

The name of Creighton is inseparably linked with the growth of Omaha from a sprawling frontier town into today's "Gateway to the Middle West."

Edward and John A. Creighton came to Omaha in 1856, just two years after the first settlers arrived. As builders of the Pacific telegraph and as bankers, freighters and ranchers they were leaders among Omaha's pioneers. Today, their names are kept alive in the University which they founded.

Its doors were first opened in September, 1878. The original title, "Creighton College," was a proud one. In reality, the new school for boys admitted youngsters who were "able to read in the second reader," according to the diary of the first president.

From its original male enrollment of 120, Creighton College has grown into a University with nine schools and colleges and more than 2400 men and women students. It is the only privately endowed university between the Mississippi and the West Coast with schools of medicine, law, dentistry, commerce, pharmacy, nursing, liberal arts and graduate studies. Creighton's 1950 roster includes names from forty states and seventy-five students from Hawaii, Puerto Rico, Panama, Trinidad, British West Indies, China, Algeria, British Guiana, Hungary, India, Malaya and Singapore.

In October, 1950, a new president, the Very Rev. Carl M. Reinert, of the Society of Jesus, came to Creighton. The thirty-seven-year-old Jesuit is one of the nation's youngest college heads. His brother, the very Rev. Paul F. Reinert, also of the Society of Jesus, became president of St. Louis University in 1949 at the age of 39.

The new president will lead his 55 Jesuit and 300 lay teachers in maintaining the 72 years of traditionally high scholastic standards of education at Creighton University.
