See how well you can copy the color pictures. Then take this book home with you to show your friends.




Pacific Morthwest The Columbia River you see here is a long river. It separates the states of Washington and Oregon.

Pacific Torion Pacific trains run for almost 200 miles alongside this beautiful blue river.








Milk Cows in Pasture


The delicious milk that children like comes from cows like these. You will see many cows eating grass on farm pastures, as you ride on Union Pacific trains. Maybe you'll see some little calves, too. These black and white cows are called "Holsteins."





Desert Cactus Blossom

Most of the time the desert cactus shows nothing but sharp spines. However, every spring the desert in Utah is full of beautiful colored flowers of the cactus plants, many like this small blossom. Other plants are higher than you can reach.

Taking care of cattle is the regular job of the cowboy. He has on work clothes and has his lariat tied to his saddle, wears chaps to protect his legs from sharp branches of trees and shrubs. Buffalo Herd



Western Antelope


As you travel across the wide grassy plains, you should watch for the herds of prong-horn antelope, like small slender deer with two sharp horns. Here is a picture of an antelope which is growing new horns.





Wild Ducks

Along the tracks of your Union Pacific train, you may see wild ducks in the rivers and ponds. Here are Mallard ducks, and the ones with the green heads are male ducks. When they fly, their wings go fast, and their necks stretch out.





White-7ail Kaibab Squirrel

Only in the Kaibab National Forest region, which you visit on the Union Pacific tour to Bryce, Zion, and Grand Canyon National Parks, will you see these unusual squirrels. Their white tails cover them when they sit in the snow, so eagles and wildcats can't see them. They eat little nuts from pine cones.





Golden Mantled Ground Squirrel

These quick little squirrels live on the ground instead of in trees. They are not afraid to take little nuts or popcorn from your hand if you hold very still. They have smaller tails than tree squirrels. They live near the bushes or rocks in Bryce Canyon National Park in Utah.






Nuteracker Bird









Black Bear







These beautiful rock formations seem small, but look how tiny the big trees are, growing right alongside them. You can make out all










Grand Canyon National Park
