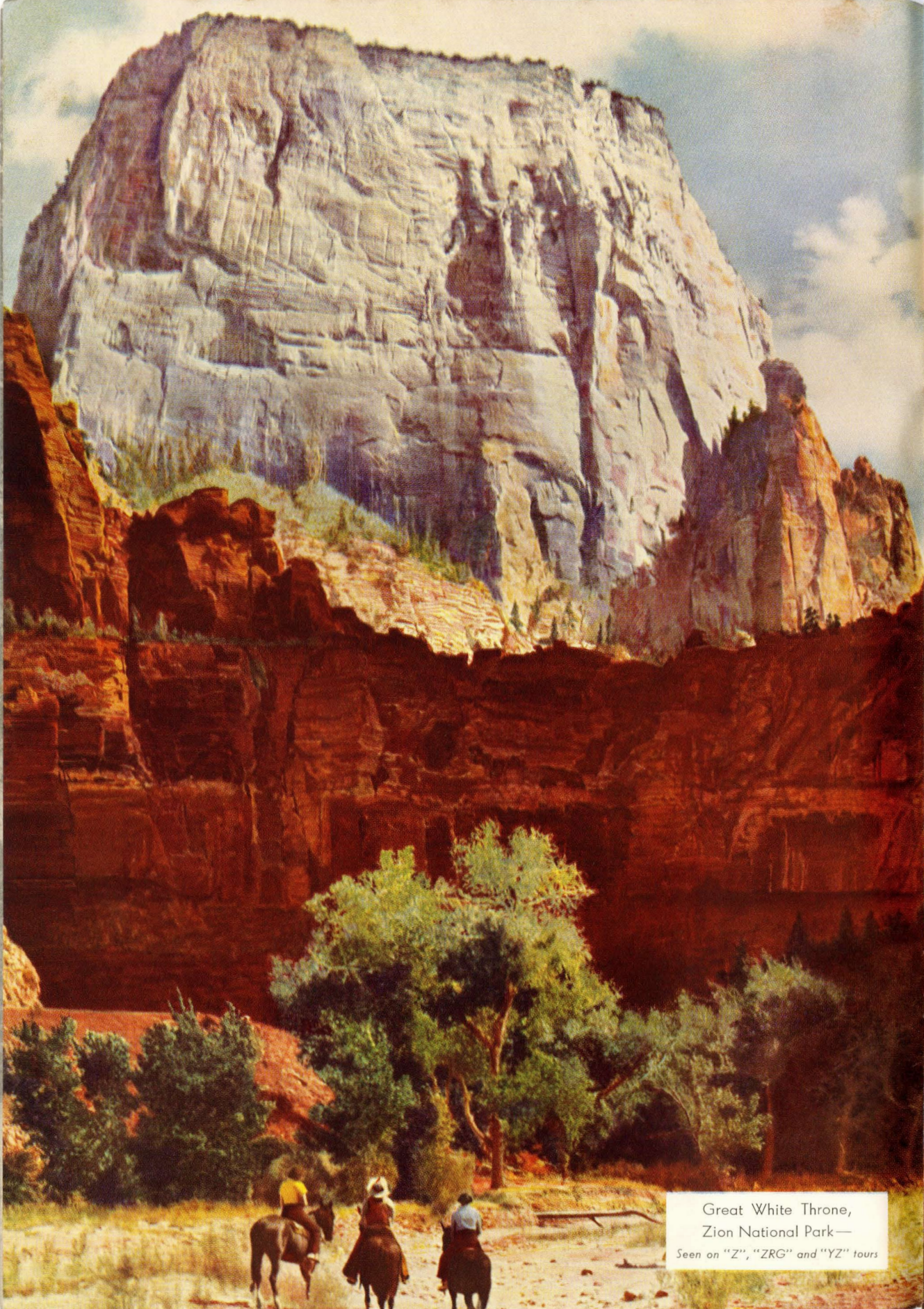

THIS summer Yellowstone will solve the vacation problems of many. And it's not to be wondered at. In Yellowstone there is more to see—more different sorts of things—more strange and curious things—more scope, more variety than in any other of our National Parks.

Yellowstone is vast, wild, unspoiled. It has lofty peaks, immense lakes, majestic rivers, wild flowers in profusion. It has forests, living and fossil—it has glaciers at its borders—and, in addition, the matchless canyon and the amazing geysers. Truly, it is Nature's Curiosity Shop—boiling springs, mud-volcanoes, multi-colored canyons, waterfalls; and as for geysers, there are more here than in all the rest of the world together. And no other place holds within its borders such numbers of so many different species of native American big game.

In Yellowstone you travel and live in perfect comfort. You can photograph a friendly bear in its native habitat and eat a course dinner within the same hour—see buffalo, moose, elk and deer from the comfortable seat of a touring car—view geysers, the canyon, lofty mountains and flashing mountain lakes and streams, yet sleep in a bed as good as the one you left at home. There is no discomfort—no danger, no weariness to mar your pleasure. You cannot help but enjoy your Yellowstone days.

Nor are the pleasures of Yellowstone restricted to daylight hours. Evening entertainment is varied and enjoyable. You may dance to the siren strains of an enchanting orchestra—find fun and diversion around the campfire—and for something instructive as well as entertaining, there's the nightly talk by the Park Ranger-Naturalist. And most everyone goes out to see the bears at their evening meal—they're a whole show in themselves.

When you see Yellowstone you will naturally want to see it all. And you can. All of our Yellowstone tours enter the park at West Yellowstone, conveniently situated at the park boundary. Each makes a complete circle tour of the park (see map on page 8), visiting all the innumerable show places in the sequence of their importance. Indeed, with one of our tours you will find that you see *all* of Yellowstone.

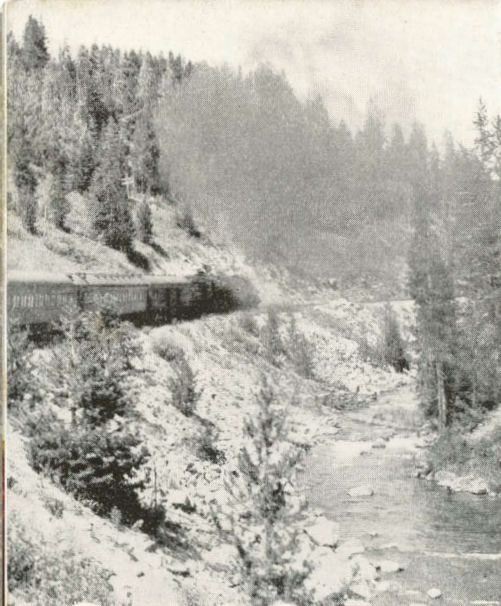
The approach to this most famous of all our National parks is superbly scenic. The air conditioned car you boarded at Chicago approaches the park over a line the Union Pacific built with the major aim of giving you quick access to Yellowstone's fascinations. Your vacation dreams need brook no delay.

After leaving Pocatello, Idaho, you swing northward through fertile, irrigated farmlands and

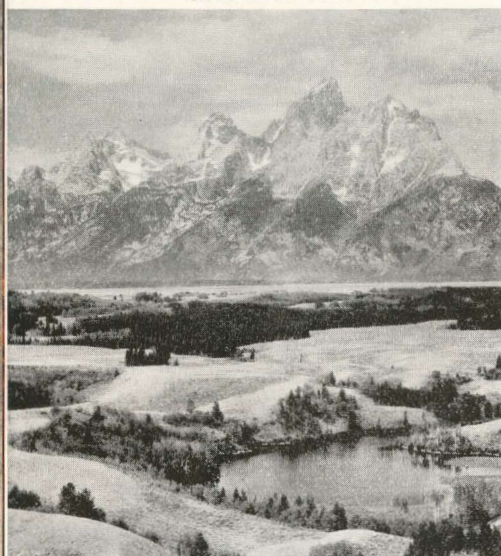


Old Faithful in Action
Yellowstone National Park

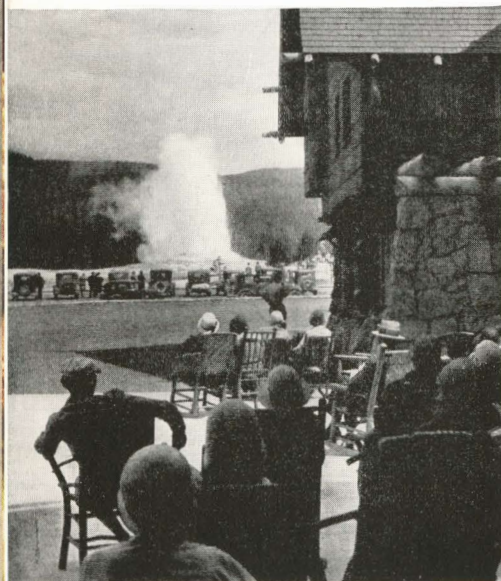

orchards to Idaho Falls. From there you come gradually into the heavily forested mountainous region to the north. As you near Yellowstone, you rise rapidly . . . more than 2000 feet between Pocatello and West Yellowstone . . . for Yellowstone is a great plateau ringed with mountains and is literally "on top of the world," as the Continental Divide cuts across the Park.

You travel up the winding and picturesque valley of the Snake River, catching glimpses of many memorable snapshots from the amazing camera of Nature . . . the narrow basalt channel of the Snake River . . . Caribou Peak . . . Three Buttes. At Ashton an oil burning locomotive replaces coal, for you are now entering the stately Targhee National Forest with its miles and miles of beautiful pines, which must be guarded against stray sparks.

You catch glimpses of the mighty Teton Mountains. It's a thrill you'll long remember . . . rugged Alp-like peaks silhouetted against the eastern horizon, their snowy crests visible from afar. It has been said, "The Tetons look more like you would expect mountains to really look than any other range in America."

Presently you come to Rea's Pass on the crest of the Continental Divide, and it is only a short run from there to West Yellowstone, the Park's most popular gateway. It is used by more visitors annually than any other entrance because of the splendid transportation over this route and the fine scenic approach. Then, too, it is the nearest to the geyser basins . . . a Yellowstone feature everyone is eager to see first of all.

At West Yellowstone you make a convenient change from train to bus. There is no delay. You enter the park immediately and are on your way through the Madison Canyon to "Geyser Land." It is a leisurely trip and rightly so—there's much to see and you simply must see it all . . . Old Faithful Geyser, Castle Geyser, Grand, Beehive, Riverside and many others. You marvel at it all—gaze in wonderment at the freaks that nature has produced—never tire of searching for new thrills, which you are always sure to find.

After seeing all the sights around Old Faithful you again board the bus for an interesting ride past Shoshone Lake, crossing the Divide twice within an hour, and to beautiful Yellowstone Lake, 7,760 feet above sea level, the largest lake in America at such a height. A night is spent at Yellowstone Lake, and there is ample opportunity to enjoy a boat trip or perhaps to try your luck at fishing. Next morning you are off for Grand Canyon, stopping en route at uncanny Mud Volcano and weird Dragon's Mouth Spring.

For grandeur, majesty and color no single spectacle in Yellowstone compares with the Grand Canyon. Were there no geysers this alone would be reason enough for visiting this unique region. Cut 1,200 feet through a forested plateau, its precipitous sides are carved and fretted in a thousand curious formations, and the whole is streaked and spotted

in every shade from deepest orange to faintest lemon; from deepest crimson to softest pink; from black through grays and pearls to glistening white. Towards the southern end magnificent Great Falls, twice the height of Niagara, rushes seemingly out of the pine-clad hills and pours downward to be lost in green. Viewed from either Inspiration Point or Artist Point it is indeed a matchless spectacle. Rudyard Kipling, who saw the Canyon and Falls in 1899, wrote with a master's lyric touch of its depth and color—"All I can say is that without warning or preparation I looked into a gulf more than a thousand feet deep, with eagles and fish hawks circling far below. And the sides of the gulf were one wild welter of color—crimson, emerald, cobalt, ochre, amber, honey splashed with port wine, snow-white, vermillion, lemon and silver gray in wide washes. The sides did not fall sheer, but were graven by time and water and air into monstrous heads of kings, dead chiefs—men and women of old time. So far below that no sound reached us, the Yellowstone River ran, a finger-wide strip of jade green. The sunlight took those wondrous walls and gave fresh hues to those that nature had already laid there. Evening crept through the pines that shadowed us, but the full glory of the day flamed in that canyon."

Your last day's trip in the park is most interesting. First along the canyon. Then past Point Lookout, Grand View, and up through Dunraven Pass and on to Tower Falls, the most graceful cataract in the park. Just beyond, in Tower Canyon, you see the slender, tower-like rock formations known as The Needles. Tucked among them is one gigantic pinnacle, The Needle, nearly 300 feet high and the largest formation of this type extant. Near here also is an impressive cliff of columnar basalt known as the Overhanging Cliff. Many interesting sights are seen on this road, including Elk Creek, Blacktail Creek, Beaver Dam and House, Wraith Falls and Undine Falls. Mt. Everts, Bunsen Peak and Electric Peak, the highest in the Park, come into view, and a quick shift of the dazzling scenery brings you to Mammoth Hot Springs. Before luncheon there is a trip with the ranger-naturalist over the trails to see all of the beautiful terraces in their varied tints and hues. The afternoon drive is packed with weird sights—Hoodoos, Apollinaris Spring, Obsidian Cliff, Roaring Mountain, Norris Geyser Basin, the earth's thinnest crust, Chocolate Pots and Gibbon Falls.

When you have seen it all with your own eyes you will know that you have been as near to Nature's secret laboratories as it is possible for any human to get!

Salt Lake City, Utah

Salt Lake City, the capital of Utah and of the Inter-Mountain empire, has much to offer the vacationist beyond its early Mormon associations and its great salt sea. Nestling in the curve of a huge crescent formed by the canyon-

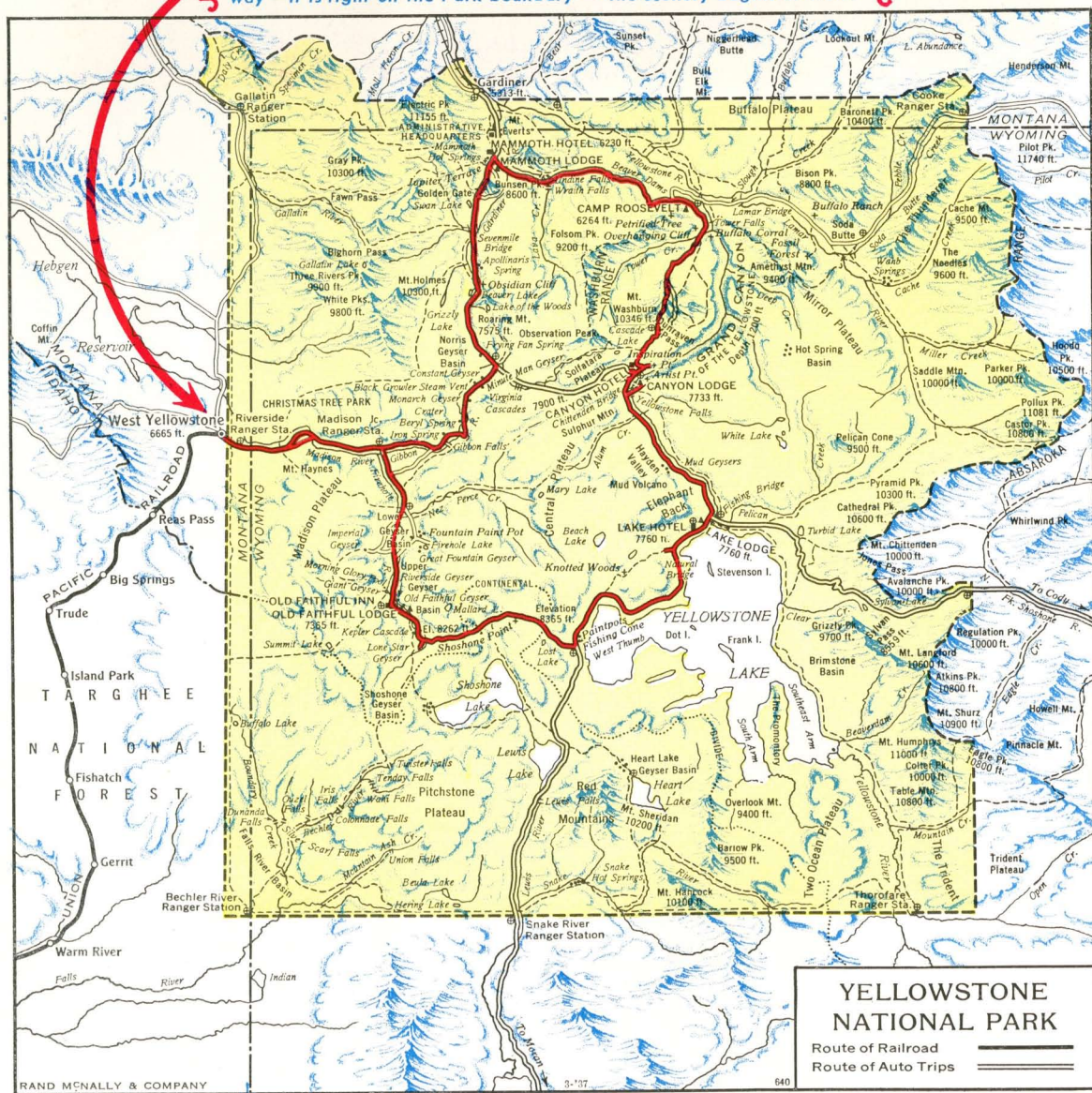

divided peaks of the Wasatch Mountains, and with the great lake in its front yard, it is aptly termed, "The most entrancingly beautiful city in America."

As its beauty appeals to the esthetic part of your nature, so do Salt Lake City's resorts and places of amusement appeal to your desire for wholesome diversion. Saltair, the only bathing beach of its kind on the western hemisphere, is one of these. Your experience here is little short of phenomenal. If you wish, don a bathing suit and step into the water—then feel yourself literally lifted off your feet! Sink? You can't! The water, a solution of 25 per cent salt, buoys you up as though you were a feather!

Nearly every visitor to Salt Lake City gives his attention first to Temple Square. On this far-famed ten-acre plot has been built the Temple, Tabernacle, Museum and other buildings of the Latter Day Saints (Mormon) Church. The marvelous acoustic properties of the huge, dome-roofed Tabernacle, which was constructed without the use of nails, and the mellow-toned pipe organ which it houses, are among the world's wonders. The tour parties visit Temple Square and the Tabernacle for the organ recital as a special courtesy of the Mormon Church.

More people enter the Park at West Yellowstone than any other gateway—it is right on the Park boundary—"the scenery begins at once."

And everywhere Nature puts on her amazing show.

After Yellowstone comes a full day of sightseeing in and about beautiful Salt Lake City, the home of the Mormons.

Appeals to you doesn't it? Remember, too, that it's truly an all-expense vacation; that every necessary item of expense is included . . . yet the cost is most reasonable.

Day by Day Story of "Y" Tours

Saturday or Wednesday With every detail cared for by a staff of travel experts who attend you at the Chicago & North Western's Chicago Passenger Station, you leave on one of the Overland Route's completely air-conditioned trains. All night you travel across agricultural Illinois and Iowa, pausing next morning at Omaha where your train begins its swift flight over the Union Pacific's boulevard of steel, direct to Yellowstone. You will enjoy the roomy observation car.

Sunday or Thursday Across Nebraska's grain fields and into Wyoming—Cheyenne, the famous Sherman Hill, Laramie, then Creston where you cross the continental divide. Your dining car meals, an important part of any transcontinental rail trip, will be a source of particular joy.

Monday or Friday You arrive at West Yellowstone, Mont., in the afternoon after traversing a mountainous region whose ever-changing series of panoramas is unequalled. In succession stately Targhee Forest—Rea's Pass—Warm River Canyon . . . then West Yellowstone and a new world of wonders.

The comfortable motorbuses, which carry you to Old Faithful Inn for your first overnight stop, pause en route at Riverside, Grotto and Giant Geysers, Fountain Paint Pots—in reality molten clay, Morning Glory Pool—so named because of its flowerlike, delicately tinted cone, and other interesting formations. Peer deeply into Firehole Lake and you can readily imagine that underneath the water are blue flames, jetting from some underground furnace.

In the evening watch the antics of the bears—dance to the strains of a melodious orchestra—enjoy the entertainment around the campfire—or just rest and watch Old Faithful go through its hourly performance with a giant searchlight playing on it—a truly unforgettable scene.

Tuesday or Saturday Old Faithful, just a step from the inn is the favorite among the geysers because of its regularity. You have all morning to explore this "weirdest spot in the universe," either conducted by your escort or a ranger of the National Park Service; or you may "go-as-you-please." You will see other unusual sights—such oddities as Black Sand Pool, a hot springs described by its own name. Sapphire Pool, as blue as the gem for which it is named.

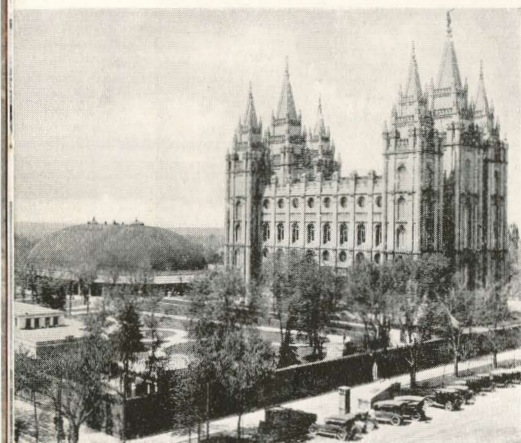
In the afternoon you motor across the continental divide to lovely Yellowstone Lake, where you spend the night. En route you stop at Kepler Cascades and cross the continental divide at Isa Lake, whose waters flow into the Atlantic and the Pacific. You also stop on the shore of Yellowstone Lake to see Fishing Cone and Thumb Paint Pots.

Wednesday or Sunday After breakfast you leave via Fishing Bridge for Grand Canyon. Words fail you—you catch your breath at each new view of the Yellowstone Falls in their stupendous settings as you make your way from one vantage point to another, afoot, in the saddle or by bus. Dancing, bridge, entertainment galore, enliven the evening hours at Canyon Hotel.

Thursday or Monday A fascinating motor trip is made over spectacular Dunraven Pass. You stop at Tower Falls, well named because of the numerous towers and pinnacles. Nearby is the lower end of the Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone, with its perpendicular cliffs more than five hundred feet high. Fine views of Electric Peak, Mount Everts and Bunsen Peak are seen before arriving at Mammoth Hot Springs. The morning trip is doubly interesting as it is through the most densely forested section of the park. Even though the forest growth covers fully eighty percent of the park area, the most beautiful specimens of fir, balsam, spruce, cedar and aspen are to be found on this trip. The museum at Mammoth will interest you. An inspection is made of the terraces of Mammoth Hot Springs, which stand without counterpart in the world, then luncheon. You motor past dazzling Obsidian Cliff, see Gibbon Falls and hundreds of other interesting sights—stop at Norris Geyser Basin—and arrive at West Yellowstone in time for dinner. Then an overnight journey to Salt Lake City.



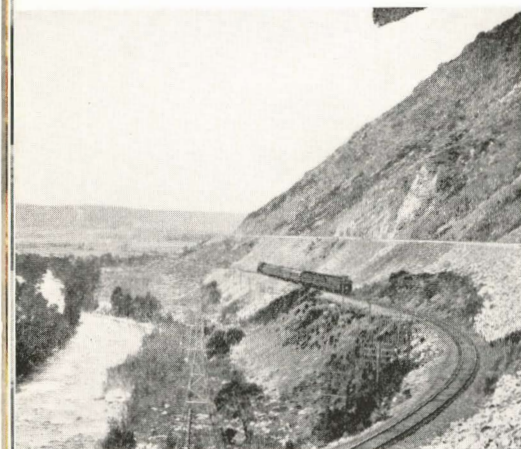

Friday or Tuesday Breakfast at the beautiful Hotel Utah. An automobile tour of the city gives you an intensely interesting picture of Mormon culture and terminates at the Mormon Temple Grounds for a delightful noonday organ recital in the Tabernacle. After luncheon at the Hotel Utah, you motor to Saltair Beach. Ample time is allowed to enjoy a dip in the buoyant waters of this most unique salt sea—after which you return to your train for the journey back home.

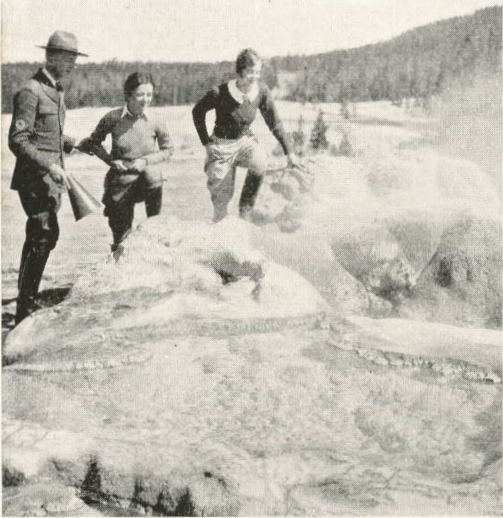

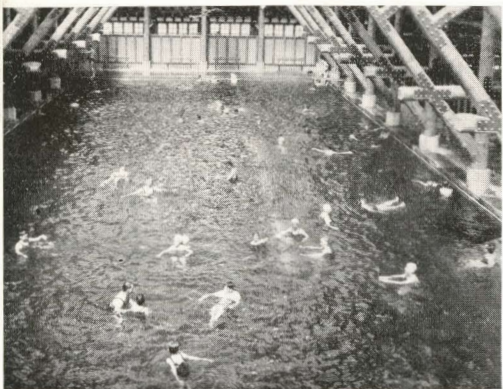

Lunch at Mammoth Hot Springs, and in the afternoon you motor past Obsidian Cliff (Jim Bridger's Mountain of glass) . . . visit the Norris Geyser Basin, Gibbon Falls and on to West Yellowstone for dinner . . . entraining in the evening for Salt Lake City.

Friday or Tuesday Breakfast at Hotel Utah . . . then an interesting tour of this fascinatingly beautiful city . . . viewing many spots rich in memories of the hardy Mormon pioneers who conquered the wilderness of Utah. You see the Tithing, Beehive and Lion Houses, Liberty Park and the famous Tabernacle where you hear the noonday organ concert. In the afternoon an automobile tour to Saltair Beach where you may have a novel experience—a dip in the buoyant waters of Great Salt Lake. After dinner at the Hotel Utah you are off for Colorado.

Saturday or Wednesday A train ride you'll long remember . . . all day amid lofty mountains, deep canyons, rushing streams . . . through Eagle River Canyon . . . past the awe-inspiring Mount of the Holy Cross . . . over Tennessee Pass. Then the Royal Gorge!

Sunday or Thursday The morning is left open to attend church, for independent sightseeing or just to rest. After luncheon at the Antlers automobiles take you into and through the Garden of the Gods, then through Manitou Springs, historic Ute Pass, Cascade and to the summit of Pikes Peak . . . then on to Pyramid Mountain Lodge where a hot dinner is served picnic style. From the veranda of the museum, which Denver maintains at the summit of the peak and which houses the relics of the active life of Colonel Cody (Buffalo Bill), you can look out over Denver to the east—to the south, Pikes Peak—and to the west other great peaks of the Colorado Rockies. You return through Mount Vernon Canyon and the Park of the Red Rocks, climaxing your fascinating journey with a delicious luncheon at the Cosmopolitan Hotel.

The afternoon is open to visit friends, catch up on correspondence, do some last-minute shopping or to become more intimately acquainted with this interesting city. Dinner at the Cosmopolitan Hotel. An early evening departure for home.

Tuesday or Saturday Homeward bound across the quiet fields of Nebraska, Iowa and Illinois . . . arriving in Chicago in the afternoon . . . with glorious memories, new friends, new enthusiasms . . . and new energy to tackle old jobs during the coming year. A vacation indelibly engraved on your Memory Book of the future.

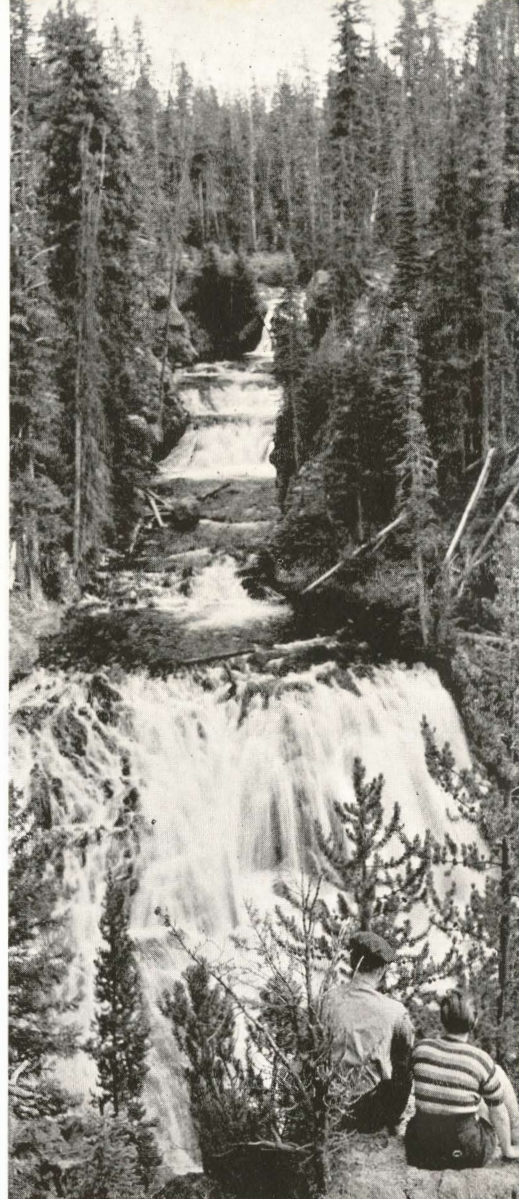

At the head of the canyon a waterfall of amazing height and symmetry leaps from the evergreen hills and is lost in its own cloud of swirling spray. See it from the saddle . . . by motor . . . or join a hiking party. And you may wish to visit the bear feeding grounds and watch them "perform" during mealtime.

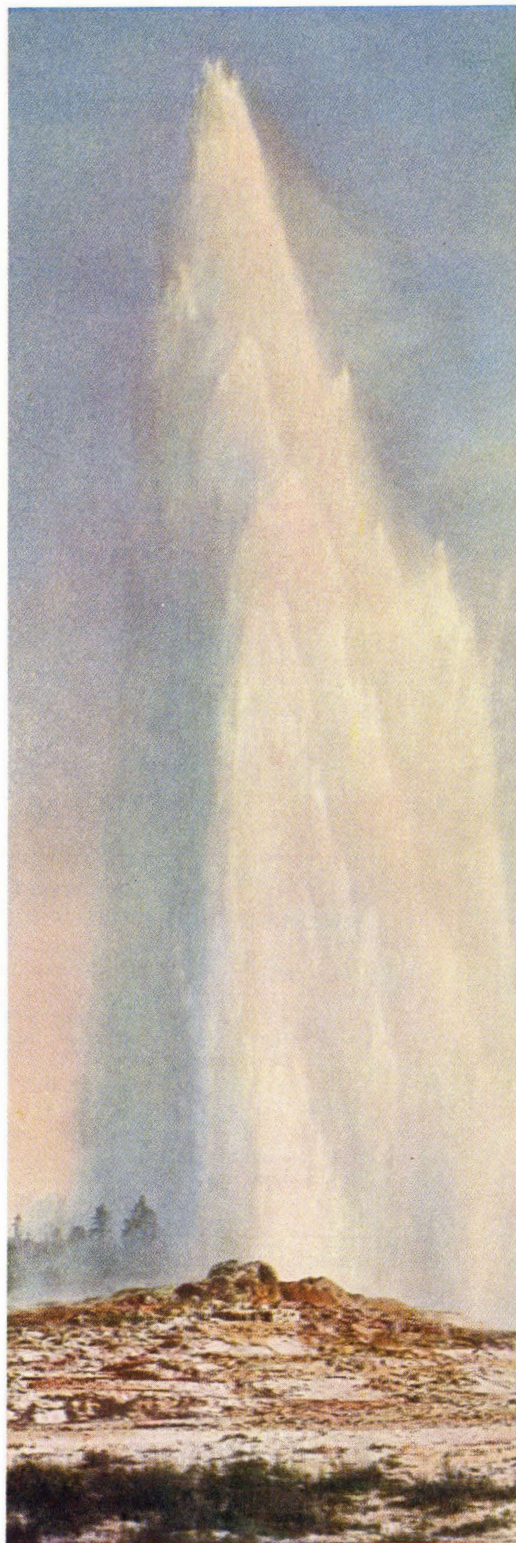

National Park Trails reveal breath-taking scenes

Suddenly you find yourself peering over the edge of a cliff and there before you is a new world of dazzling color and strange forms. Stretching out for miles you see curiously shaped masses of red, pink, salmon and white limestone. Time, water and frost are the sculptors and they have been working on this masterpiece for no one knows how many ages.

Leaving it you travel eastward . . . through a region of black lava rock that tells of long-forgotten volcanoes . . . through lovely evergreen forests . . . through Red Canyon, walled with red rock, decorated with columns of pink and ruby . . . and on to Bryce Canyon.

The Indians used to call Bryce "Unka-Timpie-Wa-Wince-Poc-Ich" which is short for "Bowl-shaped-canyon-filled-with-red-rocks-standing-up-like-men." You may smile at their naive attempt to describe the canyon; but after you've seen it you realize that any attempt to describe these sublime scenes is somewhat amateurish. You feel so many things out here that are extremely difficult to put into words.

Here at Bryce—as at Cedar Breaks—you come upon the scene suddenly. Your first glimpse is in the late afternoon, when the whole canyon is ablaze in the red rays of the sinking sun. There below you, in an immense semicircular amphitheatre, is the strangest, most fantastic sight on earth. Half close your eyes and the scene looks like a huge bowl of garnets, amethysts and rubies. Open your eyes and you see the ruins of a great city, with palaces, temples, minarets and statues everywhere, all shining as if just now re-painted.

After watching the miracle of sunset over Bryce Canyon you return to Bryce Canyon Lodge for the night and in the morning you are up early to make the most of every possible moment. You have a full day here at Bryce and undoubtedly you will want to take one of the foot or horseback trails down into the canyon itself.

Leaving Bryce next day you journey past the spectacular Vermillion Cliffs, across the Prismatic Plains, through Kanab and Fredonia. Scenes of grandeur unfold before you as you ascend the great Kaibab Plateau to reach the Kaibab Forest. For more than fifty miles you drive through a forest of evergreen and aspen, as clean and free from underbrush as a city park. From its quiet glades you will see hundreds of deer, and occasionally you will "spot" one of the rare and beautiful white-tailed squirrels that are found only here.

The forest ends suddenly, dramatically, as at Bryce and Cedar Breaks, and you find yourself looking out over the lofty North Rim into the vast depths of Grand Canyon. There in the awful stillness below you, lies as sublime a scene as you will ever look upon. In that chasm, thirteen miles wide and two hundred miles long, is a whole mountain range; and one mile down, at the foot of the range, is the roaring Colorado River . . . but to you, on the rim, it is only a tiny thread in the silent, misty distance. You will never forget this scene, for you will feel here, more poignantly than ever before, the vastness and grandeur of Creation.

As you look out over the Grand Canyon you see a perfect kaleidoscope of color. Artists have found it almost impossible to paint, for within the space of an hour the canyon colorings change so rapidly they have an entirely different picture before them . . . but you'll find tremendous satisfaction in that endless play of lavenders, golds and purples. You have a full day at Grand Canyon, with an auto tour to Point Imperial and Cape Royal for a view of what many consider the most awe inspiring sight on earth.

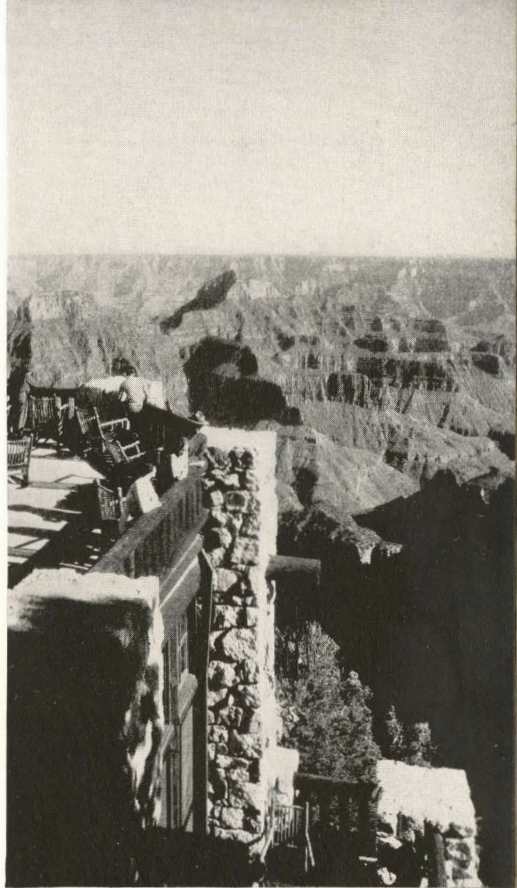
Turning north again, you recross the quiet glades of the Kaibab . . . across the impressive Prismatic Plains . . . past miles and miles of Vermilion Cliffs until you finally arrive at the new Mt. Carmel highway and pass through its mile-long motor tunnel—a miracle of modern engineering skill. The tunnel is pierced by six huge windows, each framing a picture of startling grandeur.

The road, after leaving the tunnel, winds gently down to the valley that is Zion Canyon. On either side of you are the canyon walls—and yet they are not walls, technically. They are buttes. But “buttes” is a weak word for these mighty mountain masses. The old Mormon pioneers, moved by the sublime beauty of these peaks, gave them imaginative, dramatically appropriate names: The Mountain of the Sun, The Mountain of Mystery, The Towers of the Virgin, the Three Patriarchs, Angel's Landing, The Great West Temple, the Altar of Sacrifice, and, noblest of all, the Great White Throne . . . and no mountain in America inspires more reverent admiration than the Great White Throne.

At Cedar Breaks, Bryce and Grand Canyon you found yourself for the most part looking down at the scenery below you. Here at Zion it is just the reverse. You will also note a pronounced difference in the coloring. Zion is sandstone country and the colors are not stratified but grouped into rather large masses. Also, here you will find the rocks covered with a shiny coating or “desert varnish” which gives the color amazing lustre.

A motor road leads deep into the canyon. Great red precipices rise in sheer grandeur on either side of the narrow valley. At the end of the road is a tiny clearing studded with trees and shrubbery—a lovely green garden in a majestic mountain setting—as enchanting a picture as you will ever see. This exquisite glen, The Temple of Sinawava, has been held in reverent awe by Indian and white man alike.

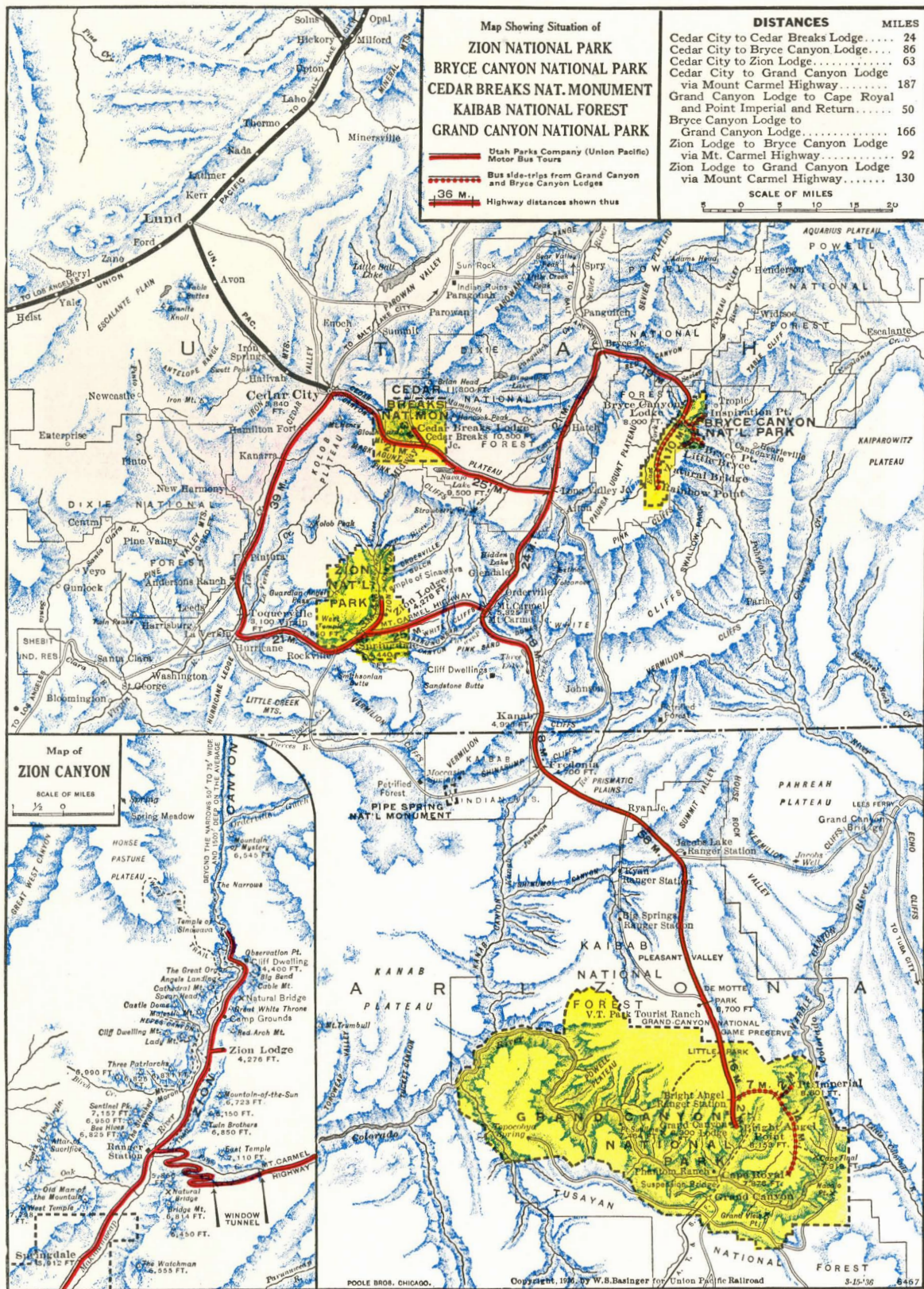
After an overnight stop at Zion Lodge and a morning filled with interesting explorations you say farewell; and as you ride out of the Canyon you glance back regretfully. The mighty red cliffs of Zion slowly become a thin line on the horizon's haze. Presently you are back at Lund. Your train is waiting. What a great trip it was! What a fine time you've had . . . so comfortable, so pleasant and such marvelous food . . . so many new friendships made . . . and what glorious memories!

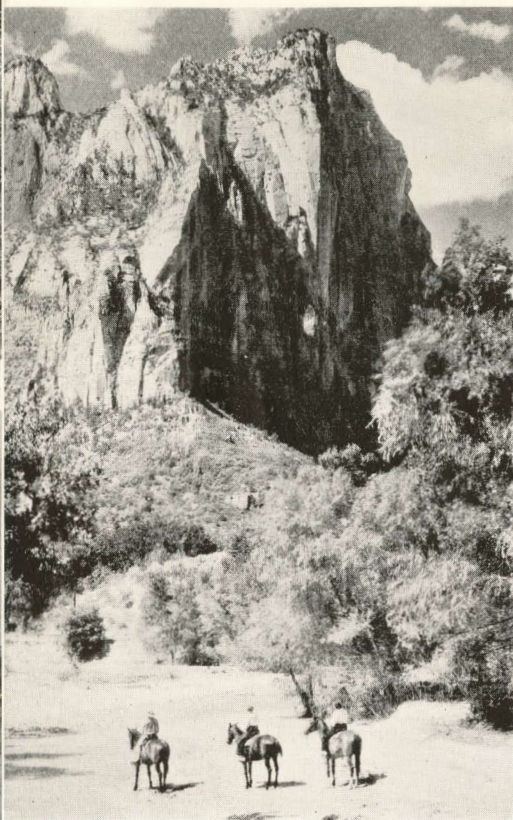

Monday or Thursday Your first night is an indication of the comfort of these Overland Route sleeping cars. Deep and peaceful sleep comes as your train rolls over a roadbed that is nationally famous for its smoothness. You awake rested and ready for breakfast in the dining car.

Many fascinating scenes sweep by your car windows . . . the rolling hills of Western Iowa . . . Council Bluffs . . . busy, bustling Omaha . . . the cornfields of Nebraska . . . cattle grazing . . . waving alfalfa. There's something about this western region that gives you a sense of the vastness, the sheer physical greatness of our country . . . and the wonder of it deepens as you think of the long, bitter fight with the Indians all along this line. You are reminded of the glorious Frontier Days . . . the Pony-Express . . . Buffalo Bill and the memorable trek of the grim Mormons across the trackless plains to the promised land—Utah.

Tuesday or Friday Through Weber Canyon in the early morning . . . then Ogden. After breakfast in the diner you arrive at Salt Lake City and motor over the city's charming streets and boulevards. This capital city, home of the Mormons, has many interesting sights to offer the visitor. As you ride over its broad, clean avenues and observe its beautiful homes, its parks and public buildings, you, too, will agree that it has been appropriately called "the most entrancingly beautiful city in America." At noon, the organ recital in the world-famous Tabernacle, just one of the interesting features of the Mormon Temple Grounds. Luncheon at the Hotel Utah and then by motor to Saltair Beach for a dip in Great Salt Lake . . . dinner at the Utah . . . an evening open to enjoy the city . . . leave for the parks at night.

Wednesday or Saturday After breakfast you board luxurious motor coaches and are whisked away for this Tour of Tours . . . through Cedar Canyon and Dixie National Forest. Your first introduction to this colorful land is Cedar Breaks, a vast escarpment at the edge of the plateau over which you have been motoring. A vision of kaleidoscopic color rises before your startled eyes. Purple, pink, coral, salmon, ochre, buff, white, and many other shades of red, yellow and white shimmer in the noon-day sun. Strange forms appear—curious freaks of erosion in the limestone cliffs.

You lunch at Cedar Breaks and shortly afterward leave for Bryce Canyon National Park. Here the formations are still more fantastic and infinitely more numerous. Your first glimpse of this wonderful natural amphitheatre is in the late afternoon. Sunset enlivens the myriad tints of Bryce Canyon's fragile formations and presents the towering peaks and colorful depths at their best. It is as though you behold a ruined Oriental City overspread with color. Bryce Canyon includes some of the most interesting of the Pink Cliff formations. The rocks which are present in this strata are among the most colorful of any forming the earth's crust. As the shadows deepen, you will return to the Lodge.

Thursday or Sunday You have all day to spend along the rim . . . down the trails . . . wherever you go you find something new and startling. The softer parts of the high plateau have been etched away, leaving an endless array of towers, spires, statues, minarets, fortresses, pagodas, castles and cathedrals standing in indescribably weird formation. And so accurately has Nature's skill carved out the innumerable designs that there is no need to stretch your imagination to discern the various figures that your guide will point out to you at every bend in the trail. Indeed, as you gaze upon its eerie carvings and exquisite colorings, Bryce might well become a Dream City of a remote age, set apart, as it were, for mortals to see and enjoy.

Friday or Monday Leave Bryce Canyon after luncheon for Grand Canyon National Park, stopping at Kanab. Over the winding road, through sparkling canyons, out across the plains . . . past Vermilion Cliffs . . . then deep into the Kaibab, with its abundance of deer, its shy white-tailed squirrels. Significantly enough, here in the Kaibab National Forest one finds the largest stand of virgin White Pine on the North American continent. Before you realize it you are receiving an enthusiastic welcome at Grand Canyon Lodge . . . then a dash for the Lodge's "Million Dollar Window" or the Canyon's rim for the first breath-taking view of Nature's most stupendous spectacle.

There is nothing in the world which approaches the Grand Canyon in form, size and glowing color. It is the most spectacular example of stream erosion. As the dense forests of the Kaibab extend to the very brink of the abyss, you come upon it without warning, disclosed in the sublimity of its temple depths and in the bewildering glory of its gorgeous coloring. Evening events at Grand Canyon are planned for your pleasure. Great log fires . . . informal entertainment . . . perhaps a recount of the thrilling sights of the day . . . music for the dance.

Saturday or Tuesday Grand Canyon from Cape Royal, with its Angels' Window, presents an entirely different view from that of other points along the rim. A mile below and miles away is the Colorado River, rushing, raging. Beyond the opposite rim you can see for miles out across the desert. Point Imperial is likewise fascinating. You see them both on a thrilling motor trip over the Cape Royal Highway.

You have time at Grand Canyon to enjoy its sublime beauty—ever-changing as the sun courses its way from east to west. Rich and vivid tones of gray, green, blue, red and mauve tint its mighty walls and, independent of these, the sunlight pours into the chasm a shifting color parade of exquisite blues and purples, glowing reds and golds. Few, if any, sights can equal that of the Grand Canyon. As you gaze across the 13-mile wide abyss, it seems incredible that nature could have produced anything so stupendous, and yet so beautiful. The immensity of the great chasm hushes you; the great sea of shifting rainbow colors exalts you; and the realization that such a place actually exists fills you with an indefinable awe, a veneration for the sublime that never again leaves you. No wonder John Burroughs called it the Divine Abyss.

Sunday or Wednesday Reluctantly you leave Grand Canyon Lodge; however you will enjoy the afternoon ride through the Kaibab . . . past Jacob's Lake . . . Three Lakes . . . White Cliffs to Mt. Carmel, where you take the famous Mt. Carmel Highway for Zion National Park. Part of this highway is through a mile-long motor tunnel, pierced by six huge, cathedral-like windows looking out upon the tremendous scenes of Zion.

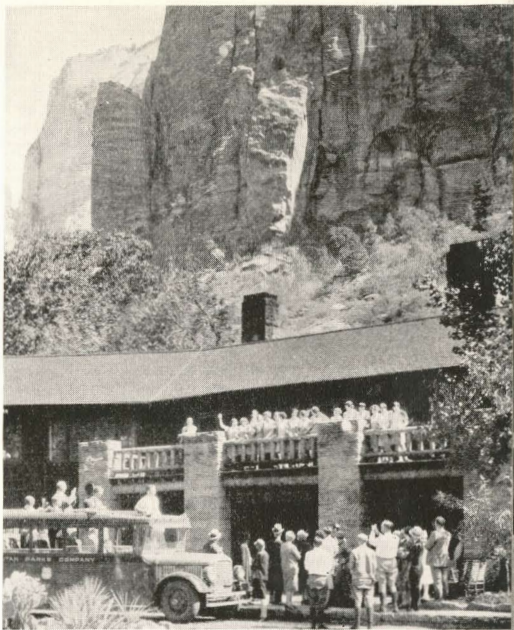
Down, down a sinuous road until you are in Zion Canyon and Zion Lodge. On either side of you are towering red mountains, banded with yellow, pink and gray in remarkable combinations of color, carved into gigantic temples and towers. They rank with the most majestic mountain masses in America . . . and as for color and beauty they are unapproachable. Here for the enjoyment of all, are the Great White Throne, the Three Patriarchs, Mountain of Mystery, the Watchman, the West Temple, the Altar of Sacrifice, etc. One wonders if, in the long, long ago when the world was young, Zion with its stately monoliths was not the playground of the Gods. Well it might have been. In the late afternoon a motor trip to the Temple of Sinawava and an interesting walk with the Park Ranger-Naturalist. Entertainment, nature talks, movies, dancing—in the evening.

Monday or Thursday In the morning you leave for a trip through the fertile region known as "Utah's Dixie," along the highway that leads to Cedar City. A leisurely departure for Lund, where you entrain for the first lap of your journey back home.

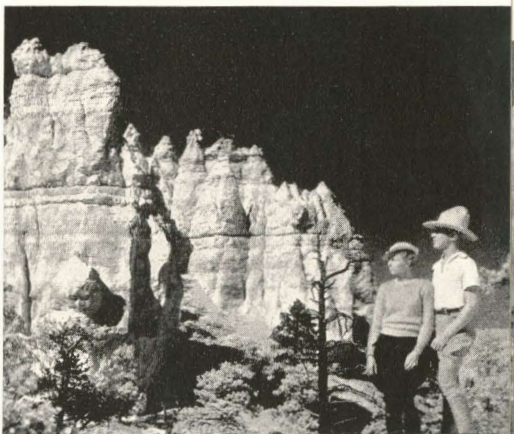

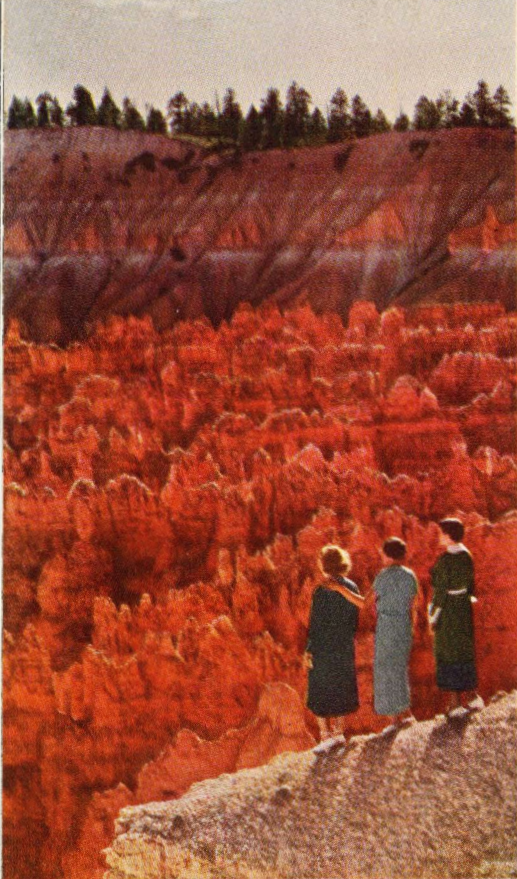
In the beautiful Kaibab Forest

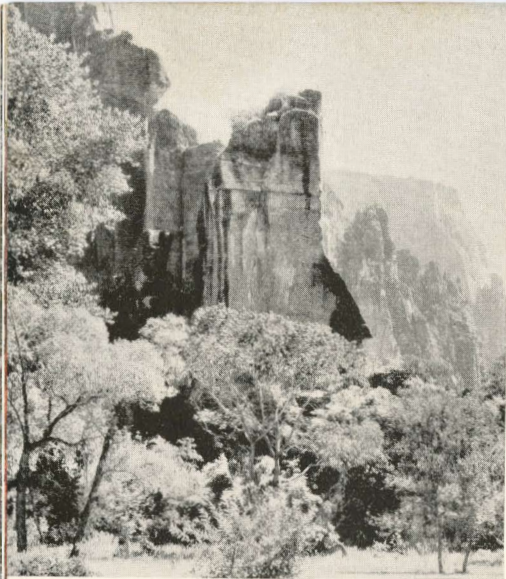

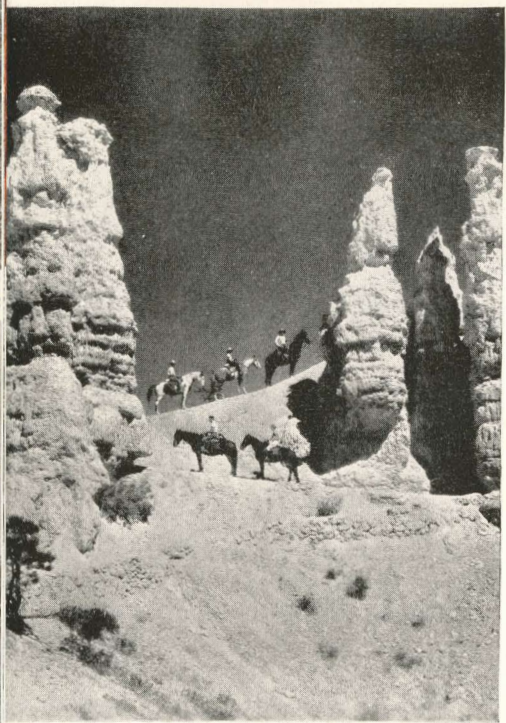

Day by Day Story of "ZRG" Tours

Saturday Relieved of all travel cares at the very outset you leave from the Chicago & North Western's Passenger Station in Chicago. West across Illinois and Iowa your swift journey is safeguarded by continuous automatic train control equipment—an invisible guardian of safety.

Sunday From Omaha, which you reach in the morning hours, you travel over the Union Pacific—across Nebraska, the northeast tip of Colorado, and into Wyoming, with stops at cities famous in frontier history.

Monday Through beautiful Weber Canyon, then Ogden and Salt Lake City. You motor away for a delightful drive, terminating at the Mormon Temple Grounds for the noon organ recital. Luncheon and dinner at the Hotel Utah. The afternoon is devoted to a motor trip to Great Salt Lake, where you enjoy the novelty of a dip. The evening is free, train leaving after midnight for Southern Utah (sleepers ready for occupancy at 9:30 p. m.).

Tuesday And now into waiting motor coaches for the eventful trip to Cedar Breaks National Monument, majestic, vast, colorful. An artist has counted more than sixty tints in Cedar Breaks, whose vast amphitheatres are eroded to a depth of 2,000 feet in an area of 60 square miles. As you stand on the rim of this scintillating show-place you are impressed with the power of Nature's mighty processes.

After lunch at Cedar Breaks you motor through beautiful forests and open "parks," through fantastic Red Canyon, to Bryce Canyon National Park, where you arrive in the late afternoon. Bryce Canyon Lodge is situated only a short way from the rim of the canyon and you are quartered in modern, comfortable cabins. Bryce Canyon will awe the senses with its labyrinth of grotesque but beautiful figures carved in rock, flame-vivid in color and tinted with every shade of the spectrum. Overnight at Bryce.

Wednesday All day at Bryce—and there are side trips and trail trips without limit. A most popular trip is into the canyon which may be visited by horseback or on foot. An experienced guide will lead the way, entertaining with his droll western wit.

Thursday After luncheon you leave Bryce for a drive to the South across a country of spectacular color and grandeur. A short stop at Kanab and soon afterward you are ascending to the top of a vast plateau, lifted half a mile above the surrounding countryside. On its broad top is the Kaibab National Forest, one of the largest virgin forests in the United States. The Kaibab, a fine stand of towering pines and graceful aspen, is the home of a herd of over 20,000 deer, some of which will come to greet you as you motor through their favorite haunts.

Your ride ends abruptly and most sensationally at the very brink of Grand Canyon as your bus comes to Grand Canyon Lodge. You will enjoy the comforts and the atmosphere of informality at the Lodge.

Friday All day at Grand Canyon. In the afternoon a motor trip to Cape Royal and Point Imperial. Saddle trips are available. Or perhaps you may prefer to bask in the sunshine on the Canyon's rim and "drink in" the stupendous panorama before you, beauty that changes every hour. Dancing and entertainment during the evening.

Saturday You drive through the majestic Kaibab across the Prismatic Plains, then over one of the most unusual mountain highways in the world. The new Mt. Carmel Highway defies description. Its major tunnel, over a mile long, is pierced at six points by portals, each of which frames an imposing vista. The road winds gently down to Zion National Park. Temples, two great domes crested with crimson that bleeds down their pale sides. Then the great red sandstone pile of the Watchman, looking serenely down upon the valley. Almost before your driver has named it, the stains of crimson on the summit of a white precipice have suggested its name—the Altar of Sacrifice. On the left runs the great Streaked Wall, its top broken into strange white cones. In the late afternoon Zion Park Lodge welcomes you . . . and with mingled feelings of awe and reverence you gaze upon the stately, crimsoned-stained monoliths of Zion. A motor trip to the Temple of Sinawava and the Narrows permits a close-up of this region of enchantment. One might well wonder how it was possible, even for Mother Nature, to produce such a masterpiece in sculpture and color. Dinner at the Lodge. In the evening an interesting talk by the Park Naturalist, a dance, or a walk out under the star-lit heavens.

Sunday After breakfast you leave Zion feeling that you have seen one of Nature's truly noble scenes. Your motor takes you through "Utah's Dixie," a fertile valley studded with quaint Mormon villages dating back to the early pioneers. Looking back, you see the red cliffs of Zion in the distance and soon you are back at Lund. 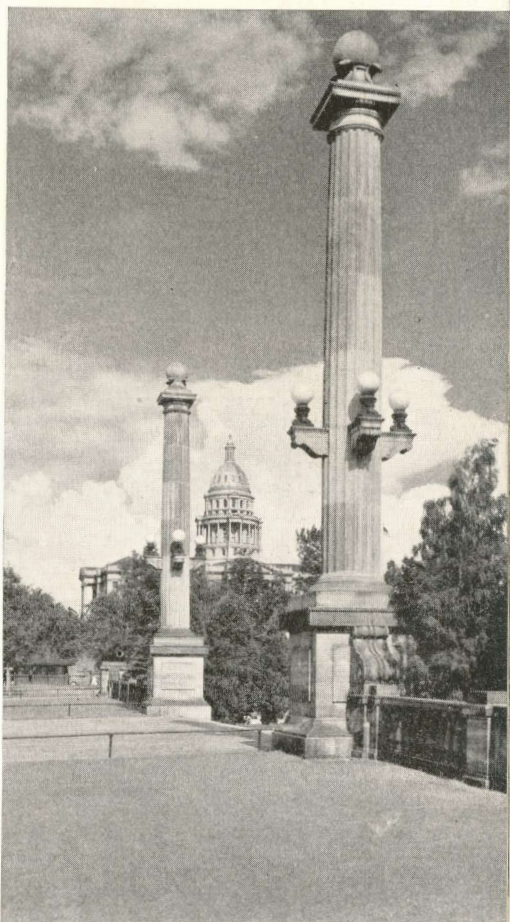

You gaze, fascinated. And here, on Lookout Mountain, is Buffalo Bill's grave and the Denver-maintained museum that holds many relics and personal belongings of Colonel Cody. A page of history turns back as you view them . . . the "wild and wooly" West of an earlier period comes to life. Back to Denver again by way of Mount Vernon Canyon and the Park of the Red Rocks. You arrive in time for luncheon at the Cosmopolitan Hotel.

The afternoon is yours. Perhaps you will wish to visit friends in Denver, take in a movie, do a bit of shopping in one of the city's smart shops. Whatever you do, time will pass pleasantly. You dine at the Cosmopolitan Hotel and in the early evening board your train for home.

Thursday You'll welcome the quiet comfort of this splendid train to ponder over the fascinating experiences of the past twelve days. All day you clip off mile after mile of your journey home. At Omaha you leave Union Pacific rails and continue over "North Western" arriving in Chicago in the afternoon . . . rested, refreshed and resolved to "do" the West again next year.

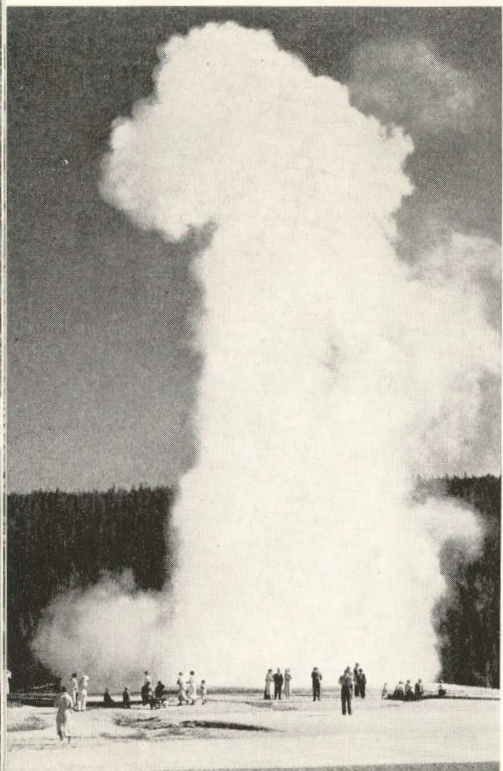

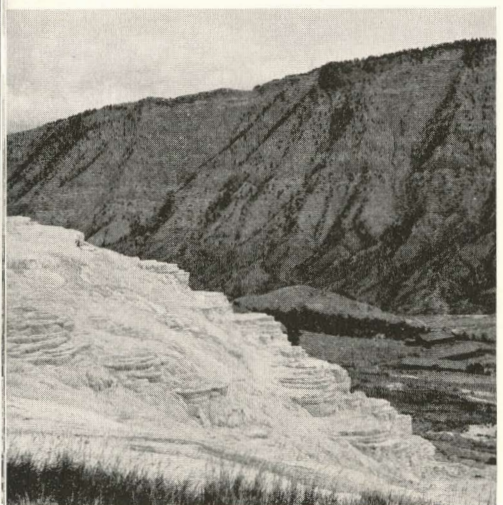

Day by Day Story of the "YZ" Tours

Saturday Late evening . . . you're at the Chicago and North Western Passenger Station in Chicago . . . there's excitement in the air . . . your train is waiting . . . there's an "All aboard!" . . . your vacation begins and you're off into the night . . . across the nodding Illinois cornfields . . . heading for those thrilling wonderlands you've wanted so much to see.

Sunday Early morning in Iowa . . . then most of the day across Nebraska . . . passing the day in deep-seated comfort with friendly companions . . . enjoying the splendid, satisfying meals you find on Overland Route diners . . . viewing the many interesting panoramas from the Club Lounge car . . . then night comes and brings with it deep, restful sleep as you glide over the smooth roadbed.

Wednesday Morning at Grand Canyon. After luncheon you motor northward again through the Kaibab . . . across the Prismatic Plains . . . over the new Mt. Carmel highway, pausing briefly to peer through the huge windows in the mile-long tunnel . . . then, a gentle descent to the valley below, to Zion Lodge, in the shadow of the mighty peaks which wall Zion Canyon. All about you are glorious panoramas of massive buttes, and cones and truncated pyramids stained with brilliant reds and whites and many intermediate hues. 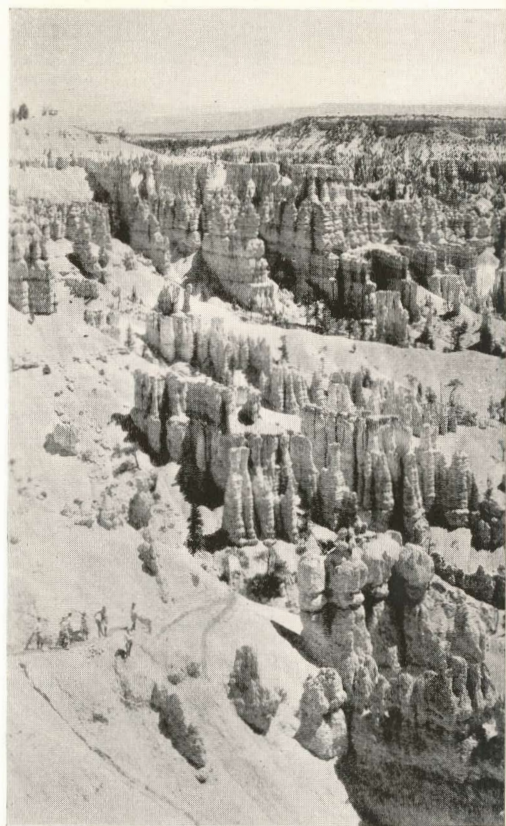

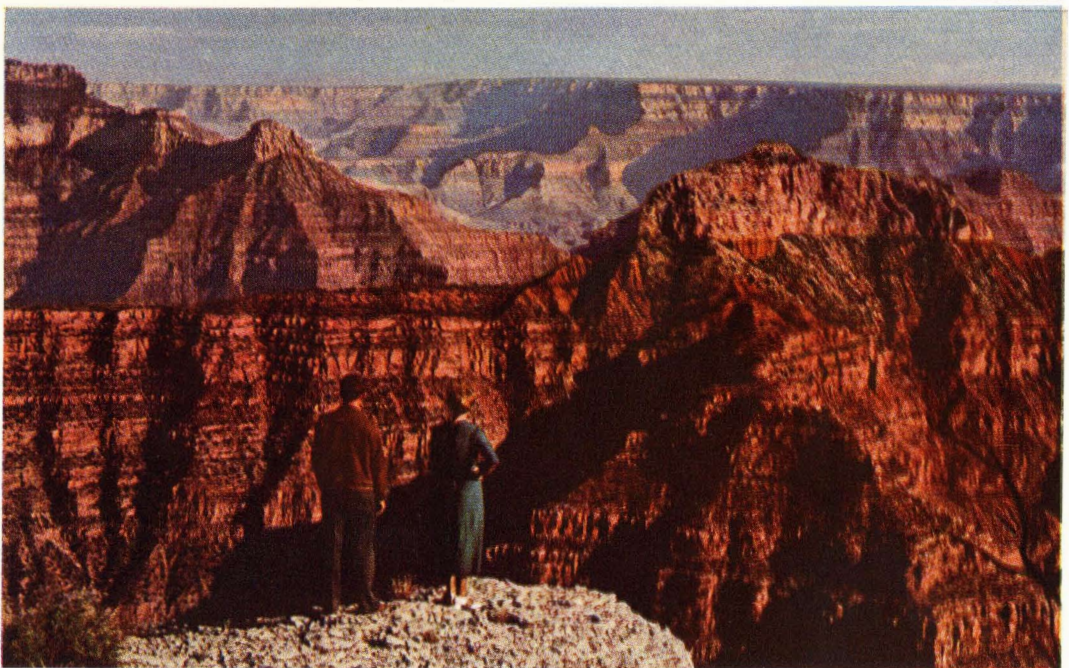

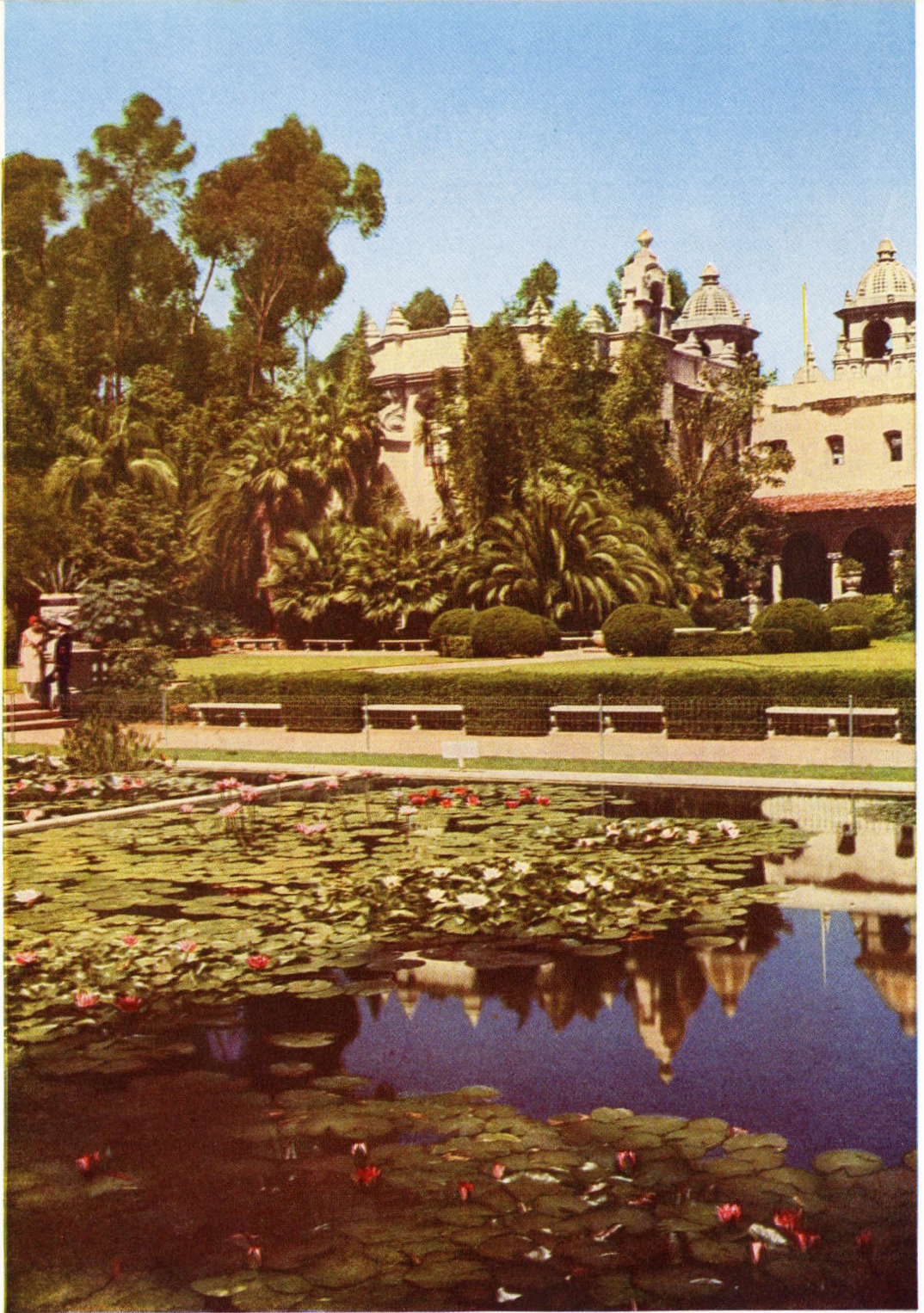

delicate spray . . . Yosemite Falls, the highest in the world, with a total drop of 2,555 feet . . . El Capitan, rising a sheer 3,604 feet from the Merced River and eternally guarding the west entrance to the valley. In the evening you motor down beautiful Merced Canyon to El Portal, boarding train for San Francisco.

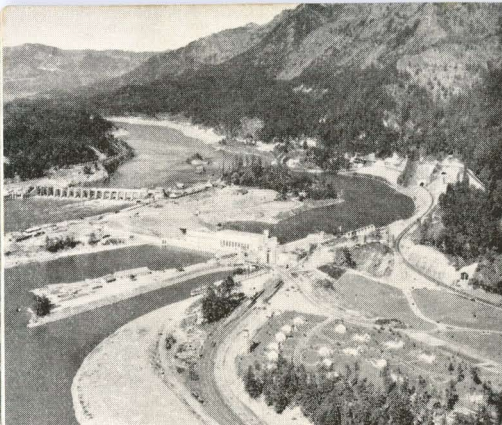

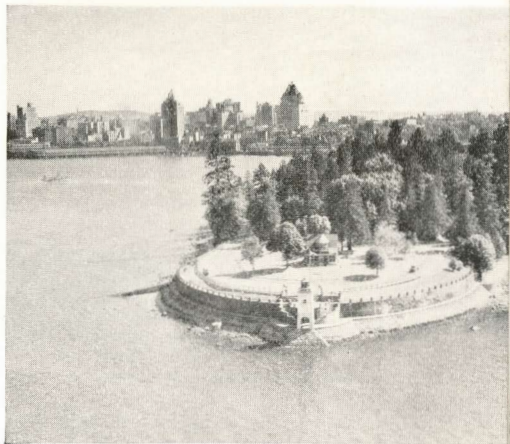

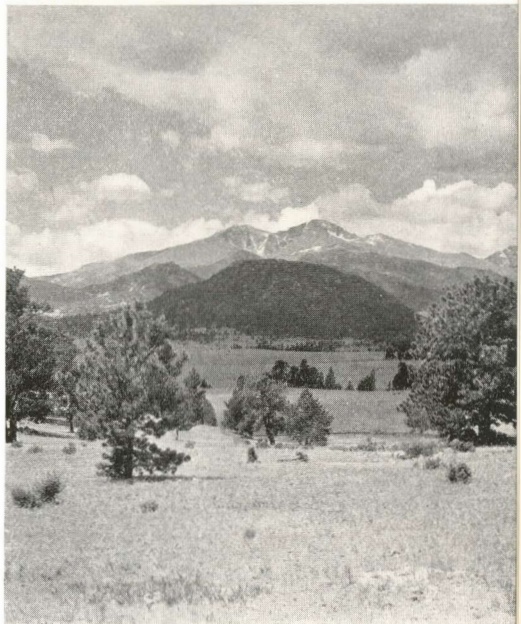

Dining Car Meals on "Overland Route" Circle Tours are tastily prepared and served with a smile. The service, which is comparable to the best metropolitan hotel standards, adds to the pleasure of your trip. Coupons having value of 75c for breakfast, \$1.00 for luncheon and \$1.25 for dinner, are provided for dining car meals and a refund in cash is made at time of service if the meal check is less than the value of the meal coupon.

Air Conditioning All of our Escorted Circle Tours will have air-conditioned Dining Cars, Observation Cars and air-conditioned Standard Pullman Sleeping Cars. Early reservations are suggested.

Hotels and Lodges in all National Parks are under the jurisdiction of the National Park Service, Department of the Interior, who desire that all visitors to the Parks be accommodated. Consequently, single rooms are not always available.

In **Yellowstone National Park** tour rates are based on double occupancy of standard rooms without bath at the hotels. Rooms with bath are usually available, if arranged for in advance, at an additional charge of 50c to \$2.50 per day per person, according to the number of people using bath and the location of the room.

In **Utah-Arizona National Parks** the popular rustic cabins are used and rates are based on standard accommodations. De Luxe Cabins with bath are usually available, if arranged for in advance, at an additional charge of \$1.00 to \$3.25 per day per person.

In **Rocky Mountain National Park** tour rates are based on standard rooms without bath, however, rooms with bath are usually available, if arranged for in advance, at an additional charge of \$1.00 to \$2.00 per day per person.

In **Yosemite National Park** tour rates are based on De Luxe Cabins with bath at Curry Lodge. Accommodations with bath are usually available, if arranged for in advance, at the Ahwahnee Hotel, Yosemite Valley, at an additional charge of \$4.44 to \$6.24 per person.

In **Mount Rainier National Park** tour rates are based on rooms with bath at Paradise Inn.

When passengers request reservation of rooms with bath in Yellowstone, Rocky Mountain or Utah-Arizona Parks, this department will gladly ask for such accommodations; however *the additional charge involved must be paid direct by passenger to each hotel or lodge.*

At ALL Hotels outside National Parks Rooms with bath will be provided at all hotels where overnight stops are made and rates are based on double occupancy of rooms. Single rooms with bath will be arranged for any passengers desiring them; however, *the slight additional charge involved must be paid by the passengers direct to each hotel.* Tour "C," and "PNW" rates are based on double room with bath at all hotels and lodges. Lake View rooms will be provided on the "PNW" Tour at Lake Louise and Bow Valley view rooms at Banff.

Baggage Trunks are unnecessary. A suit case or bag will hold sufficient clothing for your entire trip.

One piece of baggage weighing not more than twenty-five pounds will be carried free by the automobiles in the National Parks. If it is desired you may carry a small overnight bag with you, in addition to this. The Department of Tours assumes no responsibility for baggage or personal effects, but in the event of damage, delay or loss, will do all in its reasonable power to lessen the hardships incurred. Upon departure from Chicago your escort will furnish you with special baggage tags, bearing your name and address. These tags should be attached to all baggage.

Wearing Apparel Warm summer days suggest summer lightweight clothing, yet the cool, invigorating nights in the mountains make medium weight wraps necessary—top coats, sweaters, weatherproof outer garments. Outing clothes; knickers, jackets, stout shoes or boots are a comfort. A pair of colored glasses will be invaluable.

Church Services Your escort will be fully informed regarding church services at places visited on Sunday—special arrangements have been made at various points. Many passengers using the tours which leave Chicago Saturday, take the train from Chicago which leaves at 6:25 p. m. and arrives Omaha at 7:20 a. m. This gives them sufficient time to attend church at Omaha and later have breakfast in the depot dining room or on the train. Coupons are provided which will be honored at either place.

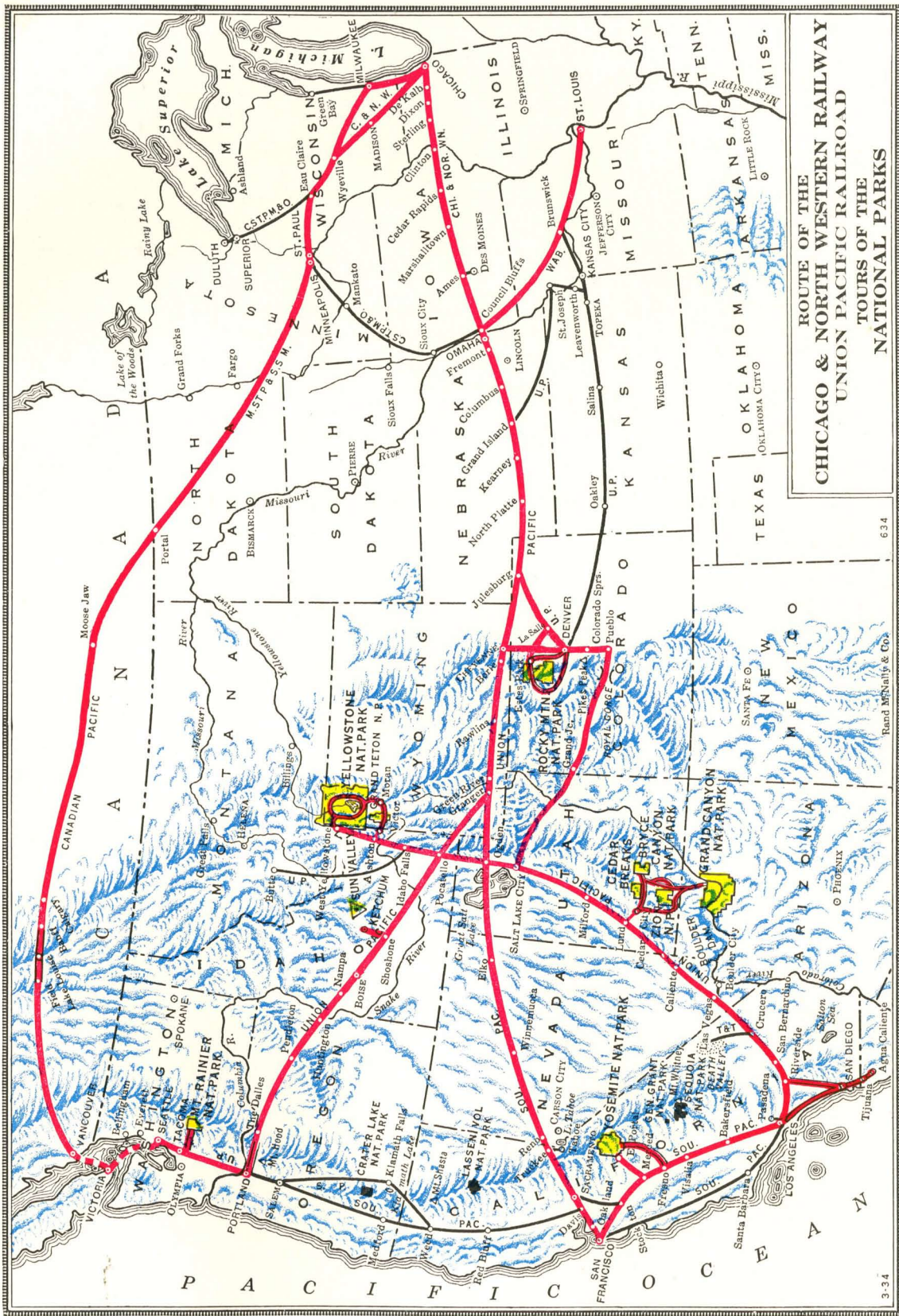
