
Old Faithful Geyser

#### THE TOUR IN DETAIL

SUNDAY—Leave Chicago 10.45 p.m. from Union Station via the Burlington Route on a famous transcontinental train. The St. Louis group leaves there at 2.15 p.m. via the Burlington Route and travels northward alongside the Mississippi River during the afternoon.

MONDAY—The two groups combine in St. Paul this morning and leave there at 8.50 a.m., passing through Minneapolis an hour later and continuing westward through the beautiful lake country of Minnesota. We lounge complacently in our special Pullmans . . . get acquainted with the escort and with fellow passengers. In the afternoon, North Dakota and endless wheat.

TUESDAY—Morning in Montana. Everything different. We're in the West now—gradually climbing up through the foothills. In the distance the big wall of the Rockies looms suddenly and within an hour we are right in them. Glacier National Park at noon and the mountain world all about. A wonderful hotel, charming gardens, intriguing shops, the fish hatchery. A diverting afternoon and an interesting evening in the hotel featured by a pow wow with the Blackfeet Indians.

WEDNESDAY—Motoring this morning over the Blackfoot Highway to St. Mary Lake where we transfer to a boat for a ride on this jewel-like, mountain-girded body of water up to Going-to-the-Sun Chalets where we spend the afternoon and overnight. We'll hike this afternoon.

THURSDAY—By boat and auto this morning to the illustrious Many-Glacier Hotel for two full days in the heart of the mountain world. Here is sight-seeing. We'll cruise about on Swiftcurrent Lake and on up to the far end of Josephine Lake for a close-up view of Grinnell Glacier.

FRIDAY—Do as you please today. Go fishing if you like. Ride horseback to Iceberg Lake or Cracker Lake. Take your choice of a hundred

mountain trails. A forest ranger will take you on a hike right up on Grinnell Glacier, if you wish.

CANADIAN TOUR

Starting from Many-Glacier after luncheon on Friday, you can motor via Cardston to the Prince of Wales Hotel in Waterton Lakes National Park in Canada, reaching there for dinner and over night. Cruise on Waterton Lake next morning and leave after luncheon Saturday, motoring back to join the main party for dinner at Glacier Park Hotel.

SATURDAY—A hike this morning over the Mt. Altyn Trail or a choice of other interesting mountain trips. Leave in mid-afternoon by motor for Glacier Park Hotel, and board the train after dinner.

SUNDAY—Through the Montana Rockies, Prickly Pear and Missouri River Canyon, arriving Helena—capital of Montana—at 1.54 p.m. A trip by auto and launch to the Gates-of-the-Mountains on the Missouri River, with a picnic dinner at a historic place where the Lewis and Clark expedition made camp more than a century ago. Leave Helena 9.15 p.m. via Northern Pacific.

MONDAY—Through Paradise Valley and Yankee Jim Canyon, reaching the Gardiner entrance of Magic Yellowstone at 11.30 a.m., where we transfer to motors which carry us to Mammoth Hot Springs. Afternoon walking tour over the wonderful Hot Springs Terraces. Overnight here.

TUESDAY—Motor via the Golden Gate, stopping at Norris Geyser Basin, continuing through Gibbon Canyon and alongside the Firehole River, pausing in the Excelsior Geyser Basin and on to Old Faithful to see the world's foremost aggregation of geysers and other strange and unheard-of hot water phenomena. Twenty-four golden hours here, packed full of excitement and thrilling experiences which mere words fail adequately to describe.

WEDNESDAY—Leave Old Faithful at 1.50 p.m., for an interesting motor ride—twice across the Continental Divide and along the shore drive to Yellows tone Lake for an entertaining evening of dancing and other diversions.

THURSDAY— Motoring again this morning,




along the Yellowstone River through Hayden Valley to the very edge of the mighty Yellowstone Canyon, pausing at different vantage points for thrilling views of the Great Fall of the Yellowstone. We roll on—up to Dunraven Pass for a fifty mile look at surrounding country, returning to the Grand Canyon for luncheon and afternoon in which to explore the wonders of the Grand Canyon.

FRIDAY—Over the famous 90-mile Cody Road, through the Buffalo Bill country—via Sylvan Pass, Lake Eleanor, Shoshone National Forest, the "dude ranch" region, with a stop at the Colossal Shoshone Dam, and as a fitting climax to a wonderful tour, the six-mile gorge of the Shoshone River. Dinner at the Burlington Inn at Cody. Leave Cody 7.00 p.m. via Burlington Route.

SATURDAY-En route via Northern Pacific

through the vast grain and stock-ranching areas of North Dakota and the Lake Region of Minnesota, with a stop at Mandan in the morning for a visit with the Sioux Indians.

SUNDAY — Arrive Chicago at 9.00 a.m., with St. Louis passengers arriving home late in the afternoon.

#### « « Magic Yellowstone » »



It is hard to avoid envying that mortal who stands for the first time fifty yards away from a certain unimpressive limestone cone . . half expectantly and half skeptically "waiting for something to happen."

What a privilege is his. What a mighty thrill when, after a few preliminary hisses and sputters, the impossible happens and a million gallons of white-hot water bursts furiously forth

in a roaring jet that mounts higher and higher until it reaches 150 feet as Old Faithful, headliner of the Yellowstone circus . . . pampered pet of geyserdom, performs again its spectacular stunt . . . "on time" to the split second . . . clocking off the 65-minute interval today, as it did yesterday, a thousand years ago . . . "nobody knows how long."

You will hear all kinds of explanations to account for the geysers and the other queer, crazy phenomena which mark Yellowstone National Park as a place apart from all other earthly areas. But none of the explanations sound very convincing. The theory that sounds plausible as to the Old Faithful type does not account satisfactorily for the hundreds of lesser geysers that erupt incessantly; nor for the interminable plop-plopping of the multi-colored "paint pots" whose mushy surfaces are agitated by countless tiny steam explosions. What makes the "Black Growler" growl? Here is a lovely pool whose water looks blue, while over there is one that looks decidedly green. Here is a spring of boiling hot water and only inches away from it a spring that is ice cold. What causes that? Try to figure out the technicalities of the famed Fishing Cone, Biscuit Basin, the pink steam rising from Amethyst Pool . . then give it all up and devote yourself to sheer admiration of the consummate artistry with which Nature, working with hot lime-bearing water and a microscopic plant life organism known as algae, built up the delicately fluted and marvelously tinted terraces which cover many acres in the vicinity of Mammoth Hot Springs.


Finally go and stand at the edge of the Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone and see a sight that taxes your visual capacity. Try to comprehend this grotesque, colossal masterpiece which the educated waters of this strange land have wrought as if to show mere man what it can do when it quits playing entertaining tricks and really gets down to business. Here is scenic splendor. Here is color strewed about and spilled down a thousand-foot

escarpment in the most extravagant use of yellow that is to be found anywhere in nature. The Yellowstone Canyon is half a mile wide, more than 15 miles long and 1200 feet deep in many places. At its head is the majestic Great Fall of the Yellowstone. . . a mighty, snow-white cascade that plunges over a heroic precipice as WATER with a final flourish adds the perfect touch to complete one of the earth's sublimest spectacles.


#### Accommodations in Yellowstone

There are two types of accommodation in Yellowstone Park—lodges and hotels. The lodges are miniature villages of rustic buildings embracing community recreation halls, dining rooms where all have meals family style, post office, etc.,—surrounded by the groups of lodges which are the sleeping quarters. Here one can have all the enjoyment of camp life without any of its usual discomforts. There is special entertainment at the lodges every evening including impromptu features by guests.

The hotels are great hostelries, modern in appointments and attractive as to architecture. Dancing every evening except Sunday, at both lodge and hotel.

#### The Cody Road

All Burlington Escorted Tours leave Yellowstone over the Cody Road—famed 90-mile scenic motor highway through the Buffalo Bill country.

If you know anything about the topography of the region that lies just east of the National Park, you know that it is one of the wildest, least known and scarcely explored mountain areas in America. The far-flung Absaroka Range walls-up the entire east side of Yellowstone from its northernmost corner to the southernmost and yet farther south for many a mile, and the Cody Road is the way across . . . and the only way across, save for some foot trails that would puzzle a mountain goat.

It penetrates wild country . . . the raw wilderness "as it was in the beginning," as may be understood from the fact that neither does any other highway cross the Cody Road in all the ninety miles from Yellowstone Lake to Cody. There is not a town, village or settlement of any sort in its entire length except for 15 or 20 of those famous vacation places known as "dude ranches." Old maps and records show that it follows the self-same route taken by the great explorer, John Colter, in making his adventurous way back to civilization following his discovery of Yellowstone.

In 40 years of cutting and grading through the

endless forest, and hacking away at mountain sides, man carved the road up the west slope of the Absaroka Range, engineered it over the top through Sylvan Pass and got it down the "other side" by means of a hill seven miles long, and an amazing series of curves, loops, twists . . . to the edge of the Shoshone River.

Then thirty miles of wonder way through the heart of the Shoshone National Forest, sanctuary of the furred and feathered tribes . . . famed biggame country; and a dozen miles more following every twist and turn of the fast-flowing Shoshone River through a broad valley flanked by towering bare cliffs in whose curiously eroded crests we see fantastic configurations silhouetted against the sky—an elephant's head, the palm of a hand, a dog, an anvil and scores more—a strange country, unlike anything to be seen elsewhere

An army of U. S. engineers put the road through the grim Shoshone Canyon on a six-mile shelf dynamited out of the sheer rock wall of Rattlesnake Mountain in connection with the building of the giant Shoshone Irrigation Dam.

The Cody Road completes 100% of the possibilities of any Yellowstone Tour. If you don't see the Cody Road, you don't see Yellowstone Park.

#### THE TOUR IN DETAIL

SATURDAY—The Chicago party leaves at 10:30 p.m. The St. Louis group leaves 2:15 p.m., travel-


ing alongside the Mississippi River—Mark Twain country—for most of the afternoon.

SUNDAY—Chicago passengers, arising early, will enjoy splendid sightseeing along the Upper Mississippi River.

The parties combine in St. Paul and proceed westward,

through Minnesota and the interesting Bad Lands of North Dakota—a day full of sightseeing from the car window.

MONDAY—Arrive at the Gardiner entrance to the Yellowstone Wonderland 11:30 a.m., transferring at once to automobiles and wheeling away through Gardiner Canyon to Mammoth Hot



Springs. Hiking this afternoon with a Ranger over the fantastic Hot Springs terraces and strange formations which characterize the landscape hereabout. Evening brings an illuminating talk by one of the Rangers on the mysteries of the Yellowstone.

TUESDAY—Through three famous geyser basins

to Old Faithful where we spend twenty-four hours. Afternoon hiking trip among the greatest aggregation of geysers in the world—boiling springs, seething cauldrons, steaming pools, scores of geysers-a thousand phases of hot water phenomena, surprising, unheard-of.

Our time here is crowded with strange sights and thrilling experiences. Time to see the far-famed "Old Faithful" geyser erupt a dozen times. Be sure you're on hand early in the evening when the bears have supper. You will enjoy here another oration by one of the Rangers . . . this one on bears . . . delivered at "ringside."



WEDNESDAY—Leave Old Faithful at 1:50 p.m., motoring twice over the Continental Divide and along the shore of Yellowstone Lake to the Lake Hotel or Lodges. Lots of bears around here, too.

THURSDAY—Along the Yellowstone River through Hayden Valley with a side trip to Dunraven Pass. Hotel party goes via Artist Point, lodge party via Inspiration Point for a first view of the Grand Canyon and majestic Great Fall, arriving Grand Canyon at noon. Plenty of time in the afternoon to view the amazing Falls from various vantage points and to explore the wonderful Painted Canyon.

FRIDAY—Leave Grand Canyon this morning over the Cody Road—the famous ninety-mile scenic motor highway through the Buffalo Bill country, over the Absaroka Mountains through Sylvan Pass and via the great Shoshone Irrigation Dam and through the breath-taking Shoshone Canyon. Arrive Cody 4.55 p.m. for overnight. A pleasant evening at the Burlington Inn, with nothing particular planned, but just across the Shoshone River, Buffalo Bill's home town, Cody, beckons.

SATURDAY—Leave Cody this morning over the Burlington's intermountain route through the Wind River Canyon, Thermopolis Hot Springs, and the "Teapot Dome" country—Big Horn Mountains to the East, Rockies to the West.

SUNDAY—Arrive Loveland 7.00 a.m. Here begins a never-to-be-forgotten motor trip—the Grand Circle tour of Rocky Mountain National Park. We motor through the colossal canyon of the Big Thompson river that winds a tortuous way between towering rock walls, and brings us out in the broad valley which is crossed on our way to the charming and hospitable Estes Park Chalets where we have the afternoon open for horsebackriding, hiking, motoring or your choice of other diversions. You'll enjoy the entertainment which a genial host is sure to provide during the evening.

MONDAY—Leave Estes Park Chalets 8.30 a.m. for the scenic motor trip through Horseshoe Park and over the snow at Fall River and Milner passes and alongside the headwaters of the Colorado River—a most wonderful trip. Afternoon and night at Grand Lake which is the largest body of water in Colorado and the highest anchorage in the world.

TUESDAY—Leave Grand Lake 7.45 a.m. for another day of thrills—over the Continental Divide

at Berthoud Pass, then through Clear Creek Canyon, Idaho Springs, Denver's Mountain Parks, and Lookout Mountain, reaching Denver 3.45 p.m. Metropolitan sightseeing then, and overnight at the Albany Hotel.

Passengers who do not care to include Colorado Springs will leave Denver 11.30 p.m. Tuesday (with escort), arriving Omaha 3.25 p.m., Wednesday, St. Louis 7.12 a.m., Chicago 7.00 a.m., Thursday

WEDNESDAY—Leave Denver 9.00 a.m. and arrive Colorado Springs 11.15 a.m. The Cliff House in Manitou will be our headquarters. Afternoon trip to the summit of Pikes Peak, one way via the Cog Road and the other way over the thrilling auto highway.

THURSDAY—This morning left open to do as you please; in the afternoon a trip to the Garden of the Gods and South Cheyenne Canyon; and as a grand climax the motor trip over the astonishing switchback trail to the top of Cheyenne Mountain. An optional trip at \$5.00 additional is an all-day motor ride embracing the top of the Royal Gorge and Cañon City, returning via Phantom Cañon and Cripple Creek. Leave Colorado Springs 7.40 p.m.

FRIDAY—En route through the grazing and farming country of western Nebraska, arriving Omaha 3.25 p. m., where we bid adieu to the St. Louis party.

SATURDAY—Arrive Chicago 7.00 a.m., St. Louis 7.12 a.m., via Burlington Route.

#### Glacier National Park



Within the 1,500 square miles of Glacier National Park is crowded an array of mountain scenery amazingly beautiful and spectacular beyond words. In ruggedness and sheer grandeur, Glacier probably surpasses the Alps. It is sharply different from any other mountain scenery or any other national park in America. To vacation in Glacier is an experience that is unique; one that cannot be duplicated in all the world.

To understand Glacier one must go back over an immeasurable distance of time—to a remote age when there occurred a great upheaval of nature.

Uncounted eons ago, we learn from geologists, the crust of the earth lifted, emerged from the limit-less seas, and hardened into rock. Then, for millions of years, a terrific pressure was exerted upon this rock crust from the interior of the earth. At last it gave way. The continent was rent. And one edge of the great crack or crevice was thrust upward and over the other. This sheer, overlapping edge was thousands of feet thick. It formed the mountains of what is now Glacier National Park.


After this terrific upheaval the enormous rocks were carved and cut into a million fantastic shapes by countless centuries of rain, frost and glacial action.

And the result of all this is the Glacier National Park that greets you today—a mighty turmoil of

monster peaks, tremendous gulfs and enormous hollowed cirques; with scores of living glaciers, innumerable lakes of unbelievable charm, roaring rivers of icy water and plunging torrents; with magnificent rock colorings varying from pastel shades of light blue to the deepest purple, from brilliant reds to the faintest rose; and over it all the vast eternal silence of the Rockies.

Through Glacier extends the main range of the Rockies, the Continental Divide cutting the park into halves. Within the park there are 83 named mountains having an altitude of from 7,000 to 10,000 feet, and four exceeding 10,000 feet. From the summit of Swiftcurrent Mountain can be counted over 40 of these majestic peaks from one viewpoint!

But Glacier gives you more than the Rockies at their mightiest. Here the mountains have a grandeur unsurpassed in all North America. It is not a matter of degree only—it is one of complete difference from all other mountain scenery on the continent.

There are no foothills. The mountains rise with amazing abruptness from the level floor of valley or shore of lake. You are *close* to them. You can, in a manner of speaking, walk up and touch the side of

a mountain which rises like the sheer wall of an edifice. Here one comes into intimate contact with the most awesome of all of God's creations.

One of Glacier Park's outstanding attractions is, of course, the glaciers after which the park is named. They cling by scores to the rugged mountain sides.

In all, there are some three score of these fascinating remnants of the great ice sheets that millions of years ago shaped Glacier Park for tourists today. Upon them one may snowball in midsummer. In June and July wild flowers in profusion fringe their edges.

They are at once survivals of a time when earth was young and places where January and July meet strangely.


Next to the glaciers, perhaps, the lakes are the most popular feature of the park. There is an amazing variety and number of them. The United States Geological Survey has mapped more than 250 and many have not yet been named.

Chief among these mountain waters are Lake St. Mary, about a mile above sea level, and Lake McDonald. Both are long, narrow and very deep, with mountains rising sheer from their shores. You may cruise them in comfortable launches. Of all the beautiful smaller lakes which lie scattered like gems among the peaks, Iceberg Lake is the most unusual and interesting. Iceberg Glacier projects into its clear waters and,

during the summer, hundreds of miniature icebergs float upon its turquoise surface. Flowers and foliage grow along its shores.

Come out to Glacier this summer. Stand before the mighty splendor of far-flung mountains. Hear the music of deep forests. Share with Nature her secrets of beauty and grandeur up here where your enjoyment of scenic splendor is limited only by your capacity to comprehend.

Here the call of the trail is unmistakable. Here the gods of the mountains hold court; here dwell the Indians whose forefathers have lived in Glacier Park for centuries in the shadow of Little Chief and Red Eagle Peaks, Rising Wolf and Going-to-the-Sun Mountain—by the shores of Two-Medicine Lake and Swiftcurrent Creek.



There are four hotels in Glacier National Park . . . The Glacier Park Hotel (Big Trees Lodge), near the entrance; Many-Glacier Hotel, deep in the mountain; Lake McDonald Hotel, at the shore of lovely Lake McDonald on the west side of the mountains; and the Prince of Wales Hotel in Waterton Lakes National Park on the Canadian side.

All the hotels are of large size, attractive as to design and architecture, and compare favorably with high class metropolitan hostelries.

Rooms with bath are available at all hotels at a nominal extra cost, but the basic price of Burlington Escorted Tours provides room without bath.

Supplementing the hotels are a number of inviting chalets situated at scenically strategic places throughout Glacier Park. Charming replicas of famous Alpine originals, and built of native logs by Swiss craftsmen, they afford thoroughly comfortable accommodations, although rooms with private bath are not available.

TUESDAY—We leave Chicago Union Station at 10.30 p.m. via the Burlington route. St. Louis

passengers will leave there at noon and travel via Chicago.

WEDNESDAY—Get up early this morning and enjoy two or three hours of delightful Mississippi River scenery before reaching St. Paul and Minneapolis. Then on through the fascinating lake country of Min-


THURSDAY—Through Paradise Valley and Yankee Jim Canyon, reaching the Gardiner Gateway to Yellowstone National Park 11.30 a.m. We board the automobiles and whirl away through thrilling Gardiner Canyon on the way to Mammoth Hot Springs. In the afternoon we hike with a Ranger over the astonishing Hot Springs formations. Dinner and overnight here.

FRIDAY—Leave at 8.20 a.m. by motor via the Golden Gate, stopping on the way for a hike over the Norris Geyser Basin, continuing through Gibbon Canyon and alongside the Firehole River, stopping at the Excelsior Geyser Basin, then on to Old Faithful for 24 hours among the world's foremost aggregation of geysers, colored pools, boiling springs and other strange and unheard-of hot water phenomena.

SATURDAY—Leave Old Faithful at 1.50 p.m. for an interesting motor ride—twice across the Continental Divide and many miles along the shore

of Yellowstone Lake, stopping en route to visit the 'Fishing Cone' and the famous multicolored paint pots. An interesting evening at the Lake, visiting the bears, and dancing.

S U N D A Y— Leave the Lake at 9.10 a.m., motoring along the Yellowstone River through

Hayden Valley, with stops at the Mud Volcano, the Dragon's Mouth and so to Artist Point, or Inspiration Point for a first view of the magnificent Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone and the tremendous Great Fall, followed by a trip by motor to Dunraven Pass and back to the Grand Canyon for luncheon with an afternoon open in which to explore the wonders of the Grand Canyon.

MONDAY—Leave the Grand Canyon this morning for a thrilling motor trip over the 90-mile scenic Cody Road which crosses the Absaroka Mountains through high Sylvan Pass, and runs on through the Shoshone Forest, the "dude ranch" country, past the big Government Irrigation Dam and through the six-mile Shoshone Canyon, reaching Cody for dinner at the Burlington Inn. Leave Cody via Burlington Route at 7.00 p.m. headed for Glacier Park.

TUESDAY—About noon today we reach the edge of Glacier Park and skirt its southern boundary for several hours—every mile of the way through the spectacular scenery of the main range of the Rockies, reaching Belton, Mont., at 2.13 p.m.

Here we transfer to automobiles and motor delightfully along the shore of a large and beautiful lake, up to the Lake McDonald Hotel for dinner and overnight.

WEDNESDAY—We go mountaineering in earnest today. Really almost pioneering . . . motoring over the thrilling new trans-mountain highway that leads up to the dizzy heights of Logan Pass for a panoramic view that is fairly breath-taking in its alpine grandeur.

Back to Belton in the afternoon and on around to Glacier Park Hotel for an evening enlivened by Indian entertainment, and overnight.

THURSDAY—Morning motor trip to St. Mary Lake, where we transfer to a boat for a twelve-mile cruise up the lake to the famed Going-to-the-Sun Chalets for luncheon, the afternoon and overnight. World travelers assert that the viewpoint here reveals a "close-up" panorama of mountain scenery that is unrivaled in all the world. A hike to Baring Falls and Sun Rift Gorge this afternoon.

FRIDAY—Return by boat this morning to St. Mary Landing, thence by motor up to Many-Glacier Hotel on the shore of beautiful Swift-current Lake, amid mountain magnificence indescribable. Twenty-four hours here in the very heart of the mountain world, during which we have a motorboat trip across Swiftcurrent Lake and charming Josephine Lake for a "close-up" view of the great Grinnell Glacier. Those preferring to make the trip from Going-to-the-Sun Chalets to Many-Glacier by horseback over Piegan Pass may do so at a small additional cost.

SATURDAY—Plenty of time to make a horse-back trip to Iceberg Lake—14 miles round trip. Additional cost \$5.00. Otherwise, choose your own recreation this morning from among the countless foot and horseback trail trips available here. Leave Many-Glacier in mid-afternoon and motor to Glacier Park Hotel for dinner, departing for the East at 7.02 p.m. via Great Northern Railway.

SUNDAY—En route eastward across North Dakota and Minnesota, arriving Minneapolis at 10.00 p.m. and St. Paul 10.30 p.m.

MONDAY—Arrive Chicago at 8.45 a.m. and St. Louis late the same afternoon.

### Grand Circle Tour of Rocky Mountain National Park

Tour B includes this motor trip as outlined below, while tour D includes only the trip to Estes Park Chalets and thence via the South St. Vrain Canyon, and Boulder to Denver.




See this map . . . an excellent one, we believe, as maps go. Doubtless it portrays the physical characteristics of the area depicted, and the motor highway that runs through it as well as the circumstance of limited space permits.

And yet how feebly it suggests the rugged contour of this region; how completely the map fails even to hint of the colossal scale on which the mountain masses are piled up here to form the Colorado Rockies.

Look at those little ant-hills . . . every one a mighty mountain whose summit scrapes the sky. Fancy that north-and-south dotted line representing the Continental Divide which determines which rivers shall flow into the Pacific Ocean and which into the Atlantic. Its far-flung skyline looks more like a giant saw extending along the edge of the world.

And see the red motor road with the occasional bends and curves. There must be four thousand curves, twists, kinks and bends in that road not to mention the dips and rises as it follows the course of many a winding river and roaring stream, loops



around the bulge of a mountain side, and winds its serpentine way along the floor of the valleys, the bottom of canyons; now crawls along a shelf carved in the side of a cliff, then finds its way between banks of eternal snow as it tops the Continental Divide and spirals down the "other side."

It would be hard to over-state the scenic significance of this swing around the big circle . . . impossible to over-estimate the mighty splendor of the far-flung mountains over and through which you wheel in balloon-tire luxury . . . more than 200 miles in the complete circuit.

Leaving Loveland in the morning you whirl swiftly over a smooth boulevard that runs in a westerly direction through a rich agricultural region that was considered practically worthless only yesterday . . . before man learned the neat trick of diverting a bit of water from the mountain torrents onto thirsty soil. Spinning along at 35 to 40 the great Front Range of the Rockies looms up ahead, growing higher and vastly higher every minute. A brief time "roller coasting" up and down over the foothills brings us to the Big Thompson River whose crooked course we follow through a 16-mile canyon that ends in a broad, bowl-shaped valley thoroughly hemmed-in by a mountain skyline dominated by the 14,255-foot crown of Longs Peak. We pause briefly in the village of Estes Park and presently roll up to the Estes Park Chalets where the question about the



quality of accommodations which this mountain country offers is answered in a way which leaves you joyfully satisfied for all time. Pleasant sleeping rooms are tastefully furnished, the lounge room of baronial spaciousness and bright with color is made inviting by a fireplace of heroic size; a genial atmosphere of open cordiality pervades the place.

But let's travel. The next part of our route is over the new Trail Ridge Road . . . a splendid boulevard opened to traffic just this season . . . which climbs up the east slope of the Continental Divide to Fall River Pass with magnificent vistas of the valley below and thrilling views of many a snow-crowned peak constantly before your eyes.

Mountain panoramas of the first order of sublimity, including the beautiful Never-Summer Range, the Medicine Bow Range, majestic cloud-crowned Longs Peak and the grand southward sweep of the Rockies as far as Pikes Peak . . . a parade of snow-capped giants fading into the hazy beyond . . . contribute their beauty and inspiration.

Continuing, the motor highway crosses the mountainlocked region of the Divide at Milner Pass where the Poudre Lakes nestle closely on the Atlantic slope and tiny Lake Irene, mirroring the outlines of the adjacent peaks, occupies a charming setting on the Pacific slope.

From this point the road makes a rapid, winding descent to the Colorado River, which here flows through a wooded canvon walled-in by towering peaks, and, following the picturesque bends in the stream, shortly pulls up at Grand Lake where we find a different and delightful arrangement of accommodations . . . a miniature village of snug little sleeping cabins surrounding a big main lodge where appetizing meals are served in a spacious dining room, and evening hours flee too rapidly both for the dancers and those who elect just to group themselves around a unique type of open campfire blazing away in the middle of the big lounge room.

Continuing on the morrow, the road again crosses the Continental Divide . . . this time

from the Pacific to the Atlantic side—through the region made famous by the construction of the great Moffat Tunnel through James Peak, through that colossal crevasse known as Berthoud Pass, and continues through a series of kaleidoscopic scenic effects, down the Canyon of Clear Creek on the way to Idaho Springs.

After lunch at the new Placer Inn, the motors take off again, bowling along smoothly over the celebrated boulevard which leads eastwardly through Denver's famous chain of mountain parks, the Pike National Forest, Lookout Mountain, Buffalo Bill's grave, the Lariat Trail, and so to Denver in the late afternoon.



#### THE TOUR IN DETAIL

SUNDAY—The Chicago party leaves at 10.30 p.m. via Burlington Route, while the St. Louis party leaves there at 2.15 p.m. with a pleasant afternoon ride along the lower MississippiRiver.



MONDAY—Early risers in the Chicago group will enjoy more than two hours of upper Mississippi River scenery before reaching St. Paul where the two parties merge this morning and head westward through the lake country of Minnesota and the boundless wheat fields of North Dakota. During a short stop at Mandan in the late afternoon we have a first introduction to the Sioux Indians.

TUESDAY—We arrive at the Gardiner entrance to the Yellowstone Wonderland this morning and here transfer to automobiles for an interesting ride along the Gardiner River to Mammoth Hot Springs. Overnight here, with an afternoon hiking trip with a government Ranger to marvel at the wonderful tinted terraces and other strange phenomena which abound here.

WEDNESDAY—Through three famous geyser basins on the way to Old Faithful to realize probably the most eventful twenty-four hours that you will experience in many a year. The whole terrain here fuming, hissing, steaming and exploding intermittently as the world's greatest display of geysers and other weird hot water phenomena perform the curious tricks of which you have heard but only half believed. Old Faithful geyser erupting with

clock-like regularity everysixtyfive minutes.
Pools of boiling
water exploding
like bombs everywhere . . . Morning Glory Pool
. . . the Punch
Bowl . . . over
there a geyser
'shooting'
across the river.

Dusk is the signal for a visit to the bears' feeding ground where a Ranger explains the life and habits of the "animal that walks like a man."

THURSDAY—Leave Old Faithful at 1.50 p.m., motoring twice over the Continental Divide and along the shore of Yellowstone Lake to the Lake Hotel or Lodges. Lots of bears around here, too—and a good place to fish.

FRIDAY—Today we follow the Yellowstone River from its source in the big lake down to the world-famed Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone at the head of which is seen what some world travelers and many an artist consider the most beautiful natural "picture" in the world—the inspiring "Great Fall" breaking over a towering cliff to fall gracefully to the canyon floor—a depth twice that of Niagara. All afternoon here to watch the colors change as the sunlight streams along the walls of the great cleft, or to accompany one of the Rangers on a tour of exploration along the rim.

SATURDAY—Leave Grand Canyon this morning over the Cody Road—the famous ninety-mile scenic motor highway through the Buffalo Bill country, over the Absaroka Mountains through Sylvan Pass, through the Shoshone National Forest, the "dude ranch" country, via the great Shoshone Irrigation Dam and following the Shoshone River through the breath-taking six-mile Canyon, whose sheer granite walls rise to such colossal heights overhead. Arrive Cody Inn, 4.55 p.m. for overnight. A "free" evening in which to cross over to Cody for dancing or other diversions and sightseeing in this famed little frontier town.

SUNDAY—Leave Cody this morning over the Burlington's intermountain route through the Wind River Canyon, Thermopolis Hot Springs, the Casper oil fields and the Teapot Dome region, crossing and recrossing the famous old covered-wagon trails.

MONDAY—Arrive Loveland in the morning and away after breakfast through the canyon of the Big Thompson River to Estes Park Chalets.

After luncheon, off through the mountains again, motoring down through the South St. Vrain Canyon and Boulder to Denver.

We leave Denver late this evening for Colorado Springs.

TUESDAY—Arrive Colorado Springs 7.00 a.m. for an entire day devoted to the bewildering array of scenic attractions in this famous sector of the Rockies. Breakfast and luncheon at Cliff House in Manitou. Morning trip to the summit of Pikes Peak, one way via the curious Cog Road and the other way over the wonderful auto highway. Afternoon motor trip to the Garden of the Gods, South Cheyenne Canyon and to the top of Cheyenne Mountain over a crooked auto highway with a thousand curves and an equal number of thrills.

An entirely different program which may be substituted this day involves a motor trip to the top of the Royal Gorge, returning by way of Cañon City and Cripple Creek. Dinner at the Broadmoor Hotel.



THURSDAY—Arrive Chicago 7.00 a.m., St. Louis 7.12 a.m., via Burlington Route.




Pikes Peak as seen from the Cheyenne Mountain Highway





#### THE TOUR IN DETAIL

SUNDAY—The Chicago party leaves at 10.45 p.m. via Burlington Route. The party from St. Louis leaves there at 2.15 p.m. via Burlington Route, traveling most of the afternoon alongside the lower Mississippi River.



MONDAY—The two parties combine at St. Paul and continue westward through Minnesota and North Dakota.

TUESDAY—Breakfast . . . and Glacier's "shining mountains." We pause for an afternoon and night at the great "Big Trees Lodge" (Glacier Park Hotel), scraping acquaintance with the Blackfeet Indians.

WEDNESDAY—Off by motor over the Blackfeet Highway . . . Hudson Bay Divide . . . the edge of lovely St. Mary Lake, thence a trim, white boat for an enchanting cruise up to Going-to-the-Sun Chalets—our way edged endlessly by jagged peaks that rise higher and higher as we proceed. Afternoon and overnight here, enjoying accommodations reminiscent of Switzerland, and scenery that yields nothing to the Alps.

THURSDAY—Cruising back down the lake and presently motoring to Many-Glacier Hotel on the shore of Swiftcurrent Lake, surrounded by a moun-

tain skyline to thrill the heart of an explorer.

FRIDAY — An all-too-short morning in this fascinating place —fishing, riding or hiking over crooked trails—enjoying every minute of the time, each in his or her own way.

Motor cars await us after luncheon and we wheel away ... across the International Boundary into Canada and so up to the new Prince of Wales Hotel in Waterton Lakes National Park for the first night on foreign soil. SATURDAY—Another boat trip this morning, cruising pleasantly over Waterton Lake—into the U. S. A. and back again—always walled-up by the immortal mountains.

And now into virgin country, mountaineering with a vengeance—beginning a motor trip that takes us four hundred miles through every conceivable degree and phase of alpine scenery. North to Pincher Creek and west to Blairmore, Alberta, for overnight at the Hotel Greenhill.

SUNDAY—We make an early start today . . . past the Frank Slide and up over the "Crow's Nest Pass," and then "drop" into British Columbia, following first the Elk River and later the canyons of the Kootenay River . . . Rockies to the East and the towering Selkirks to the West. Lunch at Cranbrook, then northward along the edge of Columbia and Windermere Lakes to Sinclair Canyon and Radium Hot Springs for overnight in bungalow cabins.


MONDAY—A day deep in the Canadian Rockies. Bowling along through the valley of the Columbia River; through Spillimacheen and McMurdo to Golden for luncheon and a breathing spell against a thrilling afternoon, during which we negotiate Lower Kicking Horse Canyon and pause to admire lovely Emerald Lake, followed by a side trip up through the canyon to Yoho Valley and Takakkaw Falls.

Then through the even more spectacular Upper Kicking Horse Canyon; over the main range of the Rockies at the Great Divide and down to Lake Louise and the famed Chateau for overnight.

TUESDAY—Glance out your window first thing this morning and behold a vista of lake, mountains and glaciers that makes you doubt your eyes.

A rare morning here. Choose your own adjectives. Following the great Bow River this afternoon through the mountains . . . peaks too numerous to count . . . Johnson Canyon . . . Vermilion Lakes . . . Banff and the wonderful Banff Springs Hotel that stands on high like a great dream castle. Overnight here, and meantime dancing this evening in a gay, colorful, cosmopolitan crowd.

WEDNESDAY—All day at Banff, begrudging the passing of each moment . . . the Bow Falls . . . golf on a fine mountain course . . . bathing in hot or cold sulphur-water pools . . . hikes, rides—more than plenty for every minute of the day.



Leave late tonight in special sleepers—bound for Winnipeg.

THURSDAY—A day of relaxation, visiting, loafing, card playing as we speed across the prairies of Saskatchewan.

FRIDAY—Here's Winnipeg—Metropolis of the Northland. Breakfast at the Royal Alexandra . . . sightseeing by motor . . . luncheon at Fort Garry Hotel . . . an open afternoon for shopping—doing as we please . . . leaving at 6.00 p.m. on the Great Northern and crossing back into the U. S. A. early this evening.

SATURDAY—Minneapolis at 7.35 a.m.; St. Paul at 8.15 a.m.—familiar ground. Retracing our way down along the Mississippi—Lake Pepin, Maiden Rock, La Crosse, Prairie du Chien . . . the locale of the Black Hawk war . . . across Northern Illinois . . . 7.40 p.m. . . . the towers of Chicago . . . St. Louis Sunday morning.


THURSDAY—Right after breakfast we fare forth in parlor car motors over a fine highway that pene-





beautiful valley at the foot of noble Mt. Rainier.

An interesting afternoon . . . nature coasting . . . horseback riding . . . the snow and ice fields are so near at hand that there is even time to don the hobnailed boots and the rest of the alpine outfit and set out with a guide on an adventurous ascent part way up the icy slope of Mt. Rainier.

FRIDAY—Another morning of motoring to Seattle where we swing up to the Olympic Hotel at noon for the afternoon and overnight. Sightseeing this afternoon . . . the parks, boulevards, residence section, the campus of the State University and Lake Washington, which is Seattle's famed freshwater harbor where ships of the world ride at anchor.

SATURDAY—After breakfast we embark on a big white ship and sail through the placid waters of Puget Sound, across the straits, landing at Victoria for twenty-four hours in this typically British city—motoring this afternoon through its lovely parks and residential section, to Butchart's wonderful gardens . . . headquarters at the Empress Hotel.

SUNDAY-Morning open.

We leave Victoria by boat at 1.45 p.m. and wind our way through the San Juan Islands, then across the Georgia Strait to Vancouver. We transfer to the Vancouver Hotel for overnight.

MONDAY—A morning sight-seeing trip embracing Stanley Park, Marine Drive, Shaughnessy Heights with its charming gardens and wealth of flowers, and other points of outstanding interest in this renowned foreign city.

We leave at noon on the Canadian Pacific to begin the second phase of the grand adventure... as you shall see. With the first glimpse out of the car window comes ample proof that we are in the Canadian Rockies, and we climb all morning through the Fraser River Canyon with every curve in the track revealing a heroic skyline formed by the towering peaks.

TUESDAY—Magnificent scenery from early morning. At 10.05 we reach Field, B. C., situated at the foot of Mt. Stephen that goes up 10,495 feet; and here we board motors that take us to Emerald Lake, a brilliant gem that reflects the wooded slopes and the soaring peaks with flawless accuracy. Luncheon here, then away again by motor—along the Kicking Horse River on the way to Yoho Valley, and Takakkaw Falls.

Then on . . . through another spectacular canyon . . . over the Great Divide—the crest of the Rockies at Kicking Horse Pass and coasting down to Lake Louise in Alberta to wheel grandly up to the illustrious Chateau.

Scenery? Where is there anything to equal it? The lake, the plunge, the trails that lead up to Lake Agnes, Lake Annette and others that are literally up in the clouds; try out your legs and lungs on the climb up to the observatory atop "the Beehive"; ride horseback, play tennis; and tonight . . . dancing at the Chateau Lake Louise.

WEDNESDAY—Run to your window this morning and see the magic wrought by the gods of the mountains. Then hurry down and out into the mountain world to waste no moment of the precious time here.

Motoring again this afternoon . . . along the Bow River . . . forty-one miles through a succession of giant peaks that rise nine, ten, eleven thousand feet and higher . . . Johnson Canyon . . . Vermilion Lake . . . Banff.

If you thought the Chateau Lake Louise completed the possibilities as far as hotels are concerned, you reckoned without the famed Banff Springs Hotel which dominates the Bow Valley like a great baronial Scotch castle.

What an environment; what an ideal stage for tonight's dancing with the smart, gay, cosmopolitan and colorful throng.

THURSDAY—Another full day here. Hiking, riding horseback, swimming in the pools of sulphur water with a choice of cold or hot or both. Something ranging from merely pleasant to adventurously thrilling all day long.

We board our special cars late this afternoon nomeward bound.

FRIDAY—Yes, you may sleep as late as you wish this morning. And afterward live all over again the recent days that saw adventure heaped upon adventure . . . coming "back to Earth" . . . play cards . . . a lazy day as the train races through the endless wheat farms of Saskatchewan and crosses back into the U. S. A. at Portal this afternoon.

SATURDAY—Minneapolis and St. Paul early this morning, and an appropriate climax of our tour in the pleasant daylight trip three hundred miles along the east shore of the Upper Mississippi River en route to Chicago . . . 7.40 p.m. . . . St. Louis Sunday morning.

SUNDAY—Chicago party leaves at 10.45 p.m. and St. Louis party leaves at 2.15 p.m. via Burlington Route along the lower Mississippi River almost all afternoon.


MONDAY—Chicago party is up early this morning for a view of the upper Mississippi River. At St. Paul the two parties join and continue westward through the Lake country of Minnesota and the wheat fields of North Dakota.

TUESDAY—We reach the Rockies this morning, and shortly after noon our train travels along the Glacier Park's southern boundary, following the fast flowing Flathead River 55 miles to Belton, every mile of the way crammed full of spectacular mountain scenery. At Belton we are met by motors and wheel away to the north along the shore of a lovely mountain gem of a lake, to the Lake McDonald Hotel for the afternoon and night.

WEDNESDAY—Up over the amazing new transmountain highway through the raw wilderness, with every curve in the road revealing wonderful

mountain vistas—22 miles to the "top" at Logan Pass for a breath-taking view of the mountain magnificence spread out below as far as the eye can reach—and farther. Back to the hotel for lunch and then around to the big Glacier Park Hotel for dinner, an evening with the Indians, and overnight.

THURSDAY—Morning auto trip over the Blackfeet Highway and Hudson Bay Divide to St. Mary Landing, where transfer is made to a boat for the delightful ride to Going-to-the-Sun Chalets . . . with every minute bringing new alpine vistas to challenge the imagination. Overnight here with the afternoon devoted to hikes to nearby points of interest.



FRIDAY—Return by boat this morning to St. Mary Landing, thence by motor up to Many-Glacier Hotel, which rests on the shore of beautiful Swiftcurrent Lake, amid mountain magnificence indescribable.

Twenty-four hours here in the very heart of the mountain world, during which we have a motor-

boat trip across Swiftcurrent Lake and charming Josephine Lake for a "close-up" view of the great Grinnell Glacier. Those preferring to make the trip from Going-tothe-Sun Chalets to Many-Glacier by horseback over Piegan Pass may do so at a small additional cost of \$2.50.



SATURDAY—As we are at Many-Glacier until afternoon, there is plenty of time to make a horseback trip to Iceberg Lake—14 miles round trip. Additional cost \$5.00. Otherwise, choose your own recreation this morning from among the countless foot and horseback trail trips available here. Leave Many-Glacier in mid-afternoon and motor to Glacier Park

SATURDAY—We leave Chicago at 11.30 p.m. or St. Louis at 9.01 p.m. via the Burlington.

SUNDAY—The group from St. Louis reaches Omaha 11.50 a.m. for luncheon and a drive about the city before joining the Chicago party in mid-afternoon,

and the combined groups continue west-ward through Lincoln and then diagonally across one of the most productive agricultural sections in the world . . . where land sold for a dollar an acre only sixty years ago.

MONDAY — An interesting day of


sightseeing from the car window as we journey northwestward...cutting across a corner of South Dakota and a wide swath through Wyoming, every mile of the way full of the romance of pioneer days. We cross the Cheyenne River and the Belle Fourche, the Powder River, the Tongue, the Big Horn and the Yellowstone. All old Indian country; buffalo country; the ancient and peerless hunting ground of Sioux, Cheyenne, Crow, Shoshone, Nez Perce and all the wild tribes of yesteryear. Sheridan... a brief stop near the Custer Battlefield... then on through the Crow Indian Reservation in Southern Montana, and so to Billings for the evening.

TUESDAY—We enter Yellowstone at the Gardiner Gateway—11.30 a.m., and motor through the Canyon of the Gardiner River to Mammoth Hot Springs for overnight, meantime devoting the afternoon in company with a Government Ranger to the many acres of wonderful tinted terraces. An address by a Ranger . . . dancing tonight.

WEDNESDAY—Motoring to Old Faithful—a glimpse of the buffalo herd, Golden Gate, the Hoodoos—the way bordered by many a curious hot spring, colored lakes, pools, many a geyser, great and small.

We reach Old Faithful about noon, remaining twenty-four hours. Here are geysers indeed—

geysers by the score — erupting on every hand. Who can understand the unseen force that causes hot water to boil up through the earth's crust, sometimes shooting a steaming, scalding column 200 feet into the air? Within an area that can be easily covered in



an hour or two are a thousand phases of hot water phenomena to challenge the imagination.

Tonight we troop out to a clearing and watch the ceremony of feeding the bears . . . later on entertained by a Park Ranger with a talk about these bears of Yellowstone.

THURSDAY—Morning here to confirm yesterday's impressions, and gain many new ones. Old Faithful performing with clock-like precision every 65 minutes... other watery explosions in every direction.

Right after luncheon we go on a motor trip . . . twice across the Continental Divide . . . Kepler Cascades—a beautiful waterfall . . . the curious "Fishing Cone" . . . spinning along the smooth boulevard that skirts Yellowstone Lake, and so to our Hotel or Lodges which overlook its shining surface. Plenty of bears here, too.

FRIDAY—We leave after breakfast and follow the Yellowstone River from its source to the breathtaking point where it disappears from sight. We swing around to a vantage point to see what became of it and find the solution in the Great Fall of the Yellowstone—twice as high as Niagara—a roaring, crashing cataract lashed to snowy white as it piles over the edge of a precipice and drops down into the Canyon so far below.

Our motor ride today includes a run up to Dunraven Pass.

SATURDAY—This morning we set out upon the 90-mile motor ride over the famed Cody Road that forms a thrilling climax to our Yellowstone adventures of the last few days, and is a paramount feature of all Burlington Escorted Tours to Yellowstone. Through the boundless forest we go . . . past charming lakes that mirror the pine slopes and the snowy crests of the mountains . . . over the Absaroka Range at Sylvan Pass . . . the Shoshone River . . . the Shoshone Forest . . . "dude ranches" . . . grotesque cliffs . . . the breath-taking Shoshone Canyon and the colossal Dam . . Cody, where he lived . . . dinner at the Burlington Inn . . Pullman cars. What a day!

SUNDAY—Eastward through North Dakota and western Minnesota. Indians greet us at Mandan in the morning and entertain with tribal dances . . . Sioux chants. A lazy day on the whole—Minneapolis and St. Paul tonight.

the upper Mississippi River before reaching St. Paul, where the two groups merge and continue westward through Minnesota and North Dakota . . . an interesting day getting acquainted with each other.

MONDAY-TUESDAY—Arrive at the Gardiner entrance to the Yellowstone Wonderland at 11.30 a.m. Luncheon, dinner and overnight at Mammoth Hot Springs. 

sure you're on hand early in the evening when the bears have supper, while a Ranger tells all about the life and ways of the grizzly, black and brown bears.





### The Black Hills of South Dakota

LIVE those days again in fancy . . . the roaring time when hearts were big and trigger fingers whimsical.

Custer . . . Wild Bill Hickok . . . Deadwood Dick . . . . Calamity Jane . . . here they wrote their glowing passages into the history of the Old West.

Here phantom stage coaches lurch and rumble down the old gold trail from Deadwood Gulch. The ghostly Winchesters echo. And the glamour of adventurous days still lingers.


When Nature built them she gave them foundations of gold and silver, copper, tin, lead, lithium, tungsten, mica, coal and so many others that the list of 150 and more would seem to run the whole gamut of mineral substances from A to Z, which in this case is no mere manner of speaking, since they start with ataite and end with zoisite. She reared them in the purest of dry, invigorating air laden with the fragrance of the pines and possessed of qualities both pleasant and beneficial. She loosed mountain torrents which have gridded the slopes with tremendous canyons, piled great rock masses one upon another in a way which has no counterpart anywhere.

From time immemorial the Indians—Sioux, Cheyenne, Crow, Arapahoe, Otoe, Pawnee and

Mandan, fought each other savagely and almost constantly for possession of this great hunting ground known as *Paha-Sapa* (the mountains that are black) and the healing waters of the hot mineral springs—*Mini-pazhuta* (medicine waters)—gift of the Great Spirit. Finally the Sioux were victorious in a great final fight at Battle Mountain near the present site of Hot Springs and thereafter held the Hills against all comers until 1876 when they gave them up to the United States Government under a treaty.

In justice to the doughty Sioux, let it be said they battled with characteristic skill and courage against any encroachment upon their domain by red men or white, but when in June of 1874 two miners panning the placer gravels of French Creek washed out a hatful of little yellow particles, the resulting tide of gold-mad humanity that swept into the Hills proved irresistible and the astute Sioux finally gave up the unequal fight and relinquished their beloved *Paha-Sapa*.

Croesus may well have envied Lead, S. D., its great "HOME-STAKE"—richest mine in the world, out of which has come more than \$300,000,000 in gold and which is still producing at the rate of \$6,000,000 per year.

There is Deadwood—remindful of road agents, cross-country stage coaches, fortunes easily won by day with pick, shovel and placer pan . . . . easily lost during reckless nights in the roaring gold camp whose fame swept 'round the world.


There is the little town of Custer, which had its beginning when the illustrious Major-General George A. Custer and his "long-knife" soldiers rendezvoused here during the Indian campaigns which culminated in the ill-fated Battle of the Little Big Horn up north there just over the Montana line.

Except that a system of remarkable motor highways replaces the famous old Sidney-Deadwood gold trail and high-powered motors with observation tops have supplanted the six-horse stage coach, the Black Hills remain much the same as in the wild old days of Deadwood Dick, Buffalo Bill Cody, Wild Bill Hickok, Calamity Jane, Pawnee Bill Lillie, Preacher Smith, and many more famous in the old gold days, when the treasure coaches lurched down the old gold trail from Deadwood Gulch and the crack of the Winchester was a familiar sound. Hardly any

region of like area possesses a greater wealth of scenic attraction or is more steeped in the history, romance and tradition of the roaring days when hearts were big and trigger fingers whimsical.

Indian tribal battles fought to a standstill . . . bandits hung to tree limbs without benefit of woman's tears or preacher's prayer . . . gold and death, gold and hysteria . . gold and happiness . . . massacres and whizzing arrows, hold-ups and honey farms, black forests and sunny hills, healing waters and Indian gods. Enough of romance is here of one kind or another to satisfy the heart of him who wants to delve into the past of men . . . to furnish thrills and heartaches for those who know what hardships mean.

For dreamers of dreams . . . for writers of tales . . . for seekers of gold . . . for the singer of songs . . . what more can the world furnish that is not here?

## THE TOUR IN DETAIL


SATURDAY— Leave Chicago 11.30 p.m. or St. Louis 9.01 p.m. via the Burlington.

SUNDAY—The St. Louis party spends four hours in Omaha with dinner and an auto trip, joining Chicago party on departure at 4.25 p.m. . . . Lincoln, the capital of Nebraska, and then away for the Black Hills.

MONDAY—Right after breakfast we arrive at Custer—a little town with a big, historic background. It sprang to life back in '74 while Major-General George A. Custer was encamped here during the Indian campaigns.

All this day motoring among the canyons, valleys and pine forests of the southern part of the Black Hills . . . through French Creek Valley, Grace Coolidge Canyon, up to the top of Mt. Coolidge, through the Aisle of Pines, the astounding "Needles" region, stopping for luncheon at the State Game Lodge and again in the afternoon at charming Sylvan Lake, ending up with a ride through Harney Canyon and along an interesting highway which crosses and recrosses the old Sidney-Deadwood gold trail. Overnight at the Franklin Hotel in Deadwood with time in the evening to prowl around this old town, seeing the places that were so well and widely known in the roaring, wide-open old days when Deadwood was the most notorious spot on the globe.

TUESDAY-A train ride this morning through the spectacular scenery of Lower Spearfish Canyon through which therailroad track has a surprising series of ups and downs . . . to Spearfish, returning by motor via a different route to Deadwood for lunch.



In the afternoon, motoring through Lead, home of the colossal Homestake Mine, the greatest gold mine in the world, producing at the present time six million dollars worth of gold every year and with a total production amounting to \$300,000,000 during its fifty years of continuous operation.

Then up through scenic Upper Spearfish Canyon, and presently out of South Dakota and into Wyoming, pulling up at the cabins Flying V Dude Ranch for dinner and overnight, and doubt-

less an invigorating plunge this evening or tomorrow morning in the open pool formed by the strange salt springs.

WEDNESDAY—After breakfast we roll down to Newcastle and board our special Pullmans for an interesting day's ride through Sheridan, identified as the gateway to the famed "dude ranches" of the Big Horn Mountains; presently across the State Line into Montana, through the great reservation of the Crow Indian Nation, pausing awhile at a point which commands a splendid view of the Custer Battlefield, and so to Billings for an evening before our train departs for Yellowstone.

THURSDAY—Arrive at the Gardiner Gateway to Yellowstone at 11.30 a.m. and motor immediately to the first stopping place, which is Mammoth Hot Springs, famed for its thousands of tiny waterfalls flowing over many acres of beautifully tinted rock terraces.

FRIDAY—Motor via the Norris Geyser Basin and the Fountain Geyser Basin to the Old Faithful area, where we will see more geysers, colored pools, hot springs, caves, caverns, grottos, and other curious hot water phenomena than can be found anywhere else in the world. Twenty-four hours here, and each hour full of interesting activity.

SATURDAY—Twice across the Continental Divide and along the Shore Drive to our destination on Yellowstone Lake, where dinner precedes a visit to see the bears, which gather in considerable numbers at the nearby feeding grounds.

SUNDAY—Alongside the Yellowstone River, through Hayden Valley, up to the Grand Canyon of the Yellowstone, with a side trip up to Dunraven Pass. Afternoon given over to exploring the famous painted chasm and enjoying the tremendous Lower Fall from various viewpoints.


MONDAY—Out of Yellowstone over the thrilling Cody Road—90-mile mountain motor highway over the Absaroka Mountains, through Sylvan Pass and the Buffalo Bill Country, ending with the six-mile canyon of the Shoshone River—and so to Cody, Wyoming, for dinner and our Pullmans. Leave Cody 7.00 p.m.



We reach Minneapolis at 10.10 p.m. and St. Paul at 10.45 p.m.







SUNDAY—The Chicago party leaves at 10.30 a.m. and the St. Louis party at 2.15 p.m. via Burlington Route going direct to Denver.





#### THE TOUR IN DETAIL

SUNDAY-Leave Chicago at 10.30 a.m. and St. Louis at 2.15 p.m. going direct to Denver.

MONDAY—Both groups reach Denver shortly

after noon and right after luncheon the combined party goes on a sightseeing tour by motor embracing the famed Civic Center, State Capitol, Colorado Museum of Natural History, U. S. Mint, the parks, boulevards, and residential areas. Dinner at the

Shirley-Savoy Hotel. Leave Denver at 7.25 p.m. on the Rio Grande Road.











Out there the mighty Pacific Ocean; over here the Canadian Coast, now an inviting wooded shore, then a rock-bound coast of rugged cliffs—the shore line ever and anon deeply cut by fiord, bay and inlet where the sea has filled up ravine and canyon, running back into the hundred-mile-deep belt of forest primeval. The ship glides within a stone's throw of gleaming glaciers beside which it appears as a toy boat. These are the mysterious glaciers of Alaska—rivers of ice extending back 300 miles into the perpetually frozen "inside."

On toward the top of the world. Cruising comfortably through hours filled with the romance of a strange new land bathed in the glow of the mysterious aurora.

How hopeless trying to describe this trip in this limited space. Turn to the itineraries on the next pages.

#### THE TOUR IN DETAIL

The route from Chicago and St. Louis is via St. Paul and the northern states, on either the "North Coast Limited" or "Empire Builder" over several ranges of mountains, the Montana Rockies and along numerous streams, reaching Portland Wednesday. Here we make a 72-mile auto trip over the famous Columbia River Highway to Crown Point and Multnomah Falls, with a motor trip around Portland which will illustrate how this

Northwest metropolis won its well-known name "The Rose City." Meals at the Multnomah Hotel.

We stop overnight in Tacoma at the Tacoma Hotel. The following morning we leave for a wonderful motor trip through the forests to Paradise Inn, in Rainier National Park, where we spend the afternoon and evening, and leave the next morning by motor to Seattle. Afternoon motor trip. Overnight at the New Washington Hotel.

Saturday morning we embark for a 12-day boat trip to Seward on the good steamer "S.S. Aleutian"—first-class in every particular. Our first stop is at Ketchikan on Monday where we have plenty of time to go ashore to see the totem poles and visit the salmon canneries. Late in the afternoon we leave for Wrangell, where we make a short stop.

Tuesday we are at Juneau, the capital of Alaska where we have time enough to visit the museum or motor to Auk Lake and Mendenhall Glacier. We get our only touch of open sea en route to Cordova, from which point we make a side trip by rail to Miles and Child's Glaciers, on the Copper River. Thursday morning we pause for a thrilling close-up of the mighty Columbia Glacier—300 feet high, a mile wide, 90 miles long, and alive and moving. Great thousand-ton fragments of ice are continually breaking off the glacier's façade and dropping with a resounding crash to float about in the sea as small icebergs. A short stop is also made today at Valdez.

We reach Seward, our turning point, Friday and during the layover of the boat, we make an interesting side trip by train on the Alaska Railroad via Kenai Lake, the shaft-like Placer River Canyon to Spencer Glacier, returning to Seward in time to sail the same evening.

Returning we cruise through Prince William Sound, stopping at several salmon cannery ports during the day, with another view of Columbia Glacier before reaching Cordova. Then through Orca Inlet to Cape Hinchinbrook for a fine view of Mt. St. Elias before entering the "Inside Passage" in the late afternoon.

We have several hours of shore-leave at Juneau before continuing southbound through Frederick Sound, Chatham and Strikine Straits. Another short stop at Ketchikan, then our ship weaves its way in and out among the green isles en route south across Queen Charlotte Sound and through the Seymour Narrows and the Strait of Georgia.

Our ship is due in Seattle Thursday morning, headquarters at the New Washington Hotel. No scheduled program for today. Oh, what a trip and what good times!

Leave Seattle at 8.30 or 9.30 p.m. Thursday, arriving St. Paul Saturday night, Chicago 8.45 or 9.00 a.m. Sunday and St. Louis Sunday afternoon.

#### Via Canadian Rockies


Leave Seattle 5.00 p.m. Thursday, arriving Vancouver late in the evening. Overnight Hotel Vancouver. Sightseeing trip Friday. We leave at noon for a never-to-be-forgotten ride through the Canadian Rockies, through the Fraser River Canyon this afternoon, arriving Emerald Lake Saturday morning. We motor through the Kicking Horse Canyon and Yoho Valley to Lake Louise where we remain over night at the Chateau Lake Louise.

Leaving Lake Louise after breakfast Sunday we motor to Banff via Johnson Canyon. Leave Banff 5.00 p.m., arrive St. Paul 7.50 a.m., Chicago 7.40 p.m. Tuesday, St. Louis Wednesday morning.

### THE TOUR IN DETAIL

From Chicago we go via St. Paul and the northern states over the Montana Rockies on either the "North Coast Limited" or the "Empire Builder" to Portland, where we spend a day with a motor trip over the famous Columbia River Highway to Crown Point and Multnomah Falls and around the residential section of the "City of Roses." Meals at the Multnomah Hotel.

We leave in the late afternoon for Tacoma, spending the night at the Tacoma Hotel. The following morning, we motor to Rainier National Park for an afternoon and night at Paradise Inn.

We leave by motor the following morning and in the afternoon we enjoy another motor trip around Seattle, including Washington and Union Lakes. Headquarters at the New Washington Hotel.

Tuesday morning the real adventure begins—we board the "S.S. Alaska" for an 11-day boat trip

through the "Inside Passage" to Skagway. Our first stop is Victoria with a two-hours' motor trip.

Thursday afternoon we reach Ketchikan, headquarters for Alaska's fishing boats, arriving Wrangell Friday morning. Wrangell is famous for its totem poles, the "family trees" of the Indians. Petersburg is our next port of call, then Juneau, Alaska's capital. Plenty of time for various hikes or a motor trip to Mendenhall Glacier and Auk Lake.

After leaving Juneau, the boat swings around to the face of Taku Glacier—in reality, a river of ice.

Sunday morning we are at Skagway and transfer to the train for a most interesting ride over White Pass and across the international boundary into Yukon, with luncheon at Lake Bennett.

Another stop at Juneau Monday, reaching Sitka Tuesday morning. Several hours here—the original capital of Alaska when under Russian rule. It is one of the most interesting points on the Pacific Coast. Here will be found St. Michael's Cathedral with its old relics, jeweled altar cloth, etc., the Indian school and Sitka National Park which offers an opportunity for short hikes.

Stops are made on the return trip at Petersburg, Wrangell and Ketchikan, and we are due back in Seattle on Saturday. Of course there is the usual masquerade ball on board the boat the night before landing in which everybody participates.

Time in Seattle open. Meals at New Washington Hotel.

Those desiring to return via the American Rockies, with perhaps a stop at Yellowstone or Glacier Parks, would leave the party at Seattle and would return without escort.

Leave Seattle at 5.00 p.m., spending the night at the New Leopold Hotel in Bellingham. Sunday morning we have a very interesting motor trip through Douglas Fir forests to Mt. Baker Lodge in Mt. Baker National Forest, up in the Alpine regions of the Cascades.

Monday morning we motor back to Bellingham and board our train, reaching Vancouver in the early afternoon, where we have a motor trip including Stanley Park, Marine Drive and Shaughnessy Heights, leaving at 6.30 p.m. for the east.

Early Tuesday afternoon we reach Field, where we transfer to autos for a delightful motor trip via Emerald Lake, through Kicking Horse Canyon and Yoho Valley to Lake Louise, where we spend the night at the Chateau.

Leave Wednesday morning by motor for Banff, where we spend the afternoon before boarding the train for home. Arrive St. Paul Friday morning, thence along the Mississippi River, reaching Chicago Friday evening.

#### THE TOUR IN DETAIL

West from Chicago, via St. Paul and the Montana Rockies. Our first stop is Portland, where we motor over the Columbia River Highway and around the "City of Roses."

Wednesday night finds us at the Tacoma Hotel in Tacoma, and early the next morning we wheel away by motor to Paradise Inn in Rainier National Park for an afternoon and night, then on to Seattle with headquarters at the New Washington Hotel.

We board the Canadian Pacific boat at 9.00 a.m. Saturday. Short stop is made at Victoria with sightseeing trip, and at 9.00 p.m. we leave Vancouver for Alaska.

En route through the "Inside Passage," through the Straits of Georgia, and Queen Charlotte Sound. Each day is enlivened by deck games, dancing and the usual shipboard activities.

We arrive at Prince Rupert Monday morning and Ketchikan in the afternoon. Ketchikan is a busy little town—the center of the Alaskan fishing fleet.

Wednesday morning finds us at Skagway—made famous by the gold rush of '98. Here we board a W. P. & Y. Ry. train, crossing White Pass and along Lake Bennett to Carcross where we transfer to the "S.S. Tutshi" for a delightful trip on Tagish Lake to West Taku Arm, returning to Skagway Thursday.

We leave Skagway Thursday, retracing our way through the 'Inside Passage'' with stops at Juneau, Wrangell, Ketchikan, and Prince Rupert, arriving Vancouver 8.15 a.m. Monday.

After a sightseeing tour of Vancouver, we leave at noon for the return through the Canadian Rockies, the Fraser River country this afternoon, the Selkirks in the morning.

We forsake the train at Field Tuesday and motor first to visit a famed resort at the shore of Emerald Lake.

Next through the mountains, through Yoho National Park to Yoho Valley to see Takakkaw Falls, then through Kicking Horse Canyon and over the top of the main range at the Great Divide and so to Lake Louise for overnight at the one and only Chateau Lake Louise with all that it implies.

Motoring again Wednesday along the Bow River . . . Johnson Canyon . . . the way patrolled by majestic peaks . . . Banff and several thrilling hours at Banff Springs Hotel before boarding our special sleepers for the East.

Minneapolis and St. Paul early Saturday morning and pleasantly Southward along the charming Wisconsin shore of the Upper Mississippi River. Arriving in Chicago at 7.40 p.m.—St. Louis Sunday morning.

Rooms with bath can be had at *Hotels* in Yellowstone and Glacier Parks, and at Chalets and Lodges in Rocky Mountain National Park at an extra charge. Arrangements can be made at time of booking.

#### YOUR APPAREL AND BAGGAGE

While these are summer journeys, the nights in the mountains and the cool, invigorating auto rides make desirable medium-weight and even heavy wraps, overcoats, sweater coats, or a wind- and weather-proof outer coat. Knickers and outing suits are worn throughout the mountain territory. Stout sports shoes or boots should be part of your outfit.

After the day's activities, the dinner hour and evening lounge or dance naturally suggest a change from the habiliments of travel and out-of-door life, but formal evening attire is entirely unnecessary.

Because of the change of climate and mountain altitudes it is advisable to include cold cream and the usual lotions for sunburn and chapped lips. The bright sunlight also suggests that you bring colored glasses.

One medium-sized suitcase or traveling bag should hold sufficient clothing for the tours of two weeks or less. On the longer tours two pieces of hand baggage should be ample. In any case trunks are unnecessary. Because of frequent handling, durable baggage, with strong handles, is essential.

The free allowance of baggage which may be carried in automobiles in the National Parks, is one piece weighing twenty-five pounds—this aside from a small overnight bag which passengers may easily carry with them.

#### RATES FOR CHILDREN

Will be based on age and accommodations desired.

#### MEALS

Tour costs shown herein provide for all meals everywhere. In dining cars and at hotels passengers may select the meal they desire, from the service offered.

#### HORSEBACK TRIPS

Saddle horses may be hired at most stopping places in the National Parks.


