

GLACIER PARK

Land of Shining Mountains

Sheer and sharp as the pyramids, the great snow-capped peaks of the Montana Rockies rear their majestic heads up to the sky, forming a mighty granite barrier. Here the Continental Divide becomes a rock-hewn reality and the "backbone" of Glacier National Park, for the barrier extends down from the Canadian border through the entire length of the Park.
