



In the Cascade Range of the Pacific Northwest are some of the finest examples of isolated mountain peaks. Among these is Mt. Hood, year around recreation center, quickly reached by highway from Portland, Oregon. This 11,245-foot snow-clad peak carries seven glaciers. It is a favorite of mountain climbers because it is friendly and relatively free from dangerous hazards.

For those who wish to climb the peak or view it at close range, there are splendid accommodations at famous Timberline Lodge and other near-by hostelryes.

The Alpine scenery of the Hood River region, and the invigorating climate, make it attractive to visitors the year 'round. Trout fishing, big game hunting, and winter sports may be enjoyed during their respective seasons.

The Union Pacific trains, Domeliner "City of Portland" and the Streamliner "Portland Rose," parallel the majestic Columbia River for nearly 200 miles to and from Portland.
