

The State College of Washington, usually called "Washington State" or "WSC," is the largest resident college in the west with about 5,400 students enrolled this year.

Its campus is at Pullman in the heart of the rich Palouse farming country of eastern Washington. WSC was founded in 1890 as a land grant college and primarily as an agricultural and "mechanics arts" school.

But Washington State College has expanded beyond the field of agriculture. It now has an extensive arts, science and professional training program. It has developed extensive research programs in agriculture and industry which serve the State and the Pacific Northwest.

WSC's service, both in education and research, is still growing under the leadership of its noted president, Dr. Wilson Compton—one of the famous Compton brothers of the education world.

Its best known educational divisions outside of Agricultural Sciences and Technology are the Schools of Veterinary Medicine and Pharmacy and Department of Police Science and Administration. The Police Science Department was established in 1945 as the first to grant degrees in this field.

WSC also has a well-known radio curriculum with a 5,000-watt non-commercial radio station whose call letters are KWSC and which is used as a training ground for students.

The WSC campus, which covers 157 acres, lies on a hill overlooking the town of Pullman to the west. To the east lies the College Farm which covers some 1,200 acres of rolling hills. There are about 120 buildings on the campus and farm for classrooms, laboratories, dormitories, offices and other services.
