

YOSEMITE NATIONAL PARK

ITH its mighty peaks and waterfalls and the earth's oldest and tallest trees, Yosemite ranks high among world wonders. The Park covers an irregular area about thirty-six by forty-eight miles, yet many of its most spectacular sights are grouped in the Yosemite Valley—an amazing gorge seven miles long and from one-half to one mile wide.

In spring and summer the floor of this canyon valley is dotted with wild flowers, the Merced River flowing through its meadowlands and park-like forests. Yosemite is a realm of granite precipices and magnificent waterfalls. El Capitan rises 3,604 feet; Sentinel Dome, 4,157 feet; Half Dome, 4,829 feet. Yosemite Falls plunges half a mile over the canyon rim; Ribbon Falls is a glistening thread of 1,612 feet; Bridal Veil, perhaps most graceful of all. drops 620 feet—to mention only a few.

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The Mariposa Grove of Big Trees is in the Park. The tallest Sequoia is 293 feet high, the largest more than thirty feet in diameter. The age of some is estimated at more than 3,000 years.

Yosemite, open the year 'round, has excellent hotels, lodges and camps—is reached via the Union Pacific and its connections at Merced, where service is maintained into the Park.
