## THE FIRST CIVIL COUNCIL OF NOVA SCOTIA

Halifax was founded by Honourable Edward Cornwallis on June 21st, 1749. Colonel Cornwallis soon afterwards assumed his duties as governor of the province. On July 14th, 1749, he asked the following to come on board the "Beaufort" a transport in the harbour, Paul Mascarene, Edward How, John Gorham, Benjamin Green, John Salisbury, and Hugh Davidson and they were sworn in as members of the First Council of Nova Scotia.

Colonel Mascarene had been Lieutenant-Governor at Annapolis, the capital, from 1710 until 1749.

Colonel Gorham had taken part in Sir Wm. Pepperrell's expedition against Louisbourg in 1745 and was a member of Mascarene's old Council.

Captain How will be best remembered on account of his tragic death at Beaubassin.

Messrs. Davidson and Salisbury were Englishmen who came out with Cornwallis.

Mr. Green was a graduate of Harvard University and afterwards became treasurer of the Province.

(In a small Council Chamber adjacent to the Legislative Library in the old Province Building at Halifax can still be seen the table round which Cornwallis and his First Council deliberated on board the Beaufort.)
