THE ENGLISH CLAIM BARBADOS

The first Englishmen to have landed on the island of Barbados were the crew of the ship "Olive Blossom" bound from London to Surinam in 1605.

Finding it without inhabitants they took possession by fixing up a cross on the spot where James-Town was afterwards built, with this inscription, "James King of England and this island."

Barbados was probably discovered by the Portuguese in their voyages from Brazil and from them it received its name.

The Portuguese, however, satisfied with the splendid regions they had acquired on the continent, seem to have considered it as of little value. Having furnished it with a breed of swine for the benefit of such of their countrymen as might navigate the same track, they left the island in all other respects, as they had found it.

Some years after the placing of the cross, a ship of Sir William Courteen was driven by stress of weather into this island. They were so impressed with the beauty of the country, that, upon their arrival in England, they immediately got together thirty persons who undertook to settle on the island and arriving there in the latter end of the year 1624, they founded the town of James-Town.
