



Oregon State College is not only the oldest state institution in Oregon, but it is also the largest, both from the standpoint of student enrollment and campus facilities. It was established by the state legislature October 27, 1868. Since 1932, when the Oregon State System of Higher Education was formed, it has been one of the six units in the state system.

Oregon State is widely known throughout the United States for its educational and research leadership in several of its major fields of study. It has eight major schools within which are many specialized departments. The major schools are forestry, engineering, agriculture, science, pharmacy, business and technology, education, and home economics. The first two years of liberal arts and many other service courses in this field and the social sciences are available to students in the major schools. Excellent professional training for both men and women is also offered in the physical education major in the school of education.

More than 6,000 students were enrolled this year, including men and women from 40 other states, 33 foreign countries, and four U. S. territories. Many foreign students, in particular, have been attracted to O.S.C. for both undergraduate and graduate study in such specialized courses as food technology, fish and game management, engineering, chemistry, physics, pharmacy, agriculture, forestry, and business and technology.

Some 50 buildings are located on the 250-acre central campus of the 83-year-old college. But the Corvallis campus is only part of the far-flung organization of this land-grant institution which encompasses the entire state through its agricultural extension service and the research arm of the agricultural experiment station and its branch research centers.

Corvallis, literally the heart of the valley, is in the center of the fertile Willamette valley. The beautiful Willamette river skirts the city. Students are within an easy two-hour drive to sandy ocean beaches, rugged snow-covered peaks, rushing mountain streams, or the metropolitan atmosphere of Portland.
