Yellowstone National Park

SITUATED in northwestern Wyoming and extending slightly into Idaho and Montana, Yellowstone National Park has an area of 3,438 square miles. It is a broad volcanic plateau with an average elevation of 8,000 feet, surrounded by mountain ranges.

- There are approximately 100 geysers in Yellowstone; some 4,000 hot and boiling springs; prismatic pools of exquisite beauty; multi-colored "paint pots" of plastic clay; mud volcanoes; tinted terraces; Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone with its waterfall of great height and wonderful symmetry.
- Of the many wild animals, bears are perhaps first in interest. One may also see elk, deer and antelope; moose, mountain sheep, buffalo, beaver and many varieties of smaller animals. Two hundred species of birds are found in the Park.
- The season is approximately June 20 to September 15. Through Pullmans to and from West Yellowstone, Montana, directly on the Park boundary, are operated by the Union Pacific daily during the Park travel season.
- Grand Teton National Park, including some of the finest mountain scenery to be found anywhere, is eleven miles south of Yellowstone and may be visited in conjunction with a Yellowstone Tour, or separately via the Union Pacific, from Victor, Idaho.
