



HOW THE "LET 'ER BUCK" SPECIAL CAME TO BE . . .

The first Pendleton Round-Up was held in 1910 and was a great success. C. S. Jackson, founder of the Oregon Journal and former publisher of the Pendleton East Oregonian, saw the need for special transportation to the Round-Up. He conceived the idea of a special Journal train . . . a train that would assure passengers good meals and comfortable sleeping quarters during

their entire Pendleton visit. In 1912, The Journal operated the first "Let 'Er Buck" Special—five sleepers and one diner. Except for the war years, The Journal's Round-Up train has operated annually . . . an Oregon tradition almost as old as the Round-Up itself, and one which has grown with the state.
