THIS is a land of lofty, glacier-gripped mountains, primeval forests, majestic rivers, fertile valleys and far-reaching waterways. The Cascade Range divides the region into coastal and inland sections, and includes several magnificent snowcapped peaks-Hood, Adams, St. Helens, Baker, Rainier. The Blue Mountains, the Wallowas, the Siskiyous, the Sawtooth, the wild Olympics, and the American and Canadian Rockies offer much scenic grandeur. Mount Rainier is probably the most impressive peak in the United States. Throughout the Northwest its supremacy is indicated when it is simply called "The Mountain." The Indians knew it as "The Mountain that was God." Rainier is nearly three miles high (14,408 feet). The upper half glistens with snow and the ice of twenty-eight glaciers; the lower slopes display the purplish-black of dense forests; in between is a belt of wild flowers fifty miles in extent. Rainier National Park is about eighteen miles square. It has many miles of scenic trails to glaciers, waterfalls, lakes and wild flower gardens. Motor bus service leads into the Park, during the season, from Portland, Oregon, Tacoma and Seattle, Washington, on the Union Pacific. At the head of Hood River Valley, famous fruitgrowing region, looms the white glacier-sheathed summit of Mount Hood, 11,225 feet high. On its forested slopes are ample hotel and lodge accommodations, which may be reached from Hood River, on the Union Pacific and the Columbia River Highway, or from Portland, via the Loop Road.
